

ACCUSE BULGARS OF MASSACRE OF 20,000

Plains Near Kavala Strawn With Victims—Fear Felt for Safety of Foreigners.

Special Cable to The Atlanta Georgian. SALONIKA, July 19.—Twenty thousand Greeks and Mussulmans are reported to have been slaughtered by Bulgarian soldiers at Xanthi, 40 miles northeast of Kavala.

King to Lead Army Of Reprisal Into Sofia.

ATHENS, July 19.—A Salonika dispatch states that King Constantine probably will go to the front to lead the army which the Greeks, in cooperation with Servia and Rumania, will throw into Sofia.

"I intend to go to Sofia in person to avenge the atrocities of the Bulgarians," telegraphed the King to Foreign Minister Corontalis. The Greek army is 62 miles from Sofia. The Servians are 40 and the Rumanians only 25 miles away.

Two hundred thousand persons are homeless and starving. Five hundred towns and villages have been wiped out or depopulated. Reckoned from a commercial standpoint, the damage from the second Balkan war in Macedonia and Thrace is \$100,000,000.

St. Petersburg Protects Interests of Bulgaria.

ST. PETERSBURG, July 19.—Russia will not allow Bulgaria to be treated with extreme humiliation by either the allies or Turkey. A note to this effect was handed in to-day at Constantinople. Athens, Belgrade and Bucharest. Russia, it is reported, will attempt to hold Adrianople for Bulgaria.

Adrianople Menaced by Invading Turkish Army.

CONSTANTINOPLE, July 19.—The vanguard of the Turkish army which is invading Thrace arrived in front of Adrianople to-day and an attack upon the city may be made next week according to a dispatch received here to-day from the field.

Peace Advocates File Stories of Atrocities.

PARIS, July 19.—The most appalling horrors of war were pictured in dispatches received here to-day from points in the Balkans and from Athens. They will be compiled by the International Peace Society for use in its crusade for universal peace.

Socialist Leader Takes Into His Home Disgraced Daughter of a Methodist Minister.

TERRE HAUTE, IND., July 19.—Joseph W. Debs, the Socialist leader, has issued what he terms his "challenge to the Christianity of Terre Haute."

He has taken into his home in the Indiana city Helen Cox, the daughter of a Methodist preacher. She had eloped with a member of a prominent family who divorced her and took their child. She was arrested for immorality. Debs met her on a visit to the jail and, as an emergency probation officer, took her into his home.

"The girl has been persecuted," he announced publicly. "Will Terre Haute help her or will it organized force be used to drive her to desperation? Let Terre Haute ask 'What would Christ do? Our family has opened our home to her."

"There is but one thing remarkable about opening our home to an unfortunate woman," he said later, when his action aroused widespread comment. "and it is that any one should consider it remarkable. This is a common thing in the Balkans, and so common that it attracts no attention. Kindness is an exceptional trait that provokes widespread comment."

"The stultid woman is, as a rule, not a wicked woman, but a sick and suffering woman. As to our home, it is not open to her as a 'sinner's home,' but as a place where she can be cared for by her family. We believe, my wife and I, that we are not only our brother's keeper, but our sister's keeper as well."

NATURAL CRANK, MAYOR'S SHOT AT BROYLES

Mayor Woodward Saturday said he was finally dissatisfied Recorder Nash R. Broyles from his mind with the statement: "He is a natural dyspeptic, crank and a fanatic. That the first contested appointment coming up for Governor Stanton's consideration should have been decided in favor of a Hobe Smith man—to use that ancient and honorable term in differentiating him from the other variety in Georgia—may be accepted, in all probability, as the inevitable result of the situation.

The Governor on Friday appointed Miller S. Bell, of Milledgeville, trustee of the Georgia Normal and Industrial School, situated there, notwithstanding the fact that Mr. Bell was an adherent of the Smith factional end of Georgia politics in the past rather than of the Brown end.

There is no question whatever about the entire fitness of Mr. Bell for the position. Governor Stanton has searched the State for months and not found a better man for the assignment of former chief justice.

These places on the boards of trustees of the State institutions—particularly the Georgia Normal and Industrial School—are considered positions of great honor and trust and are conferred upon the persons who are deemed most worthy to hold them.

And that looks like a fair and square going in the line of letting fitness and character count for more than the job-hunt, or the executive office under the new Governor.
