THE BIG PARADE REACHES ITS CLOSE

Thousands on Sidewalks Witness Fraternization of Country and City Boys in March.

LADS WARMLY PRAISE ATLANTA HOSPITALITY

Exhibits Exceed Expectations, and in Opinion of Experts Mean Much for State's Future.

"Three cheers for Atlanta!" "Hail! Hail! Hail!" for the corn club of Georgia! These were the sentiments expressed by more than 2,000 of the next generation of Georgians during the big parade which the Georgia corn show of 1913 closed yesterday.

The country lads coming from all over every county in the state, from the mountains to the sea, and who came to express their enthusiasm for the city of Atlanta and their appreciation of the entertainment shown them during their visit to this city for the first time in their lives.

It was the opinion of all who witnessed the parade, particularly those who had taken most interest in getting up the show, and were, therefore, best able to judge of its results, that the history of the state had never been such a fraternization of the youth of the state from city and country as this joyous and altogether enthusiastic mingling of the combined manhood of city and country as was seen in the great throngs which lined the Whitehall and Peachtree streets Thursday afternoon.

The boys of the school of Atlanta, both public and private, who were represented in the parade, and who were given an opportunity to meet and fraternize with their country boys, were equally enthusiastic.

Turkeys for the poor may be left at the homes of the poor, personally, as the poorest mortal in the whole county.

On the outside of a "movie" in one of the more obscure city districts he caused to be posted a huge sign reading, "For Men Only."

Now, it is a fact inflexibly established by natural history that a legend of that character will induce certain loose-minded types of men to avail themselves of the opportunity.

It appeals to their less commendable traits of curiosity. Hardly had the sign been hung for a few minutes when a crowd of men gathered.

Up to twenty years ago almost every branch save one of the world's activities was going forward with feverish industry, aided by science and fathered by efficiency.

The factory and the counting room had each registered marvellous advances in the manner in which output was increased and cost lessened.

With sporadic exceptions, farming was at a standstill. The old methods of the forefathers clung to us with a curious tenacity.

Great improvements were, of course, invented in farm machinery. The gin, the harrow and the gang-plow, to mention no others, were revolutionary influences.

The great masses of the farmers had not been awakened to the opportunities that knocked at their door in aid from the laboratories, in aid from the study, in intensive methods, in seed selection, in a dozen other directions.

We presented the anomaly, in other words, of striding forward with seven league boots in every direction but that one most important of all—the direction of greater efficiency and less cost and less effort in producing the crops that feed and clothe mankind.

Today sees the gradual remedying of that fundamental defect. In America the farmer is awakening to his advantages. In Georgia scientific and diversified farming has come to stay and improved methods furnish the key-note to the universal effort.

The movement embodied in the boys' corn clubs is among the healthiest symptoms of the awakening. We are reaching down from the seats of the mighty, the students, the financiers and the captains and kings of industry, to teach the boy the business and profit and lure and mystery while he is yet in his receptive years.

This year in Georgia eighty-seven boys raised 100 bushels of corn to the acre, where last year the number totalled only sixty-nine. The significance of this fact is unmistakable.

Along with the fact that more than 1,000 young Georgians will distributed throughout the state are exhibiting at the Corn show, it means that we are breeding a race of farmers who will work intelligently; that we can differentiate between the glamor of the city and the substance of the farm; that we will remain on the farm and make a fortune, or at least a substantial competence there.

Instead of adding to the perplexities and futilities of the city; that will eventually multiply our wealth at its source, for the reason that they are working the source itself; that will ultimately lift the average of our citizenry through feeding it with a vital mixture of brains and properly directed energy.

The Corn show has this and only this to run. Go over to the capitol and see Georgia's destiny foreshadowed in the exploits of these young gentils of the acres.

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G. O. P. COMMITTEE LACKS AUTHORITY

To Change Basis of Representation in National Conventions—Has Power to Change Method of Selecting Delegates.

DETROIT, Mich., December 4.—The republican national committee has no authority to change the basis of representation and voting in national conventions.

The national committee has authority to change the manner and method of choosing delegates to future national conventions so as to provide that delegates be chosen in such manner as the laws of the several states from time to time may provide.

The executive committee in Washington, May 24, last, adopted a resolution requesting the chairman to call a meeting of the national committee to be held within sixty days after the expiration of the special session of congress contained in 1912.

Mr. Warren, who wrote the opinion now submitted, is a new member of the national committee.

The national committee is the creature of the national convention. It possesses no authority to select any other source whatever.

After examining the proceedings of the national committee, the opinion is announced: "It is the opinion of this committee, therefore, that the national convention of 1908, 1912, and 1916, and other conventions beginning with that of 1860, prescribes the manner of representation and voting in national conventions of the G. O. P. from the time of the adoption of the constitution of 1852 to 1912."

The second question considered is: "Has the national committee authority to change the manner and method of choosing delegates to future national conventions so as to provide that delegates be chosen in such manner as the laws of the several states from time to time may provide, and so provide (b) that all delegates from the states be chosen from the state at large and subject to the laws of the state in which they are chosen?"

"Such committee shall leave the call for the meeting of the national convention within sixty days, at least, before the time fixed for the election of delegates to the national convention shall be chosen in such manner as the laws of the several states from time to time may provide."
