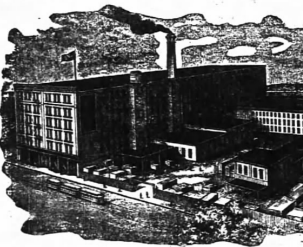

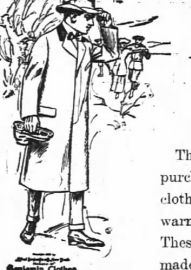

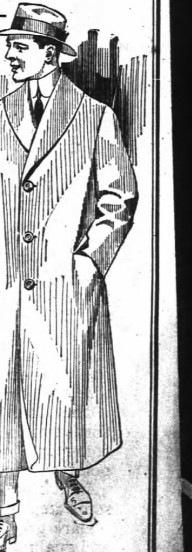

THE PRESIDENTIAL PRIMARY.

The Houston Daily Post, edited by Colonel R. M. Johnston, sees a tangible menace to the civil and political rights of the south in President Wilson's proposed presidential primary.

The Post analyzes the strength of the south and the doubtful states under the present system, and estimates the revolutionary changes that may legitimately be expected to attend the inauguration of a popular primary pure and simple.

The possibility outlined by Colonel Johnston are well worth the consideration not only of the south, but equally of the nation. The Post points out that a method which selects the southern candidate by weight of voting strength alone and nullify any preference expressed by the combined ballots of the so-called "old south."

We do not regard the question as so much one of sentiment, which is the view taken by the Post, as of justice and wisdom. It is true that the southern solidarity is the force that virtually kept the south in the democratic organization since the civil war.

Much more compelling are the considerations of right and expediency. The Constitution has many times defended the cause of the unit system in Georgia for the very virtues of the jeopardizing of which the Post now protests.

Comment of this nature is, of course, tentative and based on the assumption that presidential primaries would work out in practice as the Post sees them now work in theory. It would be impossible to devise a method that would embody the principle sought without carrying with it the menace to which we have called attention.

The question resolves itself into one of doubt, as the Constitution declared in comment on the president's message, as to the efficacy of direct or representative democracy, such as is embodied in the presidential primary idea. We have been drifting at rather a stiff pace away from the old checks and balances of the constitution, and the burden of proof as to the compensating benefits is still upon those who would carry the process yet farther.

A BULL FIGHT V. POLITICS.

Recent Associated Press reports from Mexico City shed light on the Latino-American temperament and on the apathetic indifference which the people have come to regard the same course of Huerta: On one and the same day, and the Mexicans generally choose Sunday on which to attend and frequent the bull fights.

The report runs that the people stayed away from the polls, religiously. Around the bull-box voters were scarce as hen's teeth, and the sellers were kept raving and rolling cigarettes all day.

A very different scene transpired at the bull ring. The arena accommodates 25,000 people. It was crowded to capacity, with spectators thronging the galleries and clinging to the roof. No one went home until the last bull met his coup de grace, and then the big assembly dispersed in numerous cheerless files, as though its rebels were not slowly creeping forward only a few hundred miles away.

All of which means that the people of Mexico City at the moment are not so much in his true worth and have decided that it is useless to participate in any more of his political experiments. They reason that if they vote toward the reelection of Huerta, their votes will hardly be expressed in action. So they refrain from utility and proceed to enjoy themselves after their own fashion, which is the fashion of the people.

LABOR AND OGLETHORPE.

Organized labor in Atlanta has set a characteristic example to the city generally in its attitude toward the founding of Oglethorpe university. At its recent meeting the Atlanta Typographical union subscribed \$100 to the fund, in addition to the \$100 contributed by the other members.

Progress made toward the completion of the Oglethorpe fund last week was truly phenomenal. The work of the current week should see the work brought well on toward completion. It is the "Atlanta spirit" that is at work here, and the "Atlanta spirit" is not a mere slogan, but a genuine force that is spreading and profitable nature.

INEFFICIENT MACHINERY.

The house committee appointed to investigate President Wilson's charges of an "invisible government" will soon render its report. One of the chief objects of interest in the report will be the recommendations that many of the house rules of procedure, especially as they relate to technicalities and trivialities, be amended.

Just following the inauguration, last spring, congress was called in extra session to consider two measures, tariff and currency. A abundance of material for work in both directions was already at hand. The democrats had previously revised the tariff, and were intimately familiar with the ground over which they were called to tread.

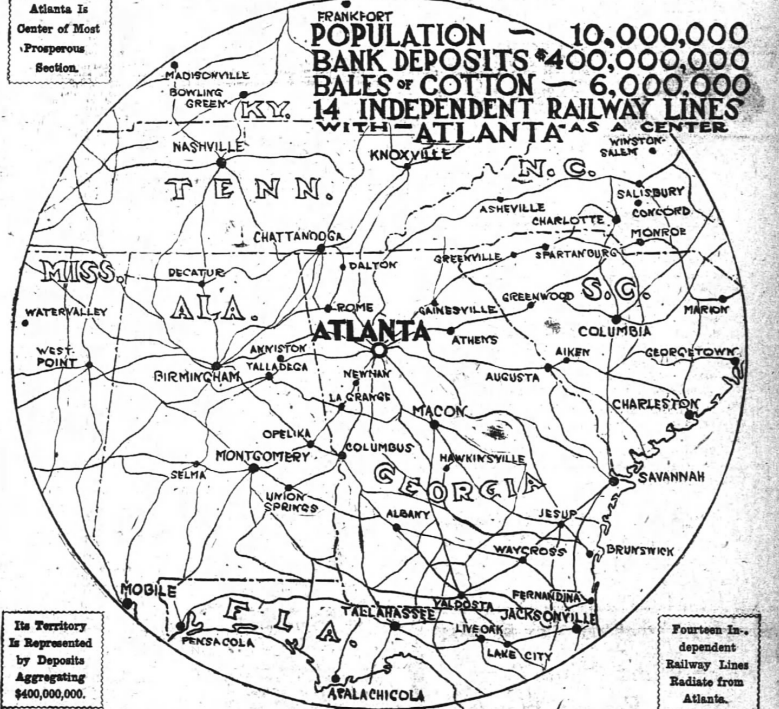
