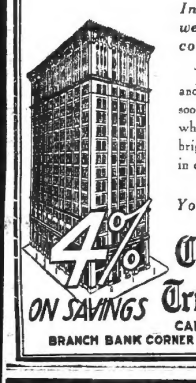

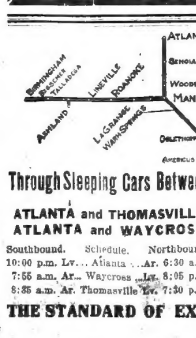

With more than fifty representative Atlanta business men present at a meeting held in the rooms of the Atlanta Chamber of Commerce yesterday morning, plans to begin canvassing for subscriptions for the abolishing of night-school in Atlanta were stated with enthusiasm.

Captain James W. English, chairman of the meeting, is busy today selecting twenty-five members of committees. Captain English, with the assistance of two other men who will act as chairman of the campaign committees, has appointed many of the subscribers and according to a statement made last night the committees will be organized on Thursday.

Each of the committees will be furnished at once with a list of the names of the subscribers to the order and will find one year ago. Each committee will get an equal proportion of names. The lists will be apportioned territorially so that each committee will have a certain specified district to canvass.

Approximately \$20,000 was subscribed to the original fund. There were 2000 subscribers to the fund, and it has been learned that there are about 1700 still in the city. Many have moved to other cities and a few have died. The late Walker lumber subscription gave \$15,000 to it.

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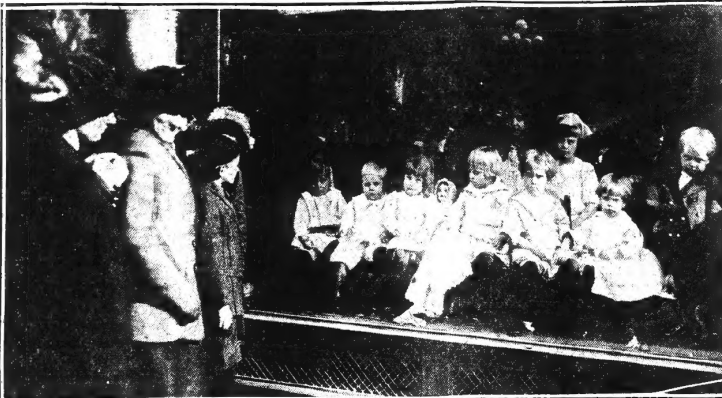

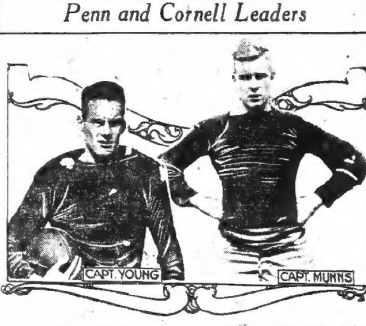

REALIZING MADE COTTON DECLINE

Cables Were Also Easy. Market Closed Steady at Loss of One to Seven Points—Spot Quiet.

New York, November 26.—The cotton market was quiet today, and fluctuations were irregular enough within comparatively narrow range to suggest that his best was mostly in the way of evening up for cotton and a beamish crop estimate were considered acceptable for an early break while a subsequent rally failed to hold and the market finally settled at a decline of 1 to 7 points.

Private cables attributed Liverpool's decline to most satisfactory local advance to increased long selling and the absence of an important demand while sentiment there may have been influenced to some extent by the estimate of a Memphis authority placing the crop at 14,800,000 bales.

There was considerable cotton for sale at the opening here, and first prices showed a downward bias to 10 1/2 but afterwards were held around 12 1/2 for January, and the market soon showed a tendency to recover.
