REPUBLICANS TO FIGHT TO CAPTURE THE HOUSE

Washington, December 9.—Republicans are expected to have in motion in Washington in a few days the battle for the capture of the house of representatives in the election of next November. The quarters have been engaged and will be held in the city under the direction of Secretary John Beverman. Conference of republican representatives of several states are now in progress here. When the national congressional committee meets Friday the details of the campaign to be waged in "house" states will have fairly well determined. New York, December 9.—An audience providing for the payment by the city of 10 cents a day to the wives or dependents of men sent to the workhouse for non-support of their families, failed of passage in the board of aldermen today. The measure received thirty-three affirmative votes, seven less than the number required to make it effective. Alderman John D. Griffin also led the opposition to the ordinance, characterized it as a "social cure-all" and the professional politician. He said: "Republicans plan our future before our eyes. They want to see us as a nation all our lives this paternalism with its 10 cents and a cup of soup or present the term. I will substitute pension. There are many instances of much unnecessary suffering, gross inequality, paupering, discontents, but government charity is not the antidote."

LIBEL SUIT SETTLED BY FRANK A. MUNSEY

London, December 9.—A libel suit brought by the Grand Duke Boris of Russia against the Frank A. Munsey company was settled today out of court. The grand duke will appear on the witness stand on December 18 and give evidence to clear his character. The case arose out of an article describing the grand duke's career in Manchuria during the Russo-Japanese war and his relations with General Kurapatkin, the Russian commandant. The article, published in the prominent national politician, acting as counsel for the grand duke, asked the judge to set a day for the grand duke to appear and give evidence. He said the case would have involved the calling of an immense number of witnesses in order to avoid this the parties had discussed the matter of court and had reached a settlement.

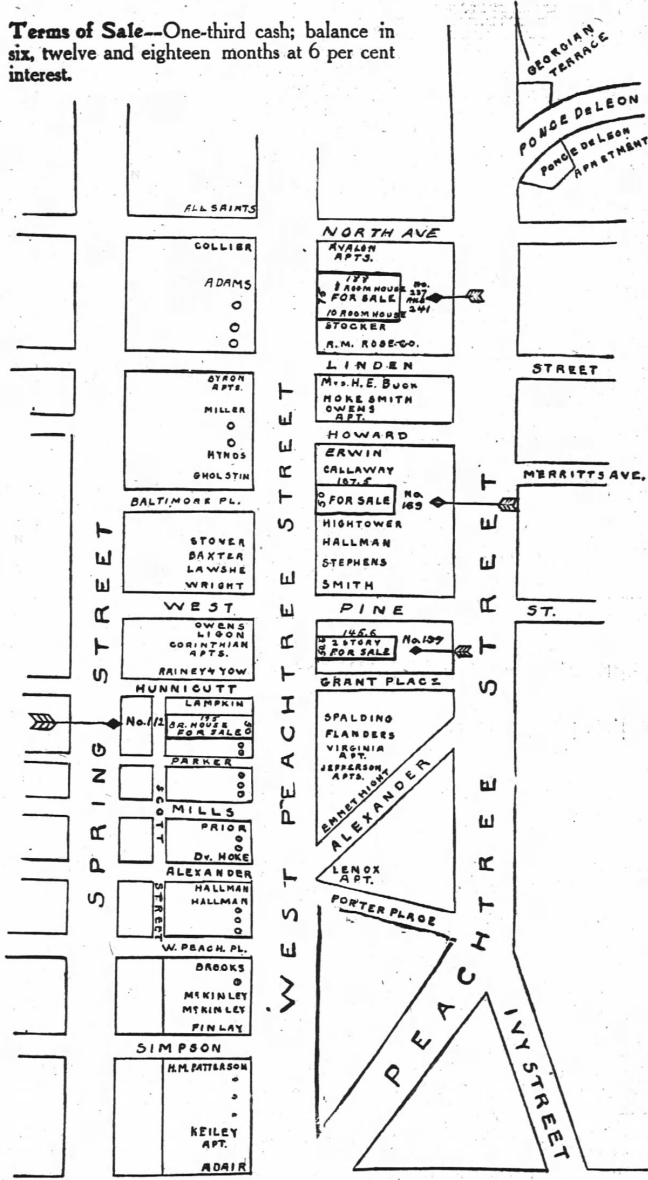
