

SEVEN MANAGERS OF LOCKER CLUBS

Police Charge Violations of City Law Prohibiting the Sale of Liquor to Non-Members of Clubs.

RELEASE IS GIVEN ON BONDS OF \$300 EACH

"No War on Locker Clubs," Says Beavers—Managers Enter Vigorous Denial. Will Fight Cases Today.

After ten days of investigation, detectives under the direction of Chief Newport Lanford and Chief of Police Beavers on Monday afternoon raided seven of the better-known "locker clubs" in the downtown district, took the superintendents to police barracks and after making cases against them released them on bonds of \$300 each.

The following are the names of the superintendents of clubs and their establishments which were raided: C. E. Butts, Central club; C. A. Morris, T. M. A. R. Smith, Metropolitan; H. B. Smith, Theatrical; W. M. Wolpert, Owl; H. R. Pitts, Beavers' and S. R. Greig, Eagles'.

Following the raids, Chief Newport Lanford said: "The raids are the result of investigation on the part of Detectives Moon and Patrick, which have been in progress for over a week. These men went to every club in the downtown district and through outsiders, sought out the law breakers—the clubs where whiskey was being sold to non-members. The arrests made yesterday are the result of those investigations."

Chief of Police Beavers said that the arrests had no "war" on the locker clubs, but were just the outcome of his general order to the locker club agents to the detective department to look into alleged violations of the prohibition law. "The detectives got sufficient evidence to warrant the raids and we made them," he said.

It was rumored that the police have held the evidence for several days, but did not act, as they declared that they wished to wait until the morning before taking action.

Chief of County Police George Mathison declared last Monday that he was not made aware of the action of the police in raiding the locker clubs until after the officers had acted.

"My department stays out of the city as much as possible," declared Chief Mathison, "as the police are to take care of that. I did not know the raids were to take place until after the men had all been arrested."

The seven superintendents taken into custody late Monday will be heard in court before Recorder Broyles Tuesday.

Managers Enter Denial. When seen last night, officials of the clubs under investigation declared that persons other than club members had been served with drinks, they did not know of it. All they say they have violated any law, and say that they do not intend to pay the fines for the liquor to persons who were not club members.

Attorneys have been obtained by all the accused, and the charge will be fought to a finish.

RAID ON ALLEGED BLIND TIGER FOLLOWS. That the activities of the police against the illicit sale of liquor will not stop with the operations alleged against locker clubs was demonstrated Monday night when what is alleged to have been a well-organized liquor-selling establishment, using the Forsyth hotel, at 50 1/2 South Forsyth street, as headquarters, was broken up by the arrest of three men.

TROOPS ON GUARD TO SAVE NEGROES

FROM JUDGE RICH ENRAGED CITIZENS ARE RUSHING TO WAYNESBORO ON AVENGING THE BRUTAL MURDER OF MRS. IRBY.

NEGROES SURROUNDED BY A BAYONET CORDON

Martial Law Is in Force in Waynesboro—Crowds of Men Reported to Be Approaching the Town.

Augusta, Ga., December 16.—(Special.)—At 1:20 this morning a telephone call from Waynesboro stated that the town had been placed under martial law in an effort to protect the three negroes accused of murdering Mrs. Irby. Soldiers have been stationed on all the roads leading into Waynesboro to stop country men from entering the town.

A party from Louisville and another from Wrens were stopped about a mile from the jail and disarmed by the militia. It is rumored that nearly 400 men left Wrens about 1 o'clock for Waynesboro.

The prisoners have been removed from the jail building proper, and are now in possession of the militia, under strong guard.

Waynesboro, Ga., December 16.—(Special.)—Three negroes from Jefferson county, charged with the brutal murder of a farmer's wife, are in jail at this place, under guard of the local military company, which was called out by Governor Slaton when it became apparent that unless this action was taken the negroes would meet violence at the hands of the infuriated men who were pouring into the town.

The negroes are Robert Paschal, Sam Irby and a third whose name is not known. They were brought to Waynesboro this afternoon from Louisville by the sheriff of Jefferson county, who slipped away from a mob which was bent upon lynching the three men.

Feeling Very Bitter. "I was thought that they were to be sent to the Burke county jail, but stories of the unusual brutal nature of the charges, brought in after the arrival of the sheriff and his prisoners, led to threats of violence, which caused the local officers to try to spirit the negroes to Augusta in an automobile. When it was seen that it would be impossible to get through to Augusta in safety, the negroes were accordingly rushed back to the jail and the governor wired to call the militia.

The local company got to the jail in record time, as the building was already surrounded by an angry crowd of Jefferson county, where the crime was committed.

At midnight the negroes are in the jail with a large number of men around the building. Although the town is crowded with a threatening crowd, no rioting is anticipated, as stringent methods to prevent violence have been adopted. All parties from Jefferson county are being stopped before they reach Waynesboro.

Crime of the Negroes. The crime with which the negroes are charged was committed yesterday afternoon above Wrens. Near the black-and-white line, when three negroes, whose names are not known, attacked a white woman, and beat her on her shoulders and beat it into a jelly.

When Irby returned home from a field he had made to a neighbor near by he found his family of small children, and a white woman, who was nearly dead, the headless body of his wife lying on the ground. The woman, identified as Mrs. Irby, she refused to pay him and his wife.

DAMN, DAMN SONG BANNED BY WILSON

Resident Orders Probe of Carabao Satires and Travesties, and Withdraws From Membership.

RIDICULE WAS HEAPED ON SECRETARY BRYAN

In Fact, Entire Peace Policy of the Administration Was Jeered At by Army and Navy Officers at Banquet.

Washington, December 15.—President Wilson tonight formally withdrew his recent acceptance of honorary membership in the military order of the Carabao composed of regular and volunteer officers of the army and navy who served in the Philippine Islands during the four years preceding the Spanish-American war.

The incident first came to the president's attention when he read accounts of it in the newspapers. Through his secretary he communicated with various members of the cabinet, expressing his indignation that the Carabao should have dared to sing songs containing profane epithets toward the army and navy circles in the United States supreme court, many members of congress and hundreds of army and navy officers.

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Secretary Daniels and Garrison called on Rear Admiral Thomas T. Howland, U. S. N., and Major General James A. Hays, U. S. A., the two highest officers of the Carabao, for an explanation. They promised to give the information desired, but they would not discuss the incident for publication.

Secretary Daniels at the same time declined the presidency of the order which he was elected last Thursday. "Damn, damn the insurrection," he declared, "and damn the Carabao. I never will sing damn the Carabao while I live."

The president expressed his indignation to members of his cabinet after he had read accounts of the banquet. He felt particularly displeased with the Carabao because of its administration's peace policy and criticism of the military order of the Carabao. Three six-foot models of battleships were on the table, and were carried into the banquet room. In the middle of the guns were stuck rosemary, and while a dove was perched on each fighting top. 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# HUERTA TO ROLE AS HE PLEASES

### Congress Adjourns After Granting Huerta Dictatorial Powers—Congress to Meet Again Next April.

Mexico City, December 15.—From now until April 2, President Huerta will be obliged to conduct the government without congress, as that special body created organization was formally adjourned today. Its most important acts during the session were the ratification of the president's assumption of power over the various departments of the government after dissolving the preceding congress, and restricting to the president this same power, which gives General Huerta, until congress convenes again, practically the sway of a dictator.

Although the new congress was unopposed, interfering not at all with the executive's idea of government, the most notable act, aside from those already mentioned, was the ratification of a constitution to be signed by the executive, which would give the president power to construct 5,000 miles of narrow gauge railways.

## Southern League Season Opens April 15; Schedule Committee Named--Atlanta Gets Holiday Dates--Spring Meet at Mobile

By Dick Jensen.  
The Southern league season of 1914 will open on Wednesday, April 15. The schedule committee has been instructed to draft two schedules, one calling for 149 games and the other for 144. They were further instructed to submit these schedules to the league meeting in the spring, in which time will come the decision to keep the playing season the same length or to increase it.

Secretary Colson, of the Mobile club, invited the moguls to meet in the spring at Mobile and the invitation was accepted by the directors. The tentative date of between February 15 and 22 was set.

The schedule committee appointed to draft the playing dates was the same as appointed last season. Charles Frank, of New Orleans, president of the Mobile, and O. H. Andrews, of Chattanooga, chairman of the Atlanta, are ex-officio members.

**Atlanta Gets Holiday.**  
The holidays were awarded to Atlanta, Birmingham, Chattanooga and Memphis, the last named team getting the place of Nashville, who had the place last season.

These dates, July 4 and Labor day, were only during the season where the receipts are made. It was decided that the home cities should be given five days each on these days before any of the receipts were turned into the common pot.

The league was reconstituted at the suggestion of Mr. Colson, a member of the committee who suggested that by so doing much mileage could be saved by the non-playing and the Sunday, Christmas being gained.

The league was divided into north and south. Atlanta, Chattanooga, Memphis and Nashville comprising the northern division, and New Orleans, Mobile, Birmingham and Montgomery the southern.

**Pennant to Cracker.**  
The pennant was to be awarded to Atlanta at the afternoon meeting, at which time it was stated the report that the rag had been chewed up by the office building at Little Rock was erroneous.

The delegates at the meeting and the cities they represented were as follows: Frank E. Callaway, Jacksonville; Nunnally, A. Ryan and W. A. Smith, Birmingham; R. H. Haugh and W. D. Smith, Chattanooga; O. H. Andrews, Montgomery; C. P. Wilcox and Hobbs, Memphis; C. Z. Colson and Briscoe, Lord.

**Officers Elected.**  
At the afternoon session the election of officers was held. Judge W. M. Kavanaugh, who has been with the league since its organization, was unanimously re-elected president.

Secretary-treasurer. The moguls all paid Judge Kavanaugh a high compliment. Mr. Colson, of Memphis, was for giving him for a term of five years, but the other managers opposed it on the ground that it would deprive them of the pleasure of electing him year after year—a pleasure which they sought.

Capital W. C. Craven, of Shreveport, was unanimously elected vice president of the league. The president of the previous season was re-elected, and this was given to Charles Frank, of New Orleans.

Callaway, of the local club, made the nomination, and in doing so stated that it was generally understood that Mr. Frank would be connected with the league next season, and that the league could not afford to be without his advice and experience.

This announcement puts to an end the season of 1913.

The New Orleans and of the league, Frank will represent the Cleveland club to the south, as was believed that he would, and the New Orleans club will probably purchase some players and name themselves president and Dobbins manager.

A. J. Heinemann, of New Orleans, chairman, Frank E. Callaway, of Atlanta, and C. P. Wilcox, of Montgomery.

**Dixie League Demands.**  
Montgomery and Hood, representing the Dixie league, addressed before the directors at the morning session and laid the plans of the Dixie league before them.

The Dixie league moguls want to share the use of the grounds of the Southern league, but do not want to commence playing until the season of 1914.

The matter was referred to a committee consisting of President Kavanaugh, Mr. Heinemann, of New Orleans, this committee was instructed to take the matter and report at the Mobile meeting.

The Dixie moguls were also instructed to have their representatives at the Mobile meeting.

In the motion of Mr. Hirsch, of Nashville, it was decided to give the Dixie league the use of the grounds of the present franchise being in use in 1913.

The franchise forms were adopted ten years ago to the day in Atlanta when the Dixie league was organized on December 15, 1903. This fact was commended.

**Gambling Feature.**  
The national commission, in a letter to the Southern moguls, said that the Dixie league was being formed and that open gambling was being permitted in the Dixie league.

The matter of clubs in this league was brought up by the Dixie club, which is known as a "blanket" option on the club, that is, permitting the player to have option on every player on the club, either for some time or for some money.

Judge Kavanaugh is opposed to this practice, but the matter after being argued, was carried over until the spring meeting.

**Rose Trophy.**  
W. G. Foster, sporting editor of the Chattanooga Times, representing Joseph Rose, of Chattanooga, presented to the meeting a plan of the latter offering a trophy to the league to be given to the most valuable player in the league.

The trophy will be a handsome diamond studded medal to be known as the Rose Trophy. It will be awarded in a similar manner to the awarding of the Chairman's trophy.

Mr. Foster has been named chairman and will appoint one sporting writer in each of the Dixie clubs.

Each member of the commission will vote for the most valuable player in the league, and the man getting the greatest number will be awarded the medal.

The Dixie league was organized at the meeting, New Orleans was appointed president, and the Dixie league of Mobile, a deal that has been hanging fire for some time.

**Handsome Banquet.**  
An elaborate banquet in the banquet room of the Astor hotel last night brought the session to a close and the moguls will leave for their homes this morning.

This banquet was given by the directors of the Atlanta baseball association.

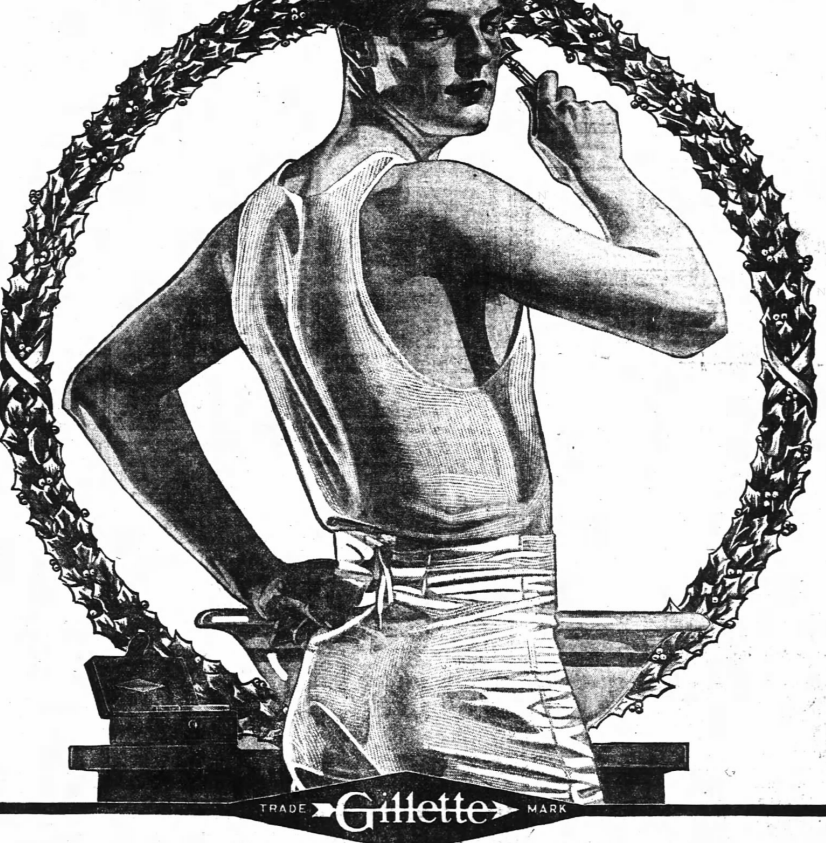
