# In Lingering Reply to Card by Judge Samuel B. Adams, Mrs. Otteley Upholds Principle of Woman's Suffrage

### Does Movement "Bode Evil and Evil Only to the Women Themselves, to the Home, and Therefore to Our Highest Weal?"—Mrs. Otteley Says Not, and Proceeds to Answer, Point by Point, Article in Last Sunday's Constitution by Judge Adams, of Savannah, ex-Judge of Supreme Court.

By Mrs. J. K. Otteley.

I have no special claim to be heralded as the "proponent of the principle of woman suffrage," for I have neither the enthusiasms nor the indignations of the subject.

I never feel particularly "tried" because my garden can vote while I cannot. This may be because I know how little the gardener is likely to accomplish with that vote—and how little I myself could accomplish with one unless I bused myself more than most male voters do to build up a concert of other voters around mine towards a certain end.

I think the importance of the vote for women is immensely magnified by both its advocates and its opponents.

For these reasons I am unfitted to become a special pleader for the cause of votes for women. For these reasons I am unfitted to become a special pleader upon this tortured subject may have the value of a somewhat unbiased point of view.

#### ARE OBJECTIONS FUNDAMENTAL?

The editor of the Constitution has asked me to state some of these ideas which I have written in the "Constitution" of November 29, 1913, by Judge Samuel B. Adams, of Savannah, in which he states "some of the objections to the woman's suffrage movement" which seem to him to be "fundamental" and which "bode evil and evil only to the women themselves, to the home, and therefore to our highest weal."

My difference with Judge Adams lies in the very word "fundamental."

We are aware that no person or group of persons has the right to suffrage. Unfranchised groups of people must obtain the right to suffrage by convincing the existing electorate (which is the electorate of the state to do so) of the advantage to the state of this extending the suffrage.

This has been the case with the unfranchised groups of men the world over since the first vote was cast.

If women, therefore, with the vote, they have business to urge their claims to the extent that they have business to carefully consider these claims and decide the issue upon the basis of the best interests of the state.

#### Must We No Differences?

When we are asked if we are aware of the fact that they do not press their claims bitterly or with impudence while men should assume themselves to be "democratic" and not to press their claims, they do not meet the claims of the equal suffrage with the same bluster. Thus we should accept of the equal suffrage as a movement for equal suffrage, seems in England, at least, to have been the case.

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CHANGES MADE IN PARCEL POST

Weight Limits Increased in First and Second Zones. Rates Reduced in Third, Fourth, Fifth and Sixth.

Washington, December 6.—Postmaster General Burleson's proposal to increase the weight limit of parcel post packages in the first and second zones from 28 to 35 pounds to admit books to the parcel post and to reduce rates in the third, fourth, fifth and sixth zones was approved today by the interstate commerce commission.

The maximum weight of parcels to all zones beyond the second was increased from eleven to twelve pounds. The commission's consent to the proposed changes was transmitted in three letters from Chairman Clark to Postmaster General Burleson.

The approved changes in rates and weights to be in effect January 1, 1914, follow:

To reduce the rates for the third zone from 7 cents for the first pound and 5 cents for each additional pound to 6 cents for the first pound and 4 cents for each additional pound. To reduce the rates for the fourth zone from 8 cents for the first pound and 6 cents for each additional pound to 7 cents for the first pound and 5 cents for each additional pound.

To reduce the rates for the fifth zone from 9 cents for the first pound and 7 cents for each additional pound to 8 cents for the first pound and 6 cents for each additional pound.

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### GIRLS OVERCOME BY NEEDLE GANG

#### Federal Officials may Take Hand in N. Y. Probe—Poisoned Needles Jabbed Into Girls to Overcome Them.

Newark, N. J., December 6.—Federal as well as state authorities are likely to take a hand in the investigation of the poison needle mystery, growing out of the experience of Mrs. Marjorie Graff in a moving picture theater two days ago. So far the only arrest is that of the young South American, Armand Marago, who is held on \$20,000 bail on an assault charge made by Mrs. Graff after a man seated near her in a box jabbed a needle into her arm and she was seized with drowsiness.

The cases of five other young women reported to have been the victims of experiences similar to those of Mrs. Graff are being investigated by the police of this city, however, and the attention of the federal authorities here has been brought to the Graff case in connection with the industry in several white slave cases.

#### Warning About White Slavers.

Charles F. Loach, assistant federal district attorney, today said that the government authorities would not get it was shown that "needle gangs" were operating between this state and New York. Sociological workers here and in New York city have laid emphasis on the Graff case in their public warnings regarding methods of white slavers in procuring girls. They pointed out that hypodermic needles may be bought for fifty cents each and the drug can be purchased with little difficulty.

The police here are withholding the names of all the reported victims except that of Miss Hargrave, 19 years old, who said today she had been attacked in a box at a picture theater on Thanksgiving night. Reports that Miss Mary Lee, an actress, and another girl, were similarly made a victim were denied by her today. It had been understood that she and Miss Clark were to be taken before Mrs. Graff alleged assailant to see if they could identify him. Miss Clark stated tonight that she did not believe she could recognize the man who attacked her if he saw him again.

The needle found near Mrs. Graff's seat in the theater had not been dipped in poison, so far as a chemical analysis showed today. However, in the effort to identify the person or persons who used the needle lay on the floor many hours before it was found.

#### Drug to Be Tested.

A test of the South American drug which is the suspected poison in the Graff case is to be made. An animal will be inoculated with a needle dipped in the poison so that the effects may be watched.

While physicians disagree as to whether a subtle and powerful narcotic poison could be instantaneously injected from a needle, societies for the prevention of crime have taken up the matter in an effort to determine whether procurers tried thus to get a victim were they by Mrs. Graff.

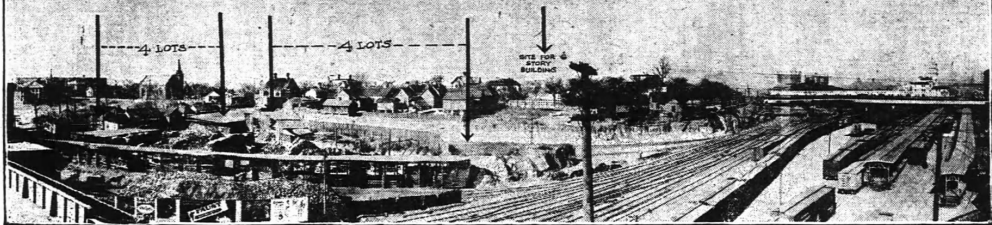

On Monday, next week, that is on December 15, the celebrated Leo M. Frank case will be called up in the supreme court for argument. This case has been put first on the criminal calendar of the court for the month and is scheduled to be called at 9 o'clock on the morning of the "late named, only provisional cases, such as serious illness of one or more of the attorneys involved, could delay the hearing of the case.

Ordinarily only two attorneys on a side are allowed to make their argument to the court, but in this case it is expected that each side will have four, but it is not believed that this will be the case.

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# THE PYRAMID MAKE-UP OF NEWSPAPER PAGES

An Address Before the Rotary Club of Atlanta by W. L. Halstead, Business Manager of The Atlanta Constitution

**T**HE PYRAMID MAKE-UP is the scheme by which newspaper pages are assembled with the news matter at the upper left corner and across the top, and the advertising the lower right corner, built upward and to the left, the larger advertisements at the bottom and the smaller ones pyramided according to size. It does not apply to classified advertising, to full page or other advertisements of full column length. In the last couple of years all the Atlanta newspapers have adopted it, in a modified form, however, as they have not enforced it strictly.

For a thorough understanding of its purpose and effect and the reasons for its wide adoption, it is necessary to study critically several of the fundamental phases of advertising and some relating principles underlying the newspaper publishing business.

### CHARACTER IS THE VITAL FACTOR IN A NEWSPAPER'S POTENTIALITY AS AN ADVERTISING MEDIUM.

A newspaper should be made primarily for its readers. Its popularity with them and their confidence in it controls to a very large degree its potentiality as an advertising medium. Quantity of circulation, irrespective of other factors, has little value. It is the easiest thing imaginable to get circulation for even a handbill. The character of a newspaper as represented by the kind of news matter it prints, its treatment of the news, its attitude upon public questions, its aims and purposes, its performances as an institution, the character of its ownership, are the vital factors in relation to results from its advertising columns. Because it is those things which actually control, in the end, not only the quantity of its circulation, but the kind of people who read it, and the degree of credence they give its advertising.

The greatest newspapers are the best advertising mediums. The only way to make a newspaper a fine advertising medium is to make it a fine newspaper. When people read the news in a newspaper they read the advertising. When they do not read the news they do not believe the advertising. The editor of a newspaper has more to do with the productiveness of his paper as an advertising medium than the circulation manager, the advertising manager and the business manager combined.

### MR. DON SEITZ'S FORMULA.

I once heard Mr. Don Seitz, business manager of The New York World, give this formula for the business success of a newspaper: "Print the news and print it first," which when developed into its full significance means that the newspaper should be first in news, first in news to make it the best newspaper in its field.

Joseph Pulitzer, the shining genius of present-day journalism, had a contemptuous disregard for the business side of his paper, although he was an able business man. He devoted the entire capacity of a wonderful mind to making The World a great newspaper to every one of its readers.

As strange as it may seem, those papers which are the most determined in the policy of giving their readers first consideration and which are the most rigid in their advertising policies, are the most successful and personal preferences of advertisers, to that end, are the ones that are paying their advertisers best.

### THE CHICAGO DAILY NEWS' POLICIES.

The Chicago Daily News is a notable example of this. It is one of the most arbitrary papers in this country with respect to advertising rates, position, and other things. It recently charged double price for all space occupied by cuts, and even penalties for breaking column rules in advertisements. It treats advertising as a by-product and will omit advertising without the slightest hesitation to make room for news or for any of its similar policies. It limits the amount of space an advertiser may use on certain days at congested periods. If an advertiser wishes to be sure of space on a certain day he reserves it in advance.

These policies are unpopular with advertisers who seek special advantages. But The Chicago Daily News is conceded to be one of the most profitable mediums in the world for nearly all lines of newspaper advertising, and carries more of it than any other six-day paper. It is one of the three or four biggest money-makers in this country. While it has a large circulation, it is not the largest. It is the most successful because the things which give it its remarkable productiveness is that it is built for its readers. The New York World, The New York Herald, The Chicago Tribune, The Washington Star, The Kansas City Star and many other leading advertising mediums follow the same general principle.

### A STORY OF MR. KEELEY.

I heard this story told the other day of Mr. James Keeley, the able publisher of The Chicago Tribune. A slight elevator accident had occurred in a department store which was a great deal of space in The Tribune. A reporter investigated the matter, learned the trivial nature of the accident and turned in a few lines about it, which probably would have been crowded out of the paper. The store owner sent a peremptory message that nothing was to be printed about it. Mr. Keeley heard of this, made a new assignment of the accident, secured a photograph of the lady, who merely had a finger scratched and printed the story conspicuously on the front page.

I think this was going a little to extremes. But Mr. Keeley, a great newspaper man, was so jealous of The Tribune's independence that he would not permit his best advertiser to think that he could influence the news policy of the paper in the slightest particular.

### NEWSPAPERS ARE AT A DISADVANTAGE TYPOGRAPHICALLY.

Newspapers are printed on paper that costs 2 1/2 a pound or less, with ink that costs 6c a pound or less, and at a running speed for each press unit of from 5,000 to 12,000 impressions an hour.

All other kinds of printing, which pretend to typographical excellence, are done with paper costing at least three times as much as news ink, and at a press speed of one-fourth as great. For example, the standard magazines, such as Cosmopolitan, Everybody's, McClure's, a pound. The impressions are made at from 4,000 to 5,000 an hour. For such publications as The Ladies' Home Journal, The Metropolitan and The Country Gentleman, which specialize in fine printing, these costs are higher.

Newspapers are in competition for attention with all other periodicals. With these handicaps, it is essential that whatever opportunities they have for typographical excellence, be realized upon to the fullest extent. Under the most favorable conditions, from a critical standpoint, newspapers are typographically inelegant. They are even cumbersome in size. If in the make-up they are still more unappealing, they suffer in this competition and to the degree that they do suffer are they depreciated as advertising mediums.

Nobody reads a newspaper as a matter of duty. Newspapers are read only to the degree that they are interesting. If they are offensive typographically, in so far they are unattractive. The typography of a newspaper is analogous to a man's dress. Men who do not dress in good taste are at a disadvantage in business and social activities. A newspaper which is not printed in good taste is handicapped similarly. Circulation expansion work that is a well established fact that a paper, to secure new readers, must have the appearance of being newsworthy and enterprising.

### THE WHITE PAPER FORMULA.

The number of pages in a newspaper is determined in most offices by some formula based upon the percentage of news and advertising matter. I imagine the public thinks a newspaper gathers all the advertising it can and all the news it wants, printing enough pages for both. That is not the case. It gets all the advertising it can and says to its editor: "You have so many columns in which to print

all the news and print it interestingly." He must apportion the space for the various departments accordingly.

Unless the formula, whatever it may be, is closely adhered to, the consumption of white paper will defeat profits. One sheet, or two pages, in The Constitution, for example, including composition, costs approximately 87c. Two extra pages a day over the formula for a month would create \$3,225 in net expense, with no additional revenue. Papers of large circulation omit advertising to control the number of pages, and will not increase it unless there is enough excess advertising to justify it.

Under present conditions a newspaper, to make normal profits upon a normal investment, should receive for its advertising space, not less than 1 3/4c per inch per thousand of circulation, and 20 per cent of its total space at that figure. That is predicted, of course, upon a fully developed advertising business. This formula gives a rate for a paper of 50,000 circulation, of 87 1/2c per inch. If it does not sell half of its total space at this rate, it is unlikely to make money. The average rate for newspaper advertising space for the entire country, recently ascertained, is 2 1/2c per inch per thousand of circulation. Small papers receive 3c and 4c an inch. Metropolitan papers of very large circulation receive 1 1/2c or even less, but only about one in five make money.

### THE PRACTICE OF ATLANTA NEWSPAPERS.

For the month of October, The Atlanta Journal's advertising was 48.6 per cent of the total space; The Constitution's was 47.5 per cent; The Georgian and American was 40 per cent; The Evening Post was 30 per cent; The Atlanta Journal's 51 per cent; The Atlanta Journal's 52 per cent, and the Georgian and American's 48 per cent. These are months of heavy advertising. In the late spring and summer, when advertising is light, The Atlanta Journal's percentage fell to 40 per cent; The Constitution's to 32 per cent; The Georgian and American's to 20 per cent. The year round, The Atlanta Journal and The Constitution will average about 45 per cent advertising, showing that Atlanta papers are generous in amount of news matter they print. The average advertising rate of these two papers is a fraction less than 1 3/4c per inch per thousand of circulation.

Many of the best papers average 60 per cent advertising. I imagine The New York Evening Journal averages 70 per cent or more. I have seen issues of The Chicago News and The Chicago Tribune average 75 per cent for single issues.

In order to approximate the percentage between news and advertising matter that will provide a profit, the number of special advertising positions must be limited. A paper should attempt, for example, even to give position next to reading matter on every display advertisement, large and small, it could not average to exceed 33 per cent advertising.

Consequently, there are two big problems to a publisher in relation to special positions. If he gives them to any large proportion of his advertisers it is impossible for him to make his paper pleasing and attractive typographically to his readers, and in so far, he depreciates the potential advertising value of his paper.

He will also inevitably increase the number of pages of enough issues to greatly reduce if not wipe out normal profits, for a great deal of advertising must be inserted to meet the requirements of special news and advertising. A newspaper is just as much entitled to profits as any other business.

### THE READING OF ADVERTISING IS PARTIALLY ACCIDENTAL.

Undoubtedly it is true at the present time, at least, that the reading of advertising is, to a considerable extent, accidental. I mean by that, comparatively few people take up a newspaper for any specific purpose of reading the advertising. Many women read retail advertising systematically. A great many people read the classified advertising with as definite an interest as the ordinary reader. But it is only fair to say that these probably constitute the minority of readers. Most of them read a paper for the news, which is their chief function, encounter the advertising incidentally, are attracted by it for one reason or another, and read it extensively. That they do read the advertising is no longer debatable.

Quite naturally, therefore, advertisers seeking maximum results from the space they buy want the positions they think will attract the most readers to their particular advertisements.

There is the widest difference of opinion as to the positions which are valuable. One advertiser wants a right-hand page. Another wants a left-hand page. One wants the back page, the other the majority of people turn from the first immediately to the last page. Another wants the second or third page, in the belief that most people read the pages in the order that they are assembled. One wants the society page in the conviction that everybody reads the society news. One insists upon the top of the page, believing people read across the page before going downward. Another wants the bottom of the page following reading matter for some fanciful reason. There are dozens of preferences of this kind, many of them based on contradictory, and some on fantastic psychological theories of the habits of the public mind.

Very few papers outside the large cities, where the tendency in all lines of business is to enforce strict business rules with all customers impartially, are able to resist giving some preferential positions as inconsistent and as valueless as many of them are. Every one likes to please his customers and especially his business friends. Few business men resist preferential refusal to favor patrons.

### THE POSITION PROBLEM.

The matter of position is one of the most difficult problems that business and advertising managers have to meet. It involves peculiar partiality, frequent friction, very great inconveniences and often needless expense. The mechanical problem in a composing room of fulfilling position requirements is often acute. In my own office even the pyramid make-up has not entirely solved the problem. I have seen the printers calculate and scheme and shift advertisements and news about from page to page, with the press hour pressing, trying to approximate the pyramid make-up and at the same time fill a lot of special positions which have been bought and others requested, many of them of absolutely no value, as far as results were concerned.

### THE VALUE OF SPECIAL POSITION IS LARGELY IMAGINARY.

The value of the position usually desired by advertisers, such as enumerated, is largely imaginary. Most of them are based on pure theory of little or no actual significance.

Any advertisement that relies upon trapping readers by sensational headlines, freakish cuts or setup, or advantageous position on a page, is a bad advertisement. Any advertisement of reasonable size, containing a legitimate and opportune business message, properly written and typographically pleasing, will produce profitable results. If it does not contain real merit as an advertisement, it will fail despite all efforts to force it upon the readers unwillingly.

Classified advertising pays, in a definite and unmistakable way. It is devoid of typographical display of any kind and the only position is by classification.

Magazine advertising pays when many kinds are assembled in mass far removed from reading matter.

### THE POLICY OF THE SATURDAY EVENING POST.

The last time I heard it quoted the advertising rate of The Saturday Evening Post was 35 an agate line per insertion. This is 11 1/2 an inch or \$276 a page. The Post stands at the very top of the list of profitable advertising mediums of its class.

Not only does it censor its advertising columns as to the character of the matter admitted, but controls by the most rigid rules the typographical appearance of every advertisement. It permits no solid black illustrations to mar the symmetry of pages. It prohibits freakish composition of every kind. Every advertisement must conform strictly to the typographical style which it, and not the advertiser, prescribes. You don't happen to fancy the prescription you can swallow it or stay out. You are likely to be humiliated if you suggest special position, except in reference to the few that it offers for sale at special prices.

### THE NEW YORK HERALD A MARVELOUS PRODUCER.

For many years The New York Herald not only gave no special positions, but not advertising only in outside type. All advertising was, as is most of it now, as mild typographically as the news. Recently competition forced it into a partial waiver of the rule. Its daily circulation is about 100,000 and its Sunday circulation about 250,000, less than a third that of several other New York papers, charging substantially the same advertising rates. Yet The New York Herald has stood for years on a parity with its competitors, no matter what the quantity of its circulation, as a positive result producer.

### AN EXAMPLE OF RESULTS WITHOUT POSITION OR TYPOGRAPHICAL APPEAL.

The Constitution has been conducting a somewhat experimental advertising campaign for Sherrer, the grocer, at No. 38 Gordon street. It has been strikingly successful. The biggest day's business created during the campaign was 40 per cent above the normal. The most direct results, was on buried by large advertisements, far removed from reading matter, on a page of no special selection, and containing only small type and no cuts, crowded even to the point of unattractiveness.

### APPROPRIATE CLASSIFICATION THE ONLY ESSENTIAL POSITION.

In my opinion, about the only point of real significance in the matter of position is that of classification. The advertiser who is entitled to be placed near appropriate reading matter. A clear advertisement on a society page would be considerably depreciated, because every one knows that few men read that class of news and such an advertisement so placed would be missed by most of the class of readers to which it is directed. Military advertisement on a market page would encounter the same condition.

Newspapers are too large in size to be read in their entirety. It is of actual importance that the advertiser, especially those not large enough to command attention by their size, be put in that part of a newspaper to which the class of readers it is seeking to reach are likely to turn. Because, to reiterate, as yet most people peruse a newspaper for the news and read the advertising incidentally.

But it is of much more importance to the advertiser that the department of the paper in which it is located be highly interesting and artistically made-up typographically, as to attract and hold the reader, than that each advertisement be so placed that he will stub his toe on it, so to speak, utter a mental curse and skip to a page that is made-up for him and not the advertiser, when he is given only an incidental opportunity to read the advertising, and not be compelled to visit the news he is seeking out from a potpourri of advertisements.

### THE PYRAMID MAKE-UP.

The pyramid make-up is a compromise of all these conditions I have attempted to describe.

It enables a paper to give preferential position at the left side and across the top of pages to news, to which it is entitled, from both the standpoint of the reader and the advertiser, as difficult as it is to make the advertiser appreciate the value of the position.

It enables the paper to increase the percentage of advertising per issue without any apparent diminution of news. Through a kind of optical illusion, a newspaper page with 50 per cent of pyramided advertising will appear to contain 60 per cent or more of news matter. The same amount of advertising, placed indiscriminately, will appear to contain 40 per cent, or less of news matter. It does not take into consideration at all the very much more pleasing typographical appeal that can be given the pyramided page.

The pyramid represents the square deal. The larger an advertisement, the less it needs position consideration of any kind, its very size helps it to attract readers. It gives opportunity for full descriptions of business propositions and for appealing typographical displays. The living of large customers low prices and concessions is a relic of the period in business when "the buyer had to beware," when competition was a matching of the wits of the buyer against those of the seller. The rapid tendency in all lines of business today is to treat all customers alike. Quantity discounts are going out of practice. Honesty, fairness and impartiality are the policies of modern business.

### ADVERTISING IS A BUSINESS SCIENCE.

Advertising is very nearly a business science. In general terms the formula for its success is to offer the public honest values at honest prices, describe the merchandise, the service or whatever is for sale, truthfully, but interestingly, in a typographical form that is pleasing, placing the message in an advertising medium of known circulation, but of good business character, at standard rates.

Cleverness, trickery, veiled or unveiled deception, exaggeration, freakishness and all other artifices are the relics of the primitive and experimental days of advertising, are not sound practice and in the long run decrease the best results from the expenditure of any advertising appropriation.

For precisely the same reason, when advertisers stop harassing the advertising manager with—

"Bill Jones' ad was over mine this morning and mine was ruled."

"Nobody saw my ad today, because it was on page 18."

"Put my ad tomorrow at the top of the page or leave it out," and begin to talk like this:

"Your paper is wooden and lacks that element of interest as a whole which will make people read it thoroughly. If the paper does not hold the interest of your subscribers absorbingly they are unlikely to read my advertising."

"Your paper is not aggressive enough in its discussions of public questions. I want the paper I advertise in to be a power for public good. I want it to be a factor in the industrial, moral and educational uplift of our community, because I want my advertising to absorb some portion of the editorial prestige of your paper."

"My advertisement this morning was bad typographically. It jarred upon your readers. It was unappealing. Better get some better printers."

"My advertisement today was adjoining that of a quack doctor whose business not only is in a derelict, but whose advertising is unclean. I do not want my advertisement read either before or after his. I am as jealous of the company my advertising keeps as I am of my own personal reputation. Put my advertisement on the cleanest page in your paper."

"My advertising is not pulling properly. I think the copy is not right. Give me your critical opinion of it."

Then will the advertiser and the newspaper be cooperating in the constructive movement both the advertiser and the newspaper as a medium in the essential things that constitute true merit in both.

# Unusual Plays Confuse; Fans Rave at Umps When They Misunderstand Plays

Baseball will make a follow do more foolish than any other game on this point, just take a seat in the bleachers and witness a highly exciting game in progress and you will soon be convinced. REAL ESTATE TALK BY ADAIR

TIMES have changed in Atlanta since Jonathan Downes located a saw mill at the crossroads where in 1842 the National Bank building now stands. Lately we met no expensive lots as it is now you could have bought a land lot of 200 1/2 acres a few years ago for \$100. In fact, you could at \$10 an acre and land lot contain all the frontage of Peachtree, from Peachtree to Leon Avenue, just about a year ago you could have bought a lot on the corner of Peachtree and North Avenue for \$100. It is doubtful if any city in the United States can make such a simple little transaction show.

Suppose that in the crowd which gathered on the Georgia Terrace, you had over acres from the annual, some bold speculators had predicted that land would some day sell at \$10,000 a front foot. You would have been right. Some have thought of such a prediction has land in Atlanta ever brought six, ten a foot? Some of it would bring that size quick if the owners would sell. Several small little uptown corners which were bought for \$100 a lot a few days in the year, one trouble about getting a property is that you get it from the people who own it to name a deal. The Georgia Terrace is one of the main thoroughfares in Atlanta. (Whitehall and Peachtree streets) going from Trinity Avenue to Harris Street, and it is doubtful if there is a single lot offered for sale. You would have a lot of property in the hands of the owner, any one single piece of land of this size and in such a location would say: "I do not care to sell."

At this time frontage on the blocks in the vicinity of Ellis and Cain streets ranged from \$1,000 to \$1,000 a foot. Now, values range around \$2,000 to \$4,000 a foot. To get an idea of the corresponding change in value of property in the city, let us take the case of the 20th Street section as an example. This section was sold at \$100 to \$200; the same lot now brings \$2,000 to \$4,000. The same sections will not go up in the same ratio in the same advance. The land is sold by bulk, and other sections will follow the same advance. The reason hence lots that are now selling at \$100 to \$200 will be bringing \$2,000 to \$4,000.

This brings up a law in real estate that is apparently paradoxical. The amount of high-priced property constantly increases in quantity; the amount of low-priced property constantly decreases in quantity. This paradoxical law of real estate operates in favor of the small investor who deals in cheap land. Right now the small investor is in good shape. For a long time the central speculator has been buying the central speculator one couplet of central property, the one that can be relied on to rent every month of the year, these are now in demand. Certainty of income, that makes certainty of gross profit, is much sought after at the present moment. The man who owns such a rental property, who looks back at his rental property and sees that it has been a long term of years his investment, he is in a position to sell, he is loath to part with it.

This is a bigger city than any one ever expected it to be; its growth is the result of the fact that it is a city to those who expect much. For several months real estate has been quiet, and it seemed like a favorable time to buy. The central speculator of land is in a position to buy. Many of the old owners of property are now on our doorstep for certain particular parcels of land. We have been waiting about it all is the tranquility of our mind. We have been waiting for a chance to buy. We have been ready in case anything dropped, but nothing has happened.
