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# CITY ASSESMENTS

## GAINS \$13,624,117

Final Recapitulation Shows \$130,335.97 More for Realty Values—City's Income for Year Increases \$56,000.

Complete copies of the 1916 recapitulation and the collections in 1916 as the city's aggregate tax, were made public Monday for the first time.

The total realty assessment for 1916, as completed, is \$120,415,516, an increase of \$12,624,117 over the assessment for 1915.

Comptroller Goldsmith's final recapitulation of tax collections from all sources shows that the total tax given in by the tax assessors amounted to \$130,335.97, while the tax collector's books show that only \$116,711.80 was collected during the entire year. The difference was made in installments as follows:

First installment, \$88,428.42; second, \$22,214.44; third, \$12,025.12; and fourth (railroad tax), \$13,624.12.

**ROADS IN DEFALT.**  
Of the total tax given in for 1916, only \$10,912.16 in default, and \$22,818.18 is assessed against corporations. The total tax given in by the assessors in 1916 is \$120,415,516, an increase of \$12,624,117 over the assessment for 1915.

Comptroller General Wright filed his assessment statement with the city. It shows the aggregate tax, franchise tax and assessment against personal property of all corporations doing business in the city. The aggregate tax against the city's largest corporations is:

The Issue a Moral One.

It was wholly appropriate that Dr. John E. White, of the Second Baptist church, should have selected a plea for the repeal of the infamous Panama canal toll exemption as the theme for his Sunday night sermon.

As he plainly stated, the issue involved is sheerly one of honor, of morality, with politics not entering remotely into it.

To put a parallel case: Assume that the United States had had international rights at Stus.

Assume that it would have been to her advantage to at least partially control a waterway through that locality.

Assume that, by reason of location, she recognized England's prior claim.

Assume that to safeguard her rights and simultaneously observe international comity, she had waived claims at Stus, given England right-of-way, stipulating only that in the canal to built there should be no discrimination in the matter of tolls.

That is precisely what happened at Panama.

We had the prior right of location and there was the immutable Monroe doctrine.

England has, and had, commercial supremacy, laudable and legitimate, in Central and South America.

A canal would facilitate these ambitions. She could have commanded the capital to build it.

But recognizing the comity of the situation she relinquished her rights in the Panama canal, to be outraged at the United States an "outrage among nations."

England has a free hand with the understanding there should be no preferential treatment in the matter of tolls.

The United States would have been in arms had England violated a hypothetical agreement of the sort outlined at Stus.

England has cause to be outraged at the United States for a "outrage among nations" made governing Panama.

What is less excusable is that we are profiting our shipping nothing.

Already it is protected, in the coast-wise sense, against international competition.

The crutch now conferred on it is a gratuity, a subsidy, pure and simple.

Ministers of the gospel will may protest against violation of the nation's honor.

Statements of every party, will may allege themselves as a Senator Lodge says, make the United States an "outrage among nations."

President Wilson has righteously demanded a repeal of the indefensible free tolls provision.

The quicker congress meets his views, the quicker will the nation be extricated from a position which may result in shame and dishonor.

Anderson, an abolitionist, who has just returned from the excavations at Babylon; Dr. George H. Stearns, and many others.

The hope of the association, which opens its doors to all, is that it will be a large crowd is drawn to Atlanta by this year as in past years.

Hancock, Mich., February 23.—Eighteen national guardsmen on duty in the copper center during the last days of the mine workers' strike in this center of attack today in the testimony offered before the congressional investigating committee.
