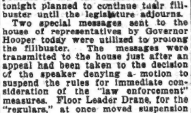

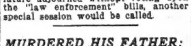

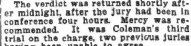

Later reports from Washington seemed to be selling as if speculative prospects, while reports of further heavy rains which came from the southwest and active months sold in the north were higher. LAWYERS HELPED GIRLS GET MONEY FROM MEN

Revelations in Bixby Trial to Cause Probe by Los Angeles Bar Association.

Judge Bledsoe, sitting at the trial of Bixby, charged with offenses against girls, visited today an attorney's prosecution to impeach Bixby's testimony. The court, in a decision, refused to impeach Bixby's testimony, but it was not deemed proper to admit it.

W. H. Stevens, one of the attorneys representing the accusers of Bixby, the stand indicted having received from Octavia Morgan, the aged architect, whose refusal to testify yesterday was based on the ground that it might degrade him, \$2,500, which the attorney said was given in voluntary settlement of the claims of the mother of two girls against Morgan. Bixby, he said, refused to furnish counsel to make similar settlements, whereupon damage suits were filed against him.

SERBIA IN BALKANS TROUBLES GREEK KING

Believes Activities of Turkish Troops Forwardships Attempt to Recapture Kavala.

LONDON, September 26.—King Constantine of Greece, made preparations to return to Athens, but the Balkan situation is regarded by the king as too serious to permit of his returning to his native country.

The king has decided to do his best to visit the sea-side resort of Eastbourne, on the south coast of England, and will come to London, by way of a special conference with Sir Edward Grey, the British foreign secretary.

All Greek officers have been recalled for active service with their companies and many of the regiments disbanded at the conclusion of the campaign against Turkey are now being reorganized.

The activities of the Turkish troops are believed by the Greeks to forward an attempt to recapture Kavala, on the Aegean sea, which Greece so much to lose, and which is her road to Bulgaria.

Turkish officers now on their way from Asia Minor to the province of Thrace openly admit that Kavala is the objective of Ottoman aspirations.

Several fighting near Ohrid, in Albania, 100 miles north of Janina, is said to have resulted in the complete success of the Albanians, who captured the town of Ohrid, which had been held by the Serbians.

Chaplain for Penns. Philadelphia, September 26.—A new office of chaplain to the Catholic students at the University of Pennsylvania, has been created by Archbishop Pedersen, who announced today that he had appointed the Rev. John W. Keogh as the first incumbent.

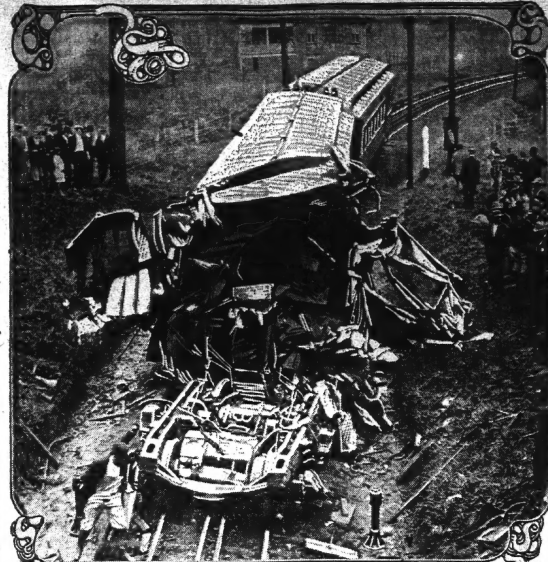
