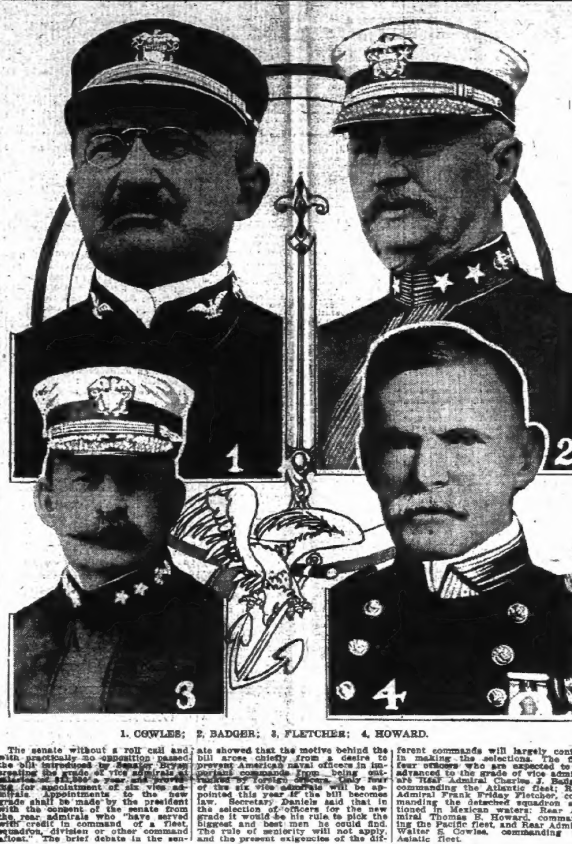

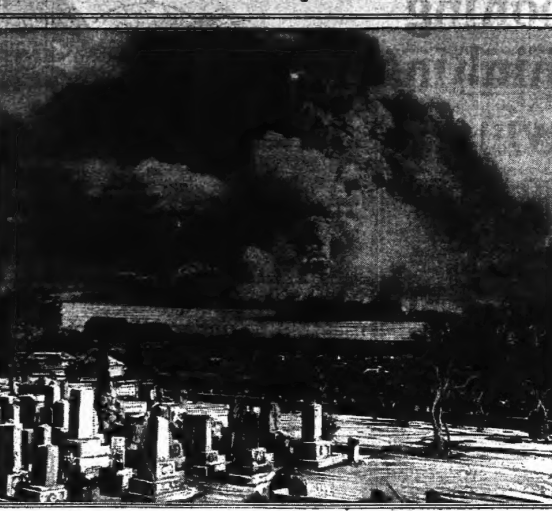

FIGHTER FOR PEACE WILL SPEAK TONIGHT

Norman Angell, English Author and Statesman, Arrives in Atlanta.

Norman Angell, the famous English author and statesman, who is regarded as a successful "war-on-war" throughout civilized Europe and America by means of his effective work in establishing peace societies, arrived in Atlanta Friday afternoon and will deliver his address on "The Relation of Military Power to National Advancement" at the Carnegie library tonight at 8 o'clock.

"Warlike nations do not inherit the earth, as it is popularly supposed; they represent the decaying human element," said Mr. Angell at the Ansley Friday. "The nations of Europe and the world that stand at the top commercially put little figure relatively as a military power."

"The United States is the weakest military power, proportionately, of any other nation on earth, yet has effected purely outside any other nations, regardless of their military power, Americans are too busy to give their attention to military affairs."

"The industrial revolution," said Mr. Angell, "has mainly changed the character of communications, independently of national commerce, industry, and the introduction of modern inventions, the prospect of war between civilized nations has been rendered profoundly and essentially different from the international problems confronting nations 100 years ago. During the next two decades all probability of war among the leading nations of the world will have vanished. Men will have realized that military power is socially and economically futile, and can have no relation to the prosperity of a nation, though I am not prepared that the United States will never again go to war."

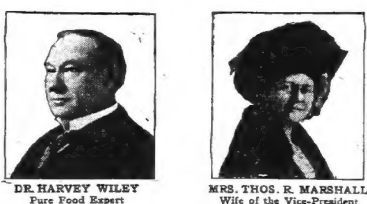

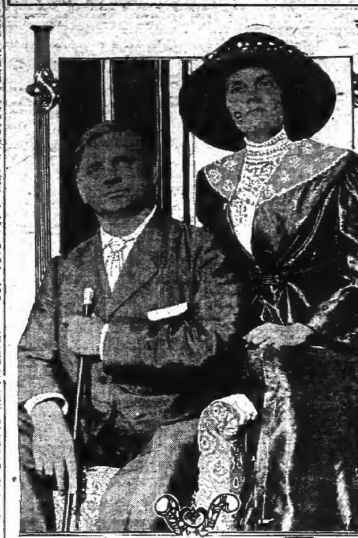
