Rear Admiral Fletcher was prepared to land his marines if it were absolutely necessary to save the lives of the crew of the Louisiana.

REBELS DRAWN FROM TAMPICO BY GUNBOAT FIRE

Huerta's Little Warships Steamed Up the River and With Machine Guns Mowed Down the Rebels.

Mexico City, December 14.—The rebels have all but abandoned Tampico and have withdrawn some distance from the city. Official messages reaching here today fully corroborate the war office report of the rebel defeat yesterday. In a result of the battle and sustained bombardment by two federal gunboats and field artillery. They do not, however, intend to retreat.

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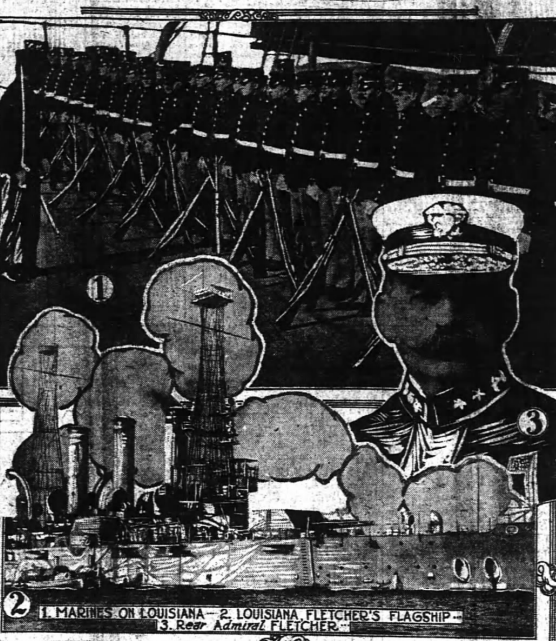

CURRENCY NOTE NEXT SATURDAY

Democratic Leaders in Senate See End of the Money Fight—Much Important Legislation Before House

Washington, December 14.—The struggle over currency reform is expected to come to an end in the senate next Saturday. Administration leaders who have been exerting every effort to enact into law before January 1, the second great plank of the democratic platform, were confident tonight that an agreement could be reached that would permit a final vote in the senate by a clock Saturday.

Republican senators who have been opposing the measure probably will come to an understanding with the majority leaders tomorrow. The democrats are anxious to close general debate tomorrow, and to devote the balance of the time to the consideration of amendments to the bill. If the final vote can be taken Saturday, it is believed the differences between senate and house can be adjusted and the bill sent to President Wilson for signature before Christmas.

Republican criticism of the measure probably will demand some change in it as a condition to giving their consent to a definite time for a vote. It is considered doubtful whether the many republican object, can be taken out of the measure, but one of the things that will be made to eliminate that provision which authorizes the creation of the proposed new treasury notes either in gold or silver.

Legislation in House

The house has lost sight of the currency bill in the press of new legislation. The committee on currency has reported changes in the railroad laws, a comprehensive consideration of the question, and a resumption of the fight over a literacy test for immigrants.

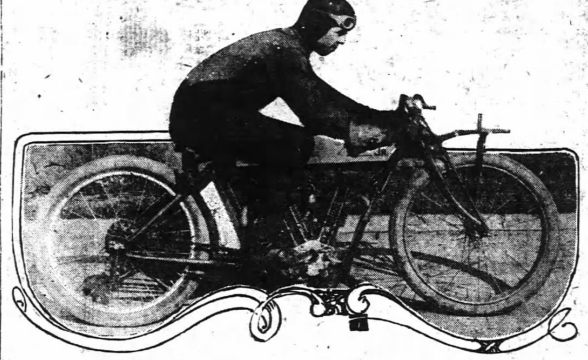

FREE FOOD SWELLING TOTAL OF U. S. IMPORTS

Removal of Tariff, Seems to Have Opened New Supplies of Foodstuffs.

Washington, December 14.—Foodstuffs coming in free of duty under the new tariff bill are swelling the total of imports into the United States. Increase in exports and decrease in imports for the first four months of the present fiscal year, as compared with the same period last year, was shown in statistics made public today by the department of commerce.

Exports this year have amounted to \$181,948,525, against \$174,941,737 for the first four months last year. The imports have been \$158,677,922, against \$162,430,387.

There can be no inference drawn from these hard facts, said Secretary Redfield, "that is not both encouraging and complimentary to American industry. The flooding of our markets with allied cheap wares of foreign origin has not happened. On the other hand, the world of exports has expanded and the world of imports has contracted in a large proportion. The tariff has not been removed or reduced by the new tariff law."

New Supplies of Food. It is of course, much too soon to state any definite results under the new tariff, but it is well to open new supplies of food, that unquestionably has been a result.

Wheat, which was not a free duty, the number imported in October was 12,675 against 27,694 in October, 1912, and of wheat, the number was 15,000, against 14,400 in October, 1912. Imports during October were 1,677,441 pounds, against 1,517,000 in October, 1912.

Two important articles of food—potatoes and wheat and its products—were transferred to the free list, remain dutiable at the same rate. Reduced rates, when imported from countries which impose a duty on articles coming from the United States, the special rate of duty became on wheat, 10 cents per bushel instead of 25 cents under the former law.

Imports of wheat in October, 1912, were 23,237 bushels, against 2,221 bushels in October of last year, and of potatoes, 47,202 bushels, against 2,441 bushels, in October of last year.

GERMAN PEACE LOVERS FOR "NAVAL HOLIDAY"

They Hope United States Will Take Initiative for a Reduction of Armaments.

Berlin, December 14.—The large majority by which the "naval holiday" resolution passed the American house of representatives has attracted interest and favorable comment from peace lovers in Germany, and the attitude of the United States on the proposal that international naval construction be discontinued for one year is regarded as of possible far-reaching influence.

The question just now is at a standstill, so far as Great Britain and Germany are concerned. The American initiative at this juncture would have been a great help in the opinion of certain German naval officers. Unlike the proposal of the American house of representatives, the suggestion from a neutral nation to discontinue building battleships for twelve months would be open to discussion of hostile intent. Addressed to all nations, it would avoid one of the serious objections to the British plan, which is that it would be a unilateral act.

It need contain no "loopholes" such as the exception allowing England to build battleships for Mediterranean service, and to accept three Canadian battleships of their own design, or other matters. They were observing the naval treaty. The American proposal, if made, it is pointed out, should be worded so clearly as to leave no room for misunderstanding. It should be based on the construction of a common sense, and not on the desire to provide for accelerated construction in following years.

GREAT BRITAIN FEARS REBELLION IN INDIA

Treatment of East Indians in South Africa Has Roused a Storm.

London, December 14.—The British and Indian governments are seriously concerned over recent occurrences in South Africa arising out of what the East Indians consider discriminatory legislation against them. An effort is being made to minimize the seriousness of the situation which was accompanied by a general strike of thousands of East Indians in Natal and in which several were killed. The government's influence has been sufficient to induce the press of the country to print only favorable news and comments while a careful supervision of news in regard to the suppression of disturbances in South Africa is made before its appearance in the Indian papers.

Trying to Quiet Situation. Viscount Harding, viceroy of India, tried to pour oil on the troubled waters by expressing his sympathy with the East Indian leaders and asking for a thorough investigation of the industrial situation in the Transvaal. The secretary of state for India, has likewise expressed his sympathy. At this, however, has not had much effect on the Indians, as they are on those living in the British India.
