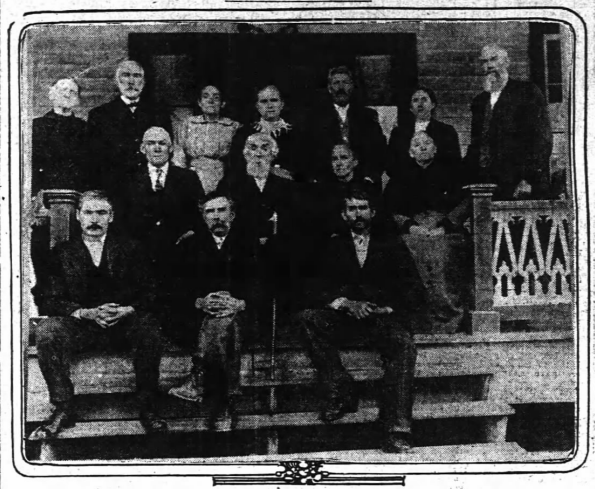

GIFTS *that were made* from a yard of DRESDEN RIBBON.



HERE are many things that can be made without a great deal of time or money being expended on them. There is always an added charm when they have been made by the giver.

In selecting materials for these gifts, it is well worth while to consider the appropriateness of the gift.

The Dresden ribbon is exquisitely dainty, and comes in many different patterns. These can be utilized in a number of ways. The following suggestions will be found both practical and pretty.

The charm of one's personality is greatly enhanced by just a touch of sachet. It may be enclosed in little bags of some pretty silk. The sachet is sprinkled through soft cotton, then enclosed in the silk, and finally tied in little bundles, with a corresponding shade of ribbon. This is to be used in the bureau.

The hand bag is made of rose splashed ribbon, gathered into a big ruff at the neck, in quaint points. This may be filled with vanity articles or sewing.

Another charming gift that is useful in many ways, is made from striped rose ribbon. The effect is flat, being gathered only where it folds over the hoops, and it is finished by an extra row of shirring. The hoops are of white bone and oval in shape.

The narrow bag which is shirred at the edges and tied in a ruffle at the top, is a corset holder. Ribbon with a rose design in narrow spray is used.

Pins are always necessary in every household. For this purpose a round flat pin-ball is made of cardboard and covered with striped ribbon. Tiny bows of ribbon are tied at the side, rosette fashion, from which a loop extends that it may be hung up. There is another rosette at the lower edge. From this is suspended three lengths of ribbon, to which are fastened small bone rings, intended to hold safety pins.

A fascinating little arrangement for baby's basket, is a wee pin chair, modeled in cardboard, and tufted with cotton. This is covered with ribbon of dainty design, having a ruffle at the base, and a tiny bow of ribbon in the front. The pins are arranged along the sides and back.

Slippers are always acceptable at Christmas. A comfortable as well as a pretty pair may be made from this same Dresden ribbon. These are heel-less, with the front covered to keep the toes warm. The ribbon is stitched to the leather sole. The pattern of the ribbon may be arranged in a decorative way. The whole effect is finished by a soft tailor-made bow at the top which lies flat.
