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HARDWICK DRAWS CURRENCY BILL

Georgia Congressman Says It Will Cause Five Years of Inflated Credit and Then a Financial Crash.

By John Corrigan, Jr. Washington, September 12.—(Special.)—Representative W. Hardwick of the tenth district, declared in the house today that the administration currency bill would cause boom times and inflation of credits and currency for the years and then a financial crash.

"I shall vote for the bill as a good democrat, because I believe in standing by the caucus," said Hardwick, "but I will say, I did my best to change it."

Reckoning Day Will Come. "We will enjoy for five years having our notes discounted, our bills being flooded with currency. There will be too great an extension of credit with overtrading and overproduction until they find reckoning day. We have made the sky the limit in this new currency issue, and God knows that somebody will go to the United States treasury and say 'I want gold for the paper currency.' I have promised to redeem it in gold or law. I want gold, and that is the truth of a nation, as well as of an individual, that pay day always comes sooner or later."

He declared that the republicans had established a national banking system, which will allow the withdrawal of gold into the treasury in time of need. He explained that this was accomplished by the simple mechanism of the fact that the present national bank notes will not be received at the treasury for the redemption of gold.

MOTHER AND CHILD KILLED IN FIELD

Enraged by Wife's Refusal to Obey Him, Husband Shoots Her Down in Cold Blood. Slayer Still at Large.

Saginaw, Mich., September 12.—Mrs. Joseph Sampson and her 10-year-old son, Henry, were shot to death in a sugar beet field near Cheeseman, and the authorities are searching for Mrs. Sampson's husband, who is alleged to have done the shooting.

It is asserted that Sampson returned today from Toledo and failed to find his wife at home. After a short search he located her and his son at a nearby farm. She is alleged to have refused to obey his command to return home with him, and it is alleged he shot her twice. A bullet pierced her left breast. The son ran toward his mother. It is said, and fell with a bullet wound near the heart.

Police Looking for Man Who Climbed Through Window to Slay Woman.

Savannah, Ga., September 12.—Henry Davis, 25, is at large tonight despite the determined efforts put forth by the city and county police to arrest him for the murder of his wife, Annie May Davis, at an early hour this morning.

Davis, who was employed as a fireman at a local hotel, climbed through a window into his wife's bedroom and cut her throat with a knife. The couple recently separated and jealousy is believed to have caused the deed.

As Davis fled from the house after cutting his wife's throat he was recognized by his mother-in-law.

Mr. Scales missed his watch and jewelry on Wednesday night and notified the hotel management. Detective Vito in a parenthesis, the detective said that Vito not only had the watch and jewelry of Mr. Scales, but also a heavy watch of Mrs. Scales, who was a former Bell Hop.

When Mr. Scales was in New York, he was well known in Atlanta, where he had a large business. He was a prominent cotton broker.

Utterly Unable to Agree Godbee Jurors Go to Bed; Expect Compromise Verdict

The Judge Announces at 10 O'Clock to Awaiting Crowd That No Verdict Will Be Reached Till Today—Prospects Brighter for Prisoner.

WOMEN WEEP DURING BITTER ARRAIGNMENT OF MRS. EDNA GODBEE

Indications Point to Verdict of Voluntary Manslaughter, Which Would Carry a Sentence of From Ten to Twenty Years.

By BRITT CRAIG. Millen, Ga., September 12.—(Special.)—That the jury was hopelessly hung up and there could be no verdict until Saturday in the case of Mrs. Edna Perkins Godbee, slayer of her divorced husband, Judge Walter S. Godbee, and his young bride, and now on trial for killing the woman, was announced by Presiding Judge H. C. Hammond at 10 o'clock today.

Solicitor General R. Lee Moore expressed the belief that the jury would compromise on a verdict of voluntary manslaughter, in which case a sentence of twenty years would be the limit of punishment. Mrs. Godbee expressed belief that the tie-up meant that she would be freed.

"I will attend church Sunday," she told reporters who sought for an expression from her. Belief in a verdict of acquittal, was freely expressed in Millen after the jurymen announced that they would have to retire for the night without coming to a verdict.

During the time from 8:31 o'clock until the judge made his announcement the courtroom was packed. People from the best society in Millen filled by the accused woman, each clasping her hand and speaking words of encouragement.

Outside of the rail which separated the spectators from the judge and jurymen, the air was stifling and a man was overcome and had to be given medical attention.

The light and cheerful air of the crowd seemed either to have affected Mrs. Godbee, or to have been caused by her own spirits. She appeared in the best of spirits and the only apparent difference between her and the throng was that she was inside of the rail and in the custody of officers.

Today's session of the trial was as sensational as the first day. During Judge J. H. Saffold's speech in behalf of the accused woman scores of women broke down, many having to leave the courtroom.

Mrs. Godbee fell into tears while the attorney pleaded dramatically for her. She was sobbing and the young girl, Sarah Godbee, who there is no one else to bring up, she thought she would be asked to go outside, and for a while it looked as though she would be asked to go outside.

A startling incident occurred during the afternoon when the prosecuting attorney called Colonel W. H. Davis, associate counsel for the prosecution, if Davis would testify, interrupting him.

ROBBER'S ARREST EXPECTED SOON

Southern Express Officials Believe Man Who Stole \$71,900 Between New York and Savannah Is Known.

Savannah, Ga., September 12.—(Special.)—Developments of the past 12 hours lead to the belief that the mystery which surrounds the theft of \$71,900 from a strong box being expressed from New York over the Atlantic Coast Line will be cleared up soon. The next development in the case promises to be the arrest of those suspected of having been responsible for the robbery.

A high official of the Southern Express company said this morning that arrests may be expected at any moment. Nearly every man through whose hands the money could have passed has been subjected to a severe examination.

LAST NARROW GAUGE ROAD TO DISAPPEAR

The last bit of narrow gauge railroad track is to disappear from Georgia in the immediate future. This is the branch of the Galveston Midland railroad, running from Belmont through Winder to Monroe, 23 miles long. The authorities of the road yesterday petitioned the railroad commission for permission to issue \$225,000 in bonds to be used with other bonds already issued as collateral for short-term notes to the amount of \$25,000. The purpose of the issue is to change the track from narrow to standard gauge.

Hughes to Request Railroads To Report Cotton Movement

Department of Agriculture Has Cinematograph Lecture to Offer at Small Cost.

That the state department of agriculture will take steps in the near future to secure reliable reports regarding the movement of cotton, such information to be given out weekly during the cotton season for the information of farmers and the public generally, was indicated by Assistant Commissioner of Agriculture Dan Hughes yesterday.

He declared that something would be done in the matter as soon as Commissioner Price returns from Mississippi where he has been inspecting the boll weevil district with a party of Georgians interested in the subject. He is expected to be back the first of next week.

That statistical information regarding the movement of cotton would be of great value to the farmers is a great difficulty that confronts us to devise a plan whereby accurate information may be gathered with the means at our disposal. Unless the information obtained is strictly reliable it will, of course, be of little or no value.

Probably Best Plan.

"Probably the best plan that could be devised would be to obtain a list of all the warehouses in Georgia and identify the parties owning them each week. This would involve considerable expense as well as a large amount of time. The money necessary to carry it out we have not available, but it is naturally eliminated in our plan for consideration."

Only Plan Feasible.

"There is another plan that I have in mind which might work almost as well as the one I have just mentioned, but it would require a large amount of money to carry it out, provided we can get the railroad to co-operate with us. That is to have the cars furnish us with weekly reports of the number of bales of cotton shipped and their routes. They might save time and trouble by having their agents at the railroads ship-ment points furnish us with weekly reports directly on blanks to be furnished by the department. All that would be necessary for the agent to do would be to fill in on the card the date and the number of bales shipped, as well as the point of shipment, then mail the card to us."

Other States May Follow.

"It has been suggested that it would accomplish little for Georgia alone to take this matter in hand unless the other states in the cotton belt were induced to do the same thing. But some state has to start the movement, and why not Georgia? I believe in the matter of reporting the movement of cotton up and down the coast, the other states would see the benefit of it and would join the whole project. The real solution of the problem, as I have said before, is the establishment of a bureau of statistics in Washington securing information of all kinds of interests to farmers. That, however, would require a large amount of money and some years before we can get the general assembly to see the necessity of it."

FOR MURDERER CHIM YOUNG BOY IS INDICTED

Frank Barton Says He Was Showing Friend How to Defend Himself in War.

An indictment was found by the grand jury on Friday against Ralph Barton, a 14-year-old boy, for the murder of his cousin and playmate, John Edgar, some time in the early part of last July.

Little Barton claims that the stabbing, which resulted in the death of his friend, was entirely accidental, and that the murder was committed when it happened. They were showing each other, he says, how they would defend themselves against a Mexican in personal combat should war break out between the United States and Mexico.

Ralph struck at John with a knife and John stepped toward him as the blow was dealt, receiving the full force of the kick, when he had not intended to strike him at all. The incident occurred on Kennedy street.

While the grand jury was weighing the case of the child, his mother sat outside the door and awaited the decision. She was paralyzed for an instant when the news was broken to her, when she afterward broke down and wept quietly. She believes thoroughly that she struck the blow in all innocence and in nothing but the best of feeling toward his child.

BROWN, GRAY STRIPES FOR CONVICT GRADES

Now that a large majority of the convicts of Georgia are to be taken out of stripes, the people will be looking like in their new uniforms. The prison commission decided yesterday that these uniforms should be accepted, the samples gotten up for them by the Atlanta Woolen mills.

First-grade convicts will wear a uniform of heavy brown cloth, cotton in summer and 10 per cent wool in winter. Second-grade convicts will wear a gray uniform of the same material, while only third-grade convicts will be attired in the regulation stripes. The prisoners will be placed in the regulation stripes on the back of each uniform as a means of identification.

Every convict will be placed in stripes upon his entrance in the penitentiary, and the time that shall elapse in his passing to the next grade, and then to the highest grade will depend very largely upon his conduct.

Legumes always, when they can be successfully grown, is the only sound rule, but a fair crop of soy will supply more humus-forming material and serve as a better crop than a failure of any legume. BREAK IS THREATENED IN GOVERNMENT DAM

The Coosa River Locks, Costing \$237,000 and Nearly Completed, May Go Down.

Rome, Ga., September 12.—(Special.) The government lock and dam at Mayo's bar in the Coosa river, now nearing completion, is threatened by a sudden rise of the river. The high water is endangering the dam, which is not yet completed, and the government engineers fear that the pressure of the waters will cause the dam to burst and sweep away the extensive construction which has, during the last two years, cost Uncle Sam \$237,000.

At a late hour this evening the waters were at a standstill, and it is believed that the danger will pass over unless there are continued rains up the river.

POSTAL CLERKS AIDED IN \$625,000 ROBBERY

Five Men Arrested on Suspicion For Theft of Necklace Between London and Paris.

London, September 12.—That postal employees connived at the theft of the \$625,000 pearl necklace which mysteriously disappeared July 16 between Paris and London, was established by evidence presented at a hearing today. Whether the employees belong to the French or English postoffice the authorities decline to divulge.

Five men were arrested on suspicion September 2. Three of them, Lockett, Silberman and Gutwirth, were captured at the British museum tube station. The other two, Grizard and McCarthy, were captured near Hatfield Garden in the center of the wholesale jewelry district.

A Paris diamond broker named Quarantini, who helped lay the trap which resulted in capturing the suspects, testified that Gutwirth told him he had cut \$120,000 to acquire the necklace and that among the recipients of the money were two policemen who received \$10,000 each.

Gutwirth also told him that Lockett, one of the prisoners, was the man who on July 19, 1909, had snatched a bag of jewelry valued at \$500,000 from a Paris jeweler named Goldsmith in a boulevards restaurant.
