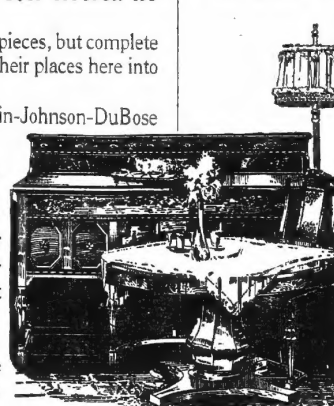

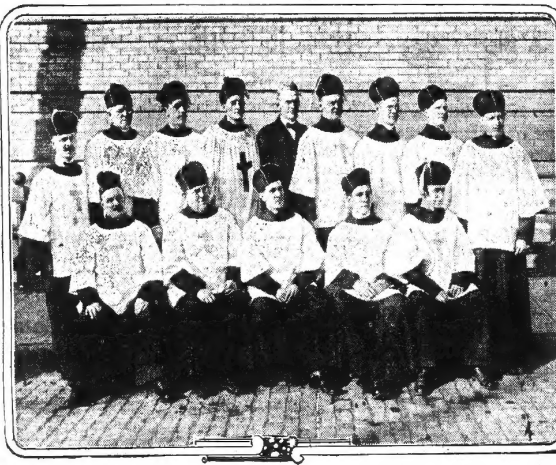

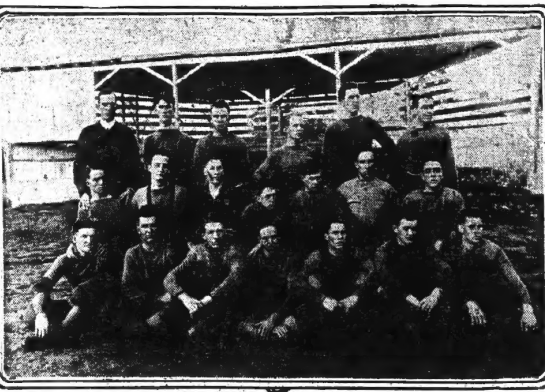

COTTON TRADE WAITS FOR GINNING REPORT

Opinion is Divided in Regard to the Figures to be Issued by the Government.

New Orleans, November 16.—This week the cotton market will be chiefly interested in the regular bureau report on ginning up to November 13. This report will be issued Friday morning at 9 o'clock. New Orleans time, and will compare with 12,339,648 bales

signed up to the corresponding date last year and 11,214,292 two years ago. As usual, the trade is much divided in opinion regarding the figures. There are some who look for no more than last year's total, while many look for at least 13,500,000 bales. It is said to be that anything over the latter figure would cause a violent boom. Anything under the former would be a confirmation of a small crop. On the whole, the trade is willing to believe the larger figures that were returned last year, because the weather has been so favorable during the last ginning period, which comprises the first half of November. Farmers have ranked work in the fields, and a vast quantity of cotton has been gathered. Even the bolls are willing to acknowledge that ginning will be large, although they are not willing to admit anything under the former figure. A large crop. The trade will eagerly watch reports

from the interior this week for further information regarding the crop, which picking and ginning will be the chief topics. It is expected that the report, particularly the largest cotton producing countries, will show that the crop was 18 per cent picked ahead of the season.
