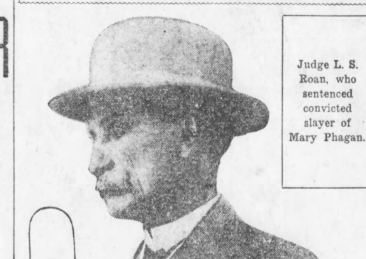

## 'OPEN TOWN' FORCES DEFEATED

### THREATENS TO CALL OFF THE WORLD'S SERIES

## Dorsey Prepares Vigorous Fight on Frank Motion

### ROW OVER PLAYERS WRITING BITTER

Herrmann Will Halt Championship Games if Ruling Against Signed Articles Is Violated.

CHICAGO, Oct. 1.—Unless the players participating or eligible to play in the world's series refrain from allowing the use of their names over newspaper articles on the series, there is grave danger that the play will be called off. Such was the declaration of Garry Herrmann, chairman of the National Commission, in Cincinnati today.

Herrmann is on the war path and declared the commission will enforce the rule. The dope from Cincinnati is to the effect that if the names of players coming under the above rule appear after the first game, a halt will be called in the play until such time when the signed articles cease.

Several days ago the commission had a special session to decide on the player-scribe. After a long session it was agreed that all players competing in the big clash should be barred from writing or having their names signed over stories of any kind. However, several of the players on the contesting teams have ignored the rule and are now being advertised by several of the big papers to write stories on the games.

"Matty" One Ignoring.  
It is also reported that the Players' Fraternity has taken sides with the players in the matter. Mathewson, Marquard, Meyers and Collins are some of the players who are going through with their threat to cover the games.

In a statement made by Herrmann in his Cincinnati office he said: "The commission will enforce the rule prohibiting series players from allowing the use of their names over newspaper articles, and it is probable the series will be called off if the players refuse to live up to the rules. The commission will protect the newspapers that have secured contracts with players to write articles."

The National Commission meets in New York on Monday and the attitude of the players toward the rule will be taken. If all sides stand pat there is sure to be a conflict. The Baseball Players' Fraternity is supporting the players who wish to turn scribbles during the big play.

Fultz Defends Scribes.  
This was announced by David L. Fultz, president of the organization, in New York yesterday. Fultz said: "We do not pass upon the status of the player-scribe, as in our opinion that matter rests entirely with the player and the paper itself. But if our support should become necessary to enable one of our members to carry out a contract which he has had a perfect right to enter into and which another has entered into with him in good faith, we would back him to the limit."

Fultz characterized as "absurd" all talk that the series would be called off if players refused to heed the ban against their efforts as writers. Hugh Jennings, manager of the Tigers, Ty Cobb and other stars are expected to write. Just how the ban can affect these men, since they are not eligible to play in the series, is a matter of debate, yet Jennings last night said he would not write if he can not get the permission of the commission.

### Three Jesses Now Will Help Run City

As a result of Tuesday's primary three Jesses will hold seats in Council. They will be Councilman Jesse Lee, Fifth Ward; Councilman Jesse Wood, Sixth Ward, and Alderman Jesse Armstrong, of the Seventh Ward. Jesse B. Lee has more distinction in the way of titles than any of them. Though he was nominated by a majority of only three votes, he gained the title of "The Lone Citizen" by being the only man to appear in response to a "call to arms" in a big political fight several years ago. That distinction gave him the "hunch" which has landed him in Council.

### COUNCIL AGAINST MAYOR 2 TO 1

Primary Victors Already Planning to Back Beavers and Vote Down Vetoes.

With most of the anti-Woodward candidates in the primary victorious, members of the majority party in Council, claiming a popular endorsement, Wednesday began oiling up the "steam roller" to run the city government in their own way despite whatever opposition Mayor Woodward may make. The results were a distinct setback for the so-called "liberal" element in city politics.

With the exception of the few members who stood by the Mayor, City Councilmen wore a brand new expression Wednesday. After Mayor Woodward's overwhelming victory in the charter they occupied very ticklish positions. It was constantly predicted on the streets yesterday that Mayor Woodward would make another clean sweep. With the initiative, referendum and recall in effect that would have meant the end of the present councilmanic majority regime.

Tables Turned on Mayor.  
But the counting of the ballots showed that the tables were turned and the councilmanic majority actually has begun work to strengthen the support of Police Chief Beavers on the Police Commission and to whip their men into line to override the vetoes of Mayor Woodward.

They had good cause to be worried for the primary for the nomination of ten Councilmen and five Aldermen proved to be one of the closest fights in the political history of Atlanta. And though they are jubilant over what they consider a real victory, Mayor Woodward won three out of the seven contests. The victors whom he endorsed are:

C. C. McDonald, elected Third ward Alderman over Alderman James E. Warren, Mayor Pro Tem, by a vote of 2,516 to 2,460.

Claim Two Big Victories.  
Jesse B. Lee, elected Fifth ward Councilman over Dr. W. M. Ethridge by a vote of 214 to 211.

A. W. Farlinger, elected Fourth ward Councilman over R. E. George by a vote of 294 to 245.

The opposition, however, considers that it won the two main fights in the nominations of Albert Thomson as Fourth ward Alderman and John S. Owens as Eighth ward Alderman.

Here is Mayor Woodward's curt comment on the result:

"I don't understand it unless the only saying of F. T. Barnum is true that 'the people like to be humbugged.'"

"Slapped People in Face."  
"I was not particularly interested in but three fights. I thought Thomson, Warren and Hall should have been defeated because they slapped the people in the face when they refused to submit the new charter to them last spring. I did not think the people would entrust the conduct of city affairs to men who refused to trust them."

It is not a personal matter with me. I am willing to support any move for the interest of the city that any member of Council starts."

Mayor Woodward had bitterly assailed Thomson on his record in Council. Amos Braselton ran against him on an "open town" ticket. Mr. Thomson took a firm stand on the "law enforcement" side of politics.

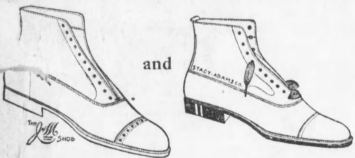

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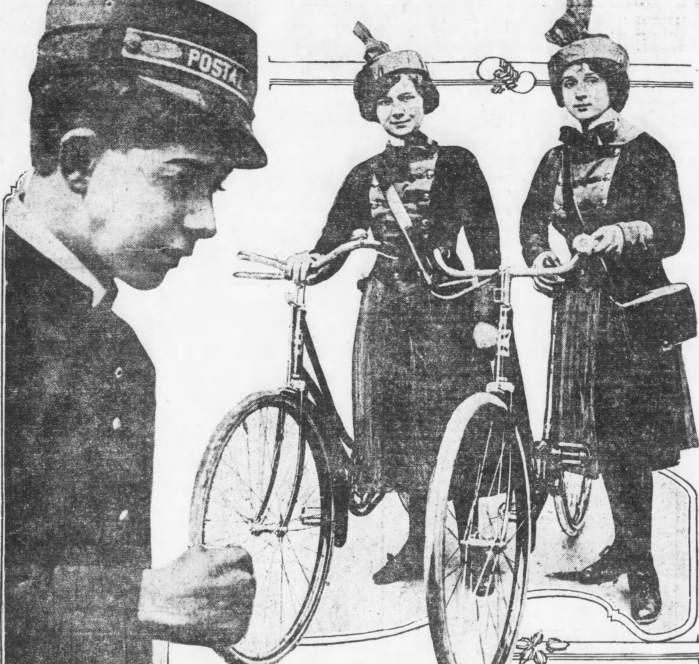

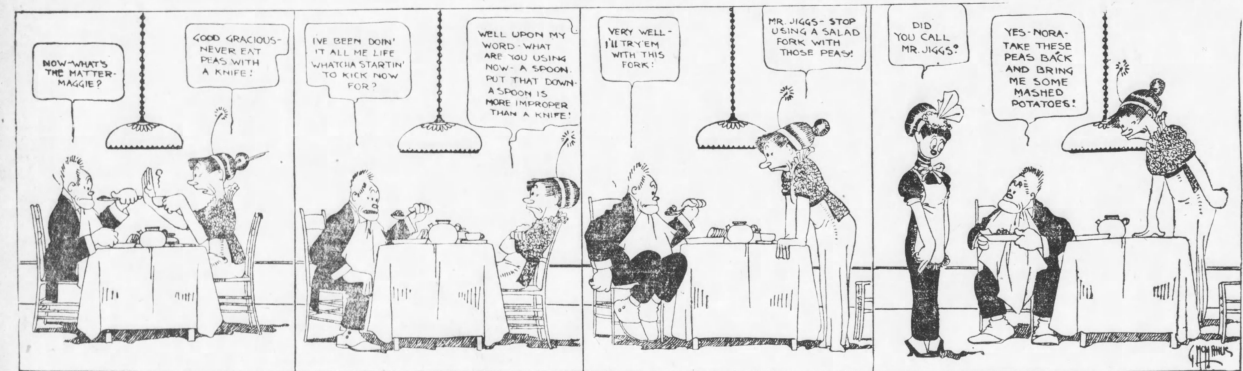

And, until we women live up to it, we can not blame men for condoning our sex when we forget our womanhood. It is with women that the reform must begin. The mother must train her boys to believe in the equal standard, to say, as does one mother, 'If you want your wife to be a good, pure woman, make yourself the kind of man that a good, pure woman should marry.'"

Let us carry the principle further still. Let us not condemn the woman, who, in girlhood, made a false step and has repented of her sin in bitterness and anguish, and yet receive into our homes the men who, we are told, is a clever chap—a little irregular in affairs with women, but, nevertheless, a charming man to meet socially. "We need not treat the man with an 'I-am-better-than-thou' attitude, but how dare we be so lenient to the hypocrite of retaining him and yet feeling that the woman is not just the person whom we care to know. That is to my way of thinking one of the sins of society. Either we must condemn neither the man nor the woman or we must accept both."

"Yet I know a professional man whose 'irregularities' are acknowledged, and, because of his social prominence, forgiven. When all the world knows of his trip of wild oats, his wife one day showed a little plot of this kind of grain in one corner of her life—sarcy, petulance, through unappreciation, partly through pity. Her husband has secured a divorce from her. And at a luncheon last winter a puritanical matron raises her brows when this wife's name was mentioned.

"I'll never have her," she said gravely. "I want now to forget the fact."

At this moment she heard the front door below give way to heavy boots, and the noise of many feet, her old father's cry for help, followed by blows and curses.

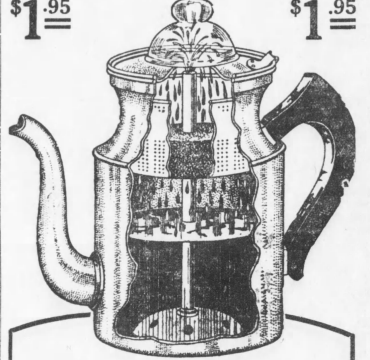

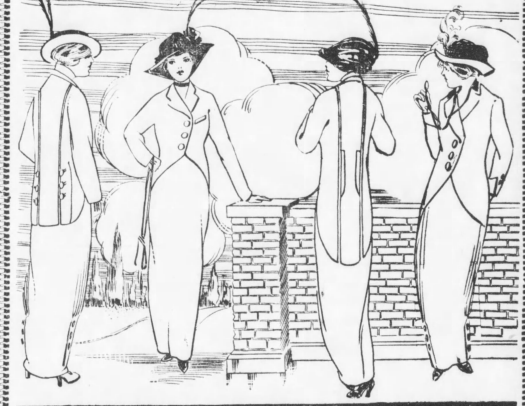

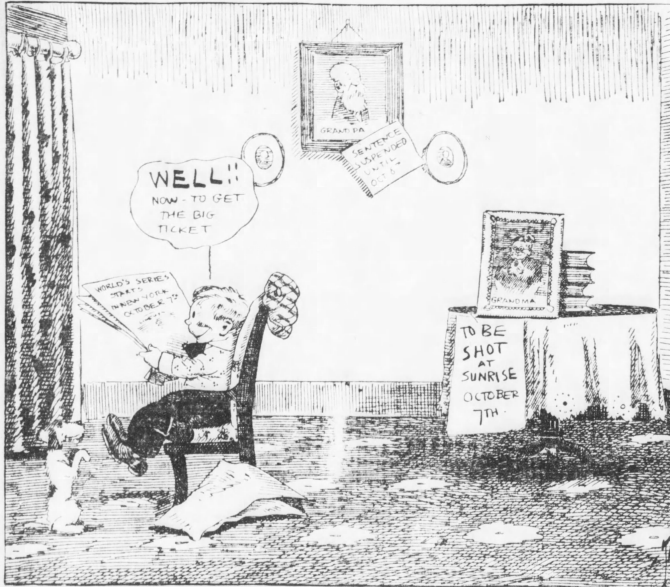

## Francis Ouimet TELLS WHAT CLUBS TO USE TO PLAY BEST GAME OF GOLF

Written expressly for The Georgian and Sunday American by the open golf champion of the United States.

**By Francis Ouimet.**

SET may be made of any length from six to about ten clubs. The first of these would be, of course, the driver. This club should be about 42 inches long and ought to weigh between 13 and 15.2 ounces. A slight whip over the head of the club will give a little more distance, but of course the club must not be too whippy.

The brass of course, ought to be exactly the same as far as length or weight is concerned. The shaft should be stiffer, because a certain amount of strain comes on the shaft in playing from bad lies, etc., and the firm shaft will make it much easier to control the shot. The face of a brass should be left slightly.

The club in the next club to follow the brass. This club has a very fine head and the shaft is very little. It gives a low shot with a great deal of run. For long shots to the green this club is very necessary.

The mid iron weighs between 11.2 and 13 ounces and the shaft is about 28 inches. A mid iron is made to play a fairly high shot of about 140 or 150 yards. This club is the best all round club in use.

The masher has a shaft of between 30 and 32 inches and weighs about the same as the mid iron. It is used for playing a high shot or path to a green, cutting the ball to stop after it hits.

The putter, which makes the sixth club, should be selected as to feeling and balance. There are a number of different styles of the putter, and all are good.

The "Sandy" is another club which everyone should have. This is nothing more or less than a club with a head and masher extra heavy in the back of the head. The distance obtained from this club is not as great as with a masher, but it gives the ball up a little quicker.

A gazer is another useful club and should be used for a shot between the mid iron and masher. Jerry Travers is a great exponent of this club.

A masher ought to be a club which should be used by those who find it difficult to put a ball back on the ball with the masher.

I always carry both a masher club and very large headed masher in my bag. The large head often saves a stroke when one is in trouble.

An extra putter is well to have on hand, not necessarily like the one you might already have. Oftentimes you lose the touch of the putt with your favorite putter and a change will do you a great deal of good.

A short piece of iron as it is called, sometimes will afford proof of immense value.

I use all of these clubs and possibly with the exception of the extra putter, I manage to use all of them in a round of eighteen holes.

Francis Ouimet Says: FEW REALIZE DIFFERENCE IN MATCH AND MEDAL PLAY

In the first named style of play the object is to go around the course in the fewest number of strokes, while in the latter, the idea is to win as many holes as possible regardless of what the chance for a fine score might be.

Match play is precisely the opposite. The player must not take too great chances. When he has a long approach putt to make or a putt, say, of 20 feet, he must bear in mind the fact that it is most necessary that he hole out in two strokes. First, he should try for the putt, and, if missed, must still leave the ball in a position to hole the next one.

One extra putt on a green is often quite fatal. Next he must always play well within himself at all times and not try to do the impossible.

Match play is precisely the opposite. The player must take chances, such as holing long putts, blazing over the traps or cutting off distances. Anything to give yourself the best advantage over your opponent, unless you have several strokes to spare. If you have two strokes for the hole always take them. If you should get into a sandtrap and waste several strokes in getting out and lose the hole, forget it. There are others following.
