The wave of prosperity reported in all lines of business in Georgia and Atlanta has found an echo in the business of the Atlanta postoffice.

Postmaster Bolling H. Jones said Thursday that the volume of mail hat passed through the local postoffice Wednesday night was greater by many thousand pieces than that of any previous 24 hours in the history of the office

"We broke every record that was ever heard of around here," said Mr. "We handled 240,000 pieces of first class mail and fully 300,000 pieces of second, third and fourth class mail. Severe criticism is made of Judge L. S. Roan for certain phases of his conduct of the trial of Leo M. Frank and for his refusal to grant a new trial, even though he himself had doubt as to the defendant's guilt, in the brief and argument prepared by Frank's lawyers to be presented to the Supreme Court of Georgia next Monday.



# MUST DOUBLE TRACK LINE

Legislative Committee Investigates Chattanooga Terminals. Southern Anxious to Lease.

Members of the Western and Atlantic Railroad Commission of the

iantic Railroad Commission of the State Legislature are in Chattanooga Thursday investigating the Chattanooga terminais and other Tennessee property of the State road, following a meeting held in the State Capitol Wednesday.

It virtually was decided at Wednesday's meeting that whatever road is given the control of the Western and Atlantic will be required to double track the line from Atlanta to Chattanooga, and that in order to secure this improvement the lease will have to run for a longer period than heretofore.

Whether this arrangement will meet with the approval of the Nashville, Chattanooga and St. Louis, the present lessee of the road, and which, it is understood, desires a renewal, is not known.

it is understood, desires a renewal, is not known.

Southern Anxious to Lease.

It is generally understood, however, that the Southern is anxious to lease the line and is willing to double track the road on condition that the lease run for a long term of years.

The commission has not yet been able to obtain any definite figures on the cost of double tracking the road. Chairman Gunby Jordan presented a letter from Vice President H. D. Spencer, of the Southern Railway, who stated that the cost of the improvement could hardly be estimated successfully until a survey and report had been made by a competent engineer. Mr. Spencer, however, stated that the last double tracking the Southern system did, from Chattanooga to Meridian, Miss., cost \$30,000 a mile, while the cost of double tracking the line from Atlanta to Gainesville ran from \$20,000 to \$80,000 per mile.

Based on these figures, about \$50,000 a mile is considered a fair average for the cost of double tracking the Western and Atlantic.

Possibility of Sale Suggestion.

Mr. Jordan told the other members of the commission that certain questions should be asked any road that uplies for a lease of the State line, which indicates the possibility of the ommission recommending the sale of the property when it makes its report of the Legislature.

The roads, he declared, should be asked how much they are willing to pay for the right of way, how much they will pay for the road with the properties not necessary for the operation of the road taken out, and also how much they will be willing to pay for the Atlanta terminals on the plazassistem proposed by the Atlanta Chamber of Commerce.

Only six members attended the Wednesday meeting and made the trip to Chattanooga. They were Chairman Gunby Jordan, Senator M. C. Tarver, Representatives L. R. Akin, Alvin D. Greene, E. D. Cole and Henry J. Fullbright.





The Aldermanic Board, acting as a committee, will hold a public hearing on the new traffic ordinance and decide upon a recommendation to Council. The Ordinance Committee will give final consideration to a bill regulating taxicab fares.

The taking of testimony in the Turner "graft" investigation is complete. Turner has admitted receiving \$520 and a gold watch from electrical contractors, but he claims that it was for the purpose of paying off his indebtedness incurred by his campaign for election. The feature of the close of this hearing will be the argument of Attorney Aldine Chambers, who declares that he has proved Turner a "grafter," and who will recite to the committee what he claims to be clear grounds for impeachment.

Council is perplexed over the new traffic law that would stop the parking of automobiles in the downtown section for more than 20 minutes at a time, and would prohibit pedestrians from crossing streets except at corners. Society women who drive their machines and doctors who leave their cars in the street during their office hours are vigorous protesters against the parking provision of the law; and they are causing considerable trouble to those who want to relieve congest—ed conditions.



# COMING BACK TO ATLANTA FOR SERVICE

By JOHN TEMPLE GRAVES

It is something far more than a pleasure to come back to The Georgian as the personal representative of Mr. Hearst himself.

First, in the return to a paper of which I was one of the founders, and to a people among whom I was reared, and with whom my work of so many years was always a matter of personal loyalty and love.

And second, in the fact that the power and liberality of Mr. Hearst enable me to come back to Atlanta equipped for a general and comprehensive service for the City, the State and the South, far greater than any I might have attained if I had remained at home, and greater even than I had ever dreamed of having if my largest dreams of local success had been realized.

We have put The Atlanta Georgian ahead of all its neighboring papers in circulation, and of course we are not going to stop with the circulation we have, but will press on and try to double it at least. The Georgian will, therefore, with your editorial guidance, be able to cover its territory thoroughly, and give adequate local expression to the Southern interests, and to the aims and ambitions of the city of Atlanta.

But, as I have said, I want to do more than this. The other Atlanta papers can do this, to a certain extent, in proportion to their circulation and enterprise, but I think we have, with our large number of newspapers and weekly publications and monthly magazines, an opportunity to do more than any local paper, or than all local papers could possibly do. We can appeal to millions of readers in other sections than the South. We can tell them what the South wants to tell them. We can influence them to regard certain activities and interests in the South as the South wants these things regarded. We can arouse them to co-operation and support of movements and ideas where the South needs co-operation. In other words, we can not only secure the united support of our family of readers in the South for Southern projects, but we can secure the support of our greater family of readers in other sections of the country, and unite them all for the benefit of any commendable object in any section.

We were already able to be of some service in helping to secure the Shriners' Convention at Atlanta, but that is a small thing compared with what we can do if our forces are intelligently directed, and with your knowledge of Southern conditions and the immediate contact with them that your visits to Atlanta will secure, I am sure this intelligent direction will be

It is for these reasons that I am sending you to Atlanta as my personal representative, and I bespeak for you the hearty and harmonious co-operation of the editorial departments and the business departments of The Atlanta Georgian.

Mr. Hearst has a series of eleven daily newspapers, stretching across the continent from Boston, through New York, Chicago, Atlanta, and San Francisco to Los Angeles. Two and a half million of these newspapers sold every day make between ten and twelve million daily readers of the Hearst newspapers-nearly one-eighth of the population of the United States.

Mr. Hearst owns five magazines in this country, and two in London, with an aggregate circulation of nearly two million more.

These publications make up a great chain whose strength is in, not its weakest, but its strongest link. They all stand together, and under the Hearst policy they all stand as a phalanx for whatever essential gen-

Mr. Hearst again marshaled his influences from every section of the country, published a 16-page Special Edition of the San Francisco Examiner in the city of Washington, and to-day city officials of San Francisco are thanking the Hearst newspapers for the assurance of the finest water supply in the world.

The Atlanta Shriners desired to entertain in 1914 the Imperial Council of the Shrine, the most splendidspectacular and lavish spenders among American Assemblies. Forrest Adair wrote me of Yaarab's ambition, and under Mr. Hearst's direction our friends in all sections became busy-in the East, the North, the Middle States, the Northwestern States, and the Far West—and Forrest Adair will tell you that they were the greatest influence that helped Atlanta capture the Imperial Council of the Shrine.

Atlanta now wishes one of the Regional Banks. Her argument for it is irresistible, but it needs publicity to reach the national public opinion that would justify Atlanta's selection. Robert F. Maddox went to Washington representing the Atlanta Banks. Two days after his arrival three columns in the New York American and in all the Hearst newspapers carried to more than ten million people Atlanta's unanswerable claim for one of the Regional Banks which will fix this city as the financial center of the South.

Surely it is worth any growing and ambitious city's while to have one of the Hearst newspapers published in its midst. For surely no such power of national publicity is held in any other publications in the world. Surely business men, merchants, manufacturers and citizens can afford to hold up in every moral and material way the hands of an institution which carries so vast a power to help in our great rational and general needs.

All this power of unequaled publicity is at the service of Atlanta and Georgia and the South in any vital question that presents itself. All this power I am empowered by Mr. Hearst's commission to wield, working in full and cordial harmony with Mr. Keats Speed, the Managing Editor and Mr. Hugh Murray, the Business Manager, and the splendid staff of young men who are making The Georgian and Hearst's Sunday American.

Surely no happier and nobler commission was ever committed to a Georgian. I appreciate the opportunity and the responsibility. And I invoke the sympathy and co-operation of my Southern friends while I faithfully endeavor to meet it.

Atlanta is the South's metropolis; its leader of thought and commerce; it is the financial center, the insurance center, the railroad center of the entire South.

As Mr. William Randolph Hearst said yesterday, in making a donation of \$5,000 to the Oglethorpe University fund, "FOR A LONG TIME THE SOUTH LED ALL AMERICA IN THE FAME AND EXCELLENCE OF ITS UNIVERSITIES. #### The Fate of Crassus By REV. THOMAS B. GREGORY.

N December 9, 53 B. C., in what is now Asiatic Tur key, was fought one of the decisive battles of history. At Carrhae the Parthians killed a Roman pro-consul, annihilated a Roman army and precipitated the rivalry between the two Roman citizens which was to end in the overthrow of the republic and the establishment of the empire.

And all this was brought about by a lot of semi-barbarous nomads, who, as the Romans thought, had no military ability whatever and were not even worthy of serious consideration.

Crassus, who, with Caesar and Pompey, formed the "first triumvirate," being ambitious of renown and desirous of increasing his store of worldly goods, set out with an army of 50,000 men to conquer the Parthians. He thought the job would be an easy one. The legions were invincible, met the Spns of the Desert, no fear was felt as to the outcome of the expedition.

Striking boldly into the desert, Crassus came up with the enemy a little to the eastward of the Euphrates and there began at once one of the most remarkable

fights of history. The Parthlan force, composed entirely of cavalry, formed about the Romans in a circle, which was slowly drawn tighter and tighter as the struggle wore on. Riding close up to the legionaries, the Parthians would rain their deadly arrows upon them and then suddenly ride away. The Romans charged with splendid courage, but they might as well have charged the wind or the flying clouds of heaven. Closer and closer drew the death circle and thinner and thinner grew the legions. On the one side there was no surrender and on the other no mercy. Slowly but remorselessly the work of destruction went on, and presently Crassus was dead and his army anni-

The "Parthian arrow" did its work well, and the ghost of the dead army, flitting back to Rome, made the Masters of the World shiver to the very marrow in their bones. That ghost was doubly significant. It meant that Crassus' army was dead and that the great republic was ready for the shroud; for, just as the Parthians had crushed Crassus, the great Julius was about to crush Pompey and establish the imperial rule.

"He foregoes liquor and tobacco whenever they would mean either deterioration for himself, or destruction of those weaker than

"He takes all the amusement and fun he can get without annoyance or degradation of others, or enervation of himself.

"He works with an eye to his employer's interest as well as his own; but not when he can help it to the point of dullness or chronic fatigue.

"He spends freely for what he enjoys, and saves for a rainy day; yet holds all his spending and saving subject to the claim of persons and causes more needy

or worthy than he. "He stoutly and bravely defends with all there is in him whatever he stands for; yet would rather be called a coward than do a foolish or foolhardy

thing to avoid it. "He looks out shrewdly for himself; yet just as shrewdly for

his customer, creditor, employer or employee "He tells the truth in kindness

to all who have a right to hear it.

"He makes the future as real

as the present, and treats present and future, both for self and for

others, as one. "He is orderly for the most part, and disorderly on special occasions, as the pleasure and convenience of all concerned may require.

"He talks frankly about unpleasant facts when necessary; but keeps silent about them when talk would serve no good social

"He is polite with an inner politeness born of a desire to give pleasure rather than pain.

"He has at neart the welfare of all with whom he associates: living at peace with them so far as he can; and fighting fairly when peace can not be honorably main-

"He is loyal to his group and his friends when he can be loyal to them without being false to himself.

"He thinks little of his attainments, but much of his aims; deriving humility from the former

and self-respect from the latter. "He treats in thought, word and deed all women and girls as he would wish others to treat his own mother or sister.

"He is as kind and helpful to those who wrong him as he can be without being misunderstood, and ready to forgive them the instant they repent.

"He devotes himself to his friends and companions as so many extensions of himself; and takes as much delight in their happiness and success as in his

"He regards himself as a member and servant of the one social whole, and holds the social claim above individual inclination whenever the wo conflict,

"Not that any boy, or man for that matter, attains this comprehensive Best; but that he who is enlisted in the Quest of the Best deliberately accepts nothing lower or less,
