### WAGON MERCHANT KILLED BY CLERK

### S. L. McWilliams Shot Dead in Store by Jesse Cooner. Cooner Says His Life Was Threatened.

March 6, November 15.—S. L. McWilliams, 61 years old, prominent merchant and president of the McWilliams-Bankly company, was shot and killed at 11 o'clock tonight by Jesse Cooner, one of his clerks.

The two men quarreled and Cooner announced that he was going to quit the store and take a revolver and come back and shoot McWilliams. The latter, however, did not believe Cooner's threat and gave him no heed. A few minutes later, he said, McWilliams put the gun up, and Cooner, who was standing in the store, where he had a gun in his own coat. Taking it out, Cooner said he walked to the front of the store, and without further ado shot his employer. McWilliams was 51 years of age, and had been in business for forty-four years. He leaves a wife and daughter, Miss Olive, who resides at 512 Pine street.

Young Cooner has been in the employ of the firm four years, coming here from Fort Valley. He was considered a valuable man, and the details of the business was left in his care.

### TITLE TO LAKEWOOD CLEAR, SAYS MAYOR

Atlanta's title to Lakewood Park, a tract of 388 acres worth approximately \$100,000, is clear according to a record which was unearthed by Mayor James G. Woodward, Saturday morning.

Among the old papers in the possession of the Trust Company of Georgia there is a deed executed by N. B. Hardin, the original owner of a parcel of the land, to A. J. Appling. Hardin transferred the entire tract of 135 acres to Appling, and in the deed it is specifically set forth that the tract was not included in 11 1/4 acres which the city acquired in 1873.

Mayor Woodward's attention was directed to the deed by John E. McDonald, trust officer of the Georgia Trust Company, in a letter to the mayor, made of the transaction on Monday.

Believes It Will Quash Claims.

According to Mayor Woodward, the deed will have the effect of quashing the claim of Mrs. Mary L. Hardin and other heirs of N. B. Hardin.

Through their attorney, Colonel Howell Erwin, the heirs made a demand on the city to restore twelve acres of the Lakewood tract. They contended that in the year 1872 the city acquired, through condemnation proceedings, twelve acres of the tract by paying Hardin \$1500 for it. Attorney Erwin, in setting forth the claim of the city, declared that at that time the city acquired the property it was specifically intended for the use of the tract for waterworks purposes and that when the city abandoned the project and moved the waterworks to the Chattahoochee river it forfeited its right to the tract.

Mayor Woodward stated Saturday that the deed in the possession of the Trust Company of Georgia, will settle the dispute forever, and that it will annul the claim for the restoration of the property or its approximate worth, \$15,000.

The deed, as I understand it, shows plainly that in 1878, five years after the city had acquired the tract, it was transferred to the city by the deed which it states, was formerly transferred to the city by the deed which it states, the Hardin heirs have no claim whatever on any part of the tract of 135 acres in which the twelve acres now sought is a part, but that Appling or his heirs have a better claim on the tract than the Hardin heirs, and vests the title to the city with certain exceptions.

Says City Has Title.

City Attorney James L. Mayson says that over in the absence of a deed in the city's possession, he would not be destroyed as a valuable part of the city's records.

### Taft's Faith in Experts Jarred By Recovery of Charles W. Morse

Former President Intimates That He Was "Buncoed" Into Granting a Pardon for the Convicted Banker.

Poststown, Pa., November 15.—Former President Taft, in a lecture tonight at the high school on "The President of the United States—What He Can and Cannot Do," referred to the pardon he granted Charles W. Morse, although he did not mention the name of the New York banker, Mr. Taft, after reviewing the pardoning powers of the president, said:

"I once had two cases before me, in which it was represented to me that the convicts were near death, and I instituted an investigation to find out the truth through the army medical corps. Examinations were made, watches were established over the sick men, and it was reported to me that they were both in the last stages of a fatal disease. One of them died soon after he was released from the penitentiary. Another died in a hospital in excellent health and seeking to re-establish himself in the world in which he committed a penitentiary offense. This shakes one's faith in expert examinations."

### Attendance, Not Census, Controls Funds for School

Supreme Court Holds State Funds May Be Distributed According to Number in School.

By a decision of the supreme court handed down yesterday in the case of Webb et al. trustees, v. Jackson et al., from Hard county, it was decided that the school funds of the state shall be distributed among the school districts of counties according to attendance, and not according to population of school age.

The trustees of the second school district of Hard county disputed the right of the county school board to distribute the money of the state according to attendance, claiming that they should distribute the money according to the total population of school age residing in the district. The court held as follows:

"Where a county has been divided into school districts, pursuant to law, and thereafter the voters of a school district authorize the levy of an additional tax to supplement the funds received from the state public school fund, the appointment of the public school fund by the county board of education is not a part of the creation of the board may be made on a basis of school attendance, such as the receipt of such portion of the public school fund as the school board of that district bears to the school attendance of that district."

### Huerta Attempts to Organize His Substitute Congress, But Only Partly Succeeds—No Quorum in Senate—Deputies Partially Organized—New Congressmen Mostly Army Officers and Hangers-On of the Huerta Regime.

### DRASTIC ACTION BY UNITED STATES EXPECTED BY PEOPLE OF MEXICO CITY

### Trains for Vera Cruz Crowded With Americans and Many Mexicans—Reported United States Will Close Embassy in Mexico City and Land Marines at Vera Cruz—Huerta Urged by Many Leading Mexicans to Yield, But He Seems Resolved to Invite Deposition by Force.

Mexico City, November 15.—President Huerta was unable to bring his new congress fully to life today. The chamber of deputies met and effected temporary organization, but the senate proved reactionary and the lack of a quorum prevented organization.

General Huerta and his friends, however, profess to believe the greater part of their work is done, because the newly created lower house has formally and in their opinion legally met. The senate, they think, can be induced to move into line by Monday, when the senators are summoned to meet again.

### CATHOLIC SENATORS NOT PRESENT.

Long after the hour fixed for the senate to convene today the roll call showed only twenty-one senators present, nearly all of these being priests in the army. Twenty-nine are absent because of a quorum.

None of the Catholic senators was present. This is unusual, as it has been due to an agreement among them that the party should not participate in the senatorial session. These senators are regarded as influential, and their refusal or failure to attend is regarded as indicative of the attitude of the church.

Huerta resolved NOT TO QUIT.

Regardless of rumors, and notwithstanding the insistence of far-sighted friends, General Huerta appeared more determined tonight than at any time during the past week to retain the presidency and carry out his plan of installing a substitute congress.

Huerta reiterated today that he continued the head of the Mexican government, and the fact that he took no step towards preventing the inauguration of the new congress as demanded by the United States was construed at the embassy and the legations as indicative of what may be expected in the future. Representatives from the majority of the foreign governments appeared to believe that General Huerta had brought affairs to such a point that drastic action may be necessitated.

### HUERTA IS GOING AND GOING SOON, WASHINGTON SAYS

Administration Is Convinced That the Mexican Dictator Must Yield to the Pressure Put on Him.

Washington, November 15.—While the financial blockade and the practical certainty that the embargo on arms will be lifted unless Huerta yields, are expected to force Huerta to resign, the United States government is confident that Huerta will not do so.

Neither at the white house nor at the state department was there any disposition to regard seriously the statement issued from the national palace at Mexico City, declaring that "in view of Venustiano Carranza's repudiation of any form of mediation or alliance with the United States, Provisional President Huerta can do no less than join him in his expression of indignation at the attitude of the United States and his indignation at the attitude of the United States."

While on the surface this statement gave the impression that the United States had met with a rebuff in the diplomatic game of both Mexican factions, administration officials conversant with details of the issue stated that it merely was an attempt to meet temporarily the arguments of expediency being urged upon Huerta by close friends.

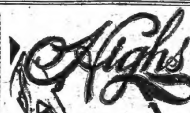

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## SAYS WAR ON MEXICO WOULD LAST 10 YEARS

Representative of M. E. Mission Shows How War Would Be Worst Solution.

Des Moines, Mo., November 15.—(Special.)—War between the United States and Mexico, if begun now, would last ten years, today declared the Hon. J. Butler, of Mexico City, who is here to attend the world gathering of the League of Foreign Missions of the Methodist Episcopal church. Mr. Butler went to Mexico thirty-nine years ago. He has been in the midst of four revolutions, the present one being the fourth.

"We have four revolutions on hand at the present time," said Mr. Butler. "The first is against the former president of Mexico, General Carranza, the second is in Michoacan, the third is against the northwestern states under General Huerta, and the fourth is in the border states under General Carranza."

Whatever may have been said as to the violence by which Huerta rose to power, he came to the presidential chair by constitutional process. Persons and all leaders in the United States are persons of whom we Americans should be proud. I am confident that Huerta is in the means of making us proud. I think that he is honest in his repeated assertion that he will not receive himself as president.

**A Strong Moral Lesson.**  
"The attitude of the American government is a very delicate question. I have no doubt that the American position from the beginning has been that of the right. The American position is a moral lesson. It is a lesson that we have never been taught before. It is a lesson that we are learning now and it is a lesson that we should be proud to be thought of. It would be the duty of the big brother against the little brother, who is already wounded and bleeding, and yet should war continue, would be a very different affair from that of 1847 and 1848.

A declaration of war without doubt would bring all of the four to one in Mexico together. They would put up a brick fight, much more bitter than that of any other war since the first place, Mexico is better prepared for war than ever before.

"Mexico's regular army has been under the drill of General Huerta for the last few years. The government has been quietly importing war materials from Japan and Europe. While the country is said to be on the verge of bankruptcy, in the face of such a considerable number of soldiers being coming and the Mexican army would live on about one-third the cost of the American army.

**Good Work of Missionaries.**  
"Now as to the effect of the prohibition on our missionary work, the territory in which the Methodist Episcopal church operates is in the heart of the republic and the work has been interrupted very little, and this only in the rural districts. The more important cities, in spite of the difficulty we have made, have not been entirely cut off. In these centers our people operate in the field. We believe that these missions will be given a better opportunity towards a better Mexico in years to come. We have in the present time, we also believe that there are many in the simple gospel which we present in the living of our lives, was not in a country that has been so great afflicted the land.

Whatever may be the outcome of the struggle it will not be long until we have a better Mexico and a good for a field for commercial and social efforts such as 'race' and 'faith and generosity of our church'.

**SKIBINSKY REGRETS PUBLICITY GIVEN TO DIVORCE SUIT**

Alexander von Skibinsky, in a statement to 'The Constitution,' expressed regret that the divorce suit filed a few days ago against his wife, Charlotte von Skibinsky, had attracted such prominence in the newspapers. The notice it made perfectly clear that the press articles were not of his own seeking and that he regrets them accordingly.

"I wish to say in reference to the various articles that have appeared about my suit, in other papers than 'The Constitution,' that they are not in entire accord with the facts. The article which has been filed by me in asking a divorce from my wife, Mrs. Skibinsky, in this connection, I wish also to make it clear that I have not given to the newspapers to air my grievances. These publications have been made without my consent, and I wish to make it clear that I have not given even cause to see me about them. My performance would have been to have had the matter aired in the newspapers or in the public in any manner, whatsoever, and I am in no wise responsible for the matter having been given this direction.

TROUBLE CAUSED BY INCOME TAX

Many Problems Arise to Worry Officials Charged With Collecting the Tax. Some Will Escape Tax.

By John Carrigan, Jr. Washington, November 15.—(Spec. Ass.) New phases of the income tax problem are arising daily to perplex officials of the treasury department. It is provided by the experience of England during the last fifty years. It is feared that the income must be collected at the source. This takes in not only the big corporations, but the average business man who pays no other tax. Interest, or salary in excess of \$3,000, or the proceeds of other income and must deduct the tax before making payment. The shortness of time elapsed between the issuance of the income tax regulations and November 1st, the date the new law became effective, added to the confusion in the minds of many of the financial institutions, but many of the difficulties which were responsible from inaugurating the system will disappear after a short time. Large income tax is payable in installments. There will be evasions in this, as in other taxation systems, the man whose income is in stocks and bonds and rents will be taxed, while that part derived from the wages of labor and the fees of professional services may not be taxed. It is conceivable that income from a particular class of property may be overtaxed and leave the recipient of the income to pay only a part of the tax to the collector at the end of the year. Ivy took a big grip and tried to talk, but the only thing he could remember was a rhyme he had learned last week, and so he said it over and over.

"Two hungry boys 'Comin' home at night, 'With an appetite. 'Two cherry pies 'Tis about right, 'Nobod' else 'O'er got a bite!"

That speech did it. One of the delegates to the convention was Joe Elder, who is a prominent citizen of Washington, Ga., and he made up his mind to adopt Ivy and give him a real home to live in. It was fixed up in the next day or two.

A touch of pathos in connection with the story, however, is the fact that Ivy's little brother, George Henderson, who is 3 years old, was also in the band of six orphans that went to Macon, and he is to be adopted by a home. The adoption of Ivy will separate all three of the boys and give them their adoptive father, William Henderson, all three of whom have been in the past year at the Southern Christian home.

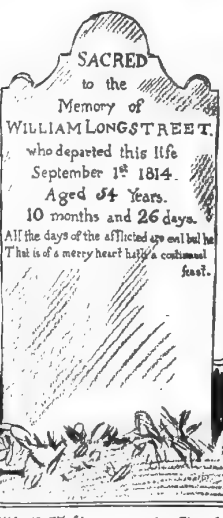

As the United States has from time immemorial exercised the exclusive right of granting patents for inventions, no one has ever thought of the state of Georgia as at one time having had the same right here. Yet such was the case and there is one old patent on record in the office of the secretary of state which has recently come to light through the researches of Luman L. Knight which proves that she did not grant a patent.

It is probably the only time that this state or any other for that matter, ever exercised this privilege, but the patent is worthy of special note because it is for no less important invention than that of an engine to be used in propelling a boat.

It has been the fortune of Georgia inventors to receive scant recognition from the outside world. While Dr. Crawford Long has for many years been given the credit by the people of his native state for the epoch-making discovery of anesthesia, only recently have his claims begun to be recognized by the world at large and even now the majority of educated people outside of Georgia are divided in opinion between the rights of a Scotchman and a Massachusetts dentist to priority in a discovery in which an undisputed record shows that the Georgian was several years in advance of either.

The Rev. P. R. Gouding, who is remembered as the author of several charming books still read by children, is said to have made a sewing machine, which was used by his wife some time before the machine of Elias Howe, the accredited inventor of that labor-saving device was heard of.

### THEY BEAT FULTON BY 20 YEARS.

Now, almost twenty years before Robert Fulton made his successful experiment in steam navigation with the "Clermont" on the Hudson, I. Briggs and William Longstreet, two Georgians, had built an engine to be used in a steamboat, which operated successfully before that of Fulton.

This fact is attested by the patent alluded to above, granted by an act of the Georgia legislature passed at Augusta, February 1, 1793, giving the inventor the exclusive rights to his device for a period of fourteen years. This curious and most interesting old document, which seems never to have been published before, is as follows:

"An account of the construction and principles of Briggs and Longstreet's steam engine for the exclusive use of the inventor for fourteen years by an act of the legislature passed at Augusta the 1st day of February, 1793.

"The engine consists of a boiler, two cylinders, and a condenser, constructed in the following manner: The boiler consists of two metallic vessels, spherical or nearly so, placed one within the other, so as to leave a narrow interval between, in which a jet of the boiling water is contained. The inner vessel contains the fire, the space of which passes through a spiral flue winding around the outside of the outer vessel from the bottom to the top. The steam is conveyed by a pipe from the boiler into an upright cylinder.

"The two cylinders, which are placed horizontally one within the other, from whence to the steam is admitted alternately into each one of the inner cylinders, in which it impels a piston to vibrate both ways with equal force. It is also admitted alternately into each end of the inner cylinder, the communication to and from which are opened and shut by a single cock which is

### ORIGINAL LETTER HAS BEEN LOST.

The foregoing appeal, really touching in its earnestness and simplicity, was for a long time among the records of the executive office. The original has now been lost, but not before copies of it had been preserved in 'Stories of Georgia' by Joel Chandler Harris and in other publications. Whether or not the governor ever made reply to this letter is not known,

It was with great difficulty that Longstreet finally persuaded a few of his friends to go on board with him, as they believed it would blow up before it would move a yard.

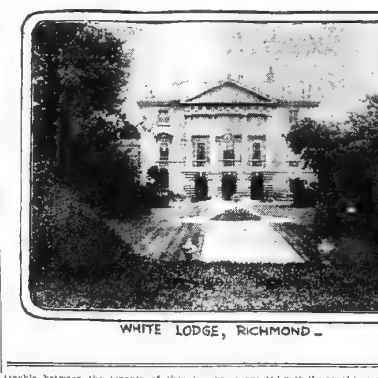

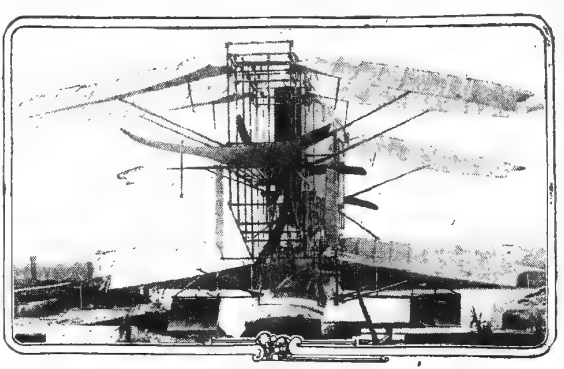

GLENN'S BATTLE WITH U. S. COURTS

Man Who Will Succeed Judge Clements Figured in Sensational Race Contest When Governor.

By John Corbett, Jr. Washington, November 15.—(Special.)—The election of Judge Glenn, of North Carolina, former governor of that state, for membership on the interstate commerce commission to succeed Judge Clements, recalls the sensation of 1907 when Governor Glenn in the summer of 1907 and the federal authorities. It threatened to embroil the two sovereign authorities.

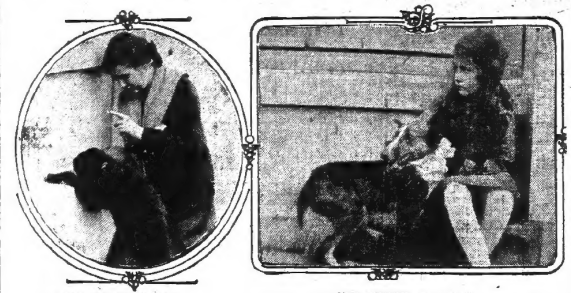
At the demand of the governor, the state legislature of North Carolina passed a law increasing 4 cents as the maximum passenger rate that could be charged within the state. This law was upheld by the state supreme court, but later declared unconstitutional by the supreme court of the United States.

When the law was passed, the Southern railway and the Atlantic Coast line railway attacked the constitutionality, because not fairly compensatory. Judge Glenn, chief justice of the United States circuit court, selected the easternmost of the two appeals in the state. Judge Glenn violently declared the law unconstitutional, and called on all state officials to secure the enforcement of the law. He carried his antagonism to the extent of threatening the street of W. W. Pate, president of the Southern railway.

When Glenn upheld the state official and directed Judge Merritt, a leading attorney of Asheville, to defend them. At the same time, the superior court held the Southern railway liable for the cost of its violation of the state law. The state supreme court reversed the decision, but upheld the 4-cent rate law as valid. This was the first time the supreme court of the United States had declared the state and upheld Judge Pate, declaring the maximum rate law unconstitutional, because it did not yield a fair return to the road.

As a result of this bitter controversy, in which Judge Merritt refused to use all the powers of his state to support the federal government, Senator Overman secured the passage by congress of an act which would prevent injunction restraining the enforcement of a state law. The act hereafter is granted without a hearing before three federal judges.
