H. Henslee, one of the jurors, is accused of having made this statement before he was chosen as one of the twelve men to try the factory superintendent.

"I believe Frank is guilty, and would like to be in a position to break his neck."

"The man who swears that the accused juror made this statement, in spite of the fact that he swore of being unprejudiced when questioned as a takerman, is C. P. Stough, organizer of the Macon Annex and a well-known business man."

Coroner's Millionaire Jury Finds Him Guilty—Shower of Money in Court to Bury Victim.

"I'm all the nonsense" he cried, "I know I killed my Anna. They don't die. This is all nonsense."

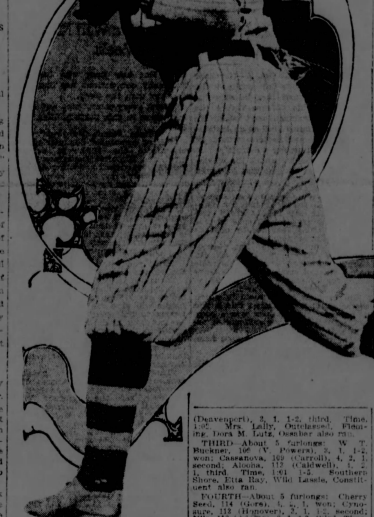

Coroner's Millionaire Jury Finds 'Roll Those Dreamy Eyes' Makes Him Guilty—Shower of Money in Court to Bury Victim.

NEW YORK, Oct. 3.—Just as the "millionaire" jury in the trial of Coroner Feinberg was today finding Hans Schmidt, the rascally defendant of the murder of Anne Amulder, a dramatic incident ensued, which interrupted the inquest.

Coroner Feinberg appealed to members of the jury, which was headed by Theodore P. Rhoads, president of the Interborough Rapid Transit Company, for funds with which to bury the dismembered body of Anna Amulder to save it from the bottom field. Before a member of the jury could move there from the back of the room, the spectacle caused some among the spectators to laugh.

Throws Credits at Crowd.

Schmidt, with a scowl on his face, stood in the chair and vented a string of beads and a croon from his throat, buried them into the crowd behind him.

In addition to Foreman Rhoads, the other members of the jury were Vincent Astor, H. W. McKim, Morton Low, Mortimer Rosenzweig, Benjamin G. Greenhut, George W. Helshoff, Charles Dickson, Edwin Martin, Howard West, Latham Reid and Patrick O'Leahy.

"Most of the members of the jury are millionaires prominent in the world of finance."

Schmidt Shows No Fear.

After hearing the evidence, he took the jury just 15 minutes to reach a verdict. This was in effect that Anna Amulder came to her death on September 2, 1913, from a hemorrhage at the hands of Hans Schmidt.

The chief witnesses against Schmidt were Police Inspector Farrell who worked up the case against the prisoner, and Mary Bann, 14 years old, who discovered part of the Amulder girl's body. Anna Heid, a child of the sixth floor, and Mattie Kelenberg.

Inspector Farrell said Schmidt had confessed to him, and even drew a diagram showing how he had cut up the victim's body.

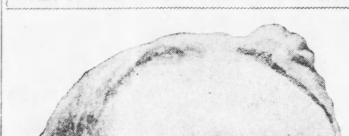

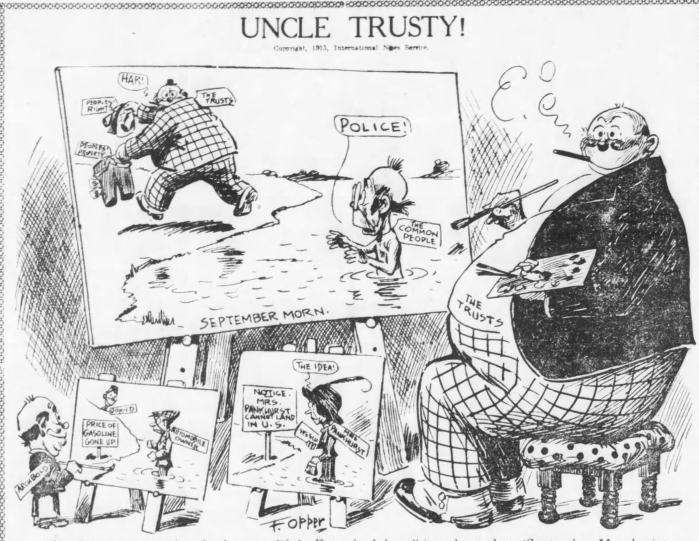

Governor Statton has been besieged by petitioners for cleanliness since he assumed the Executive office that he has been forced to adopt Governor Brown, his immediate predecessor, and restrict hearings for Thursday hereafter to the fourth Thursday and Friday in each month.

Unless he did this, he would have little, if any, time left over from his official duties to spend in the way of more immediate pressing, personal matters, the matter of cleanliness is the matter of cleanliness generally.

Governor Statton, however, devotes a very great deal of time looking into petitions for clemency, largely after office hours, once they are submitted—but he goes about it in his own way. He investigates invariably along the line most satisfactory to himself, personally and officially, and not otherwise. His is the full and final responsibility, and he governs himself accordingly.

The Governor is much more free to detail rulings when they are adverse, moreover, than when they are favorable, although he is very thorough in the latter.

His idea is that each and every case adversely acted upon will may come up again before some future Governor, and he proposes so long as he is Governor to place a complete, full and exhaustive record in the capital for future inspection. 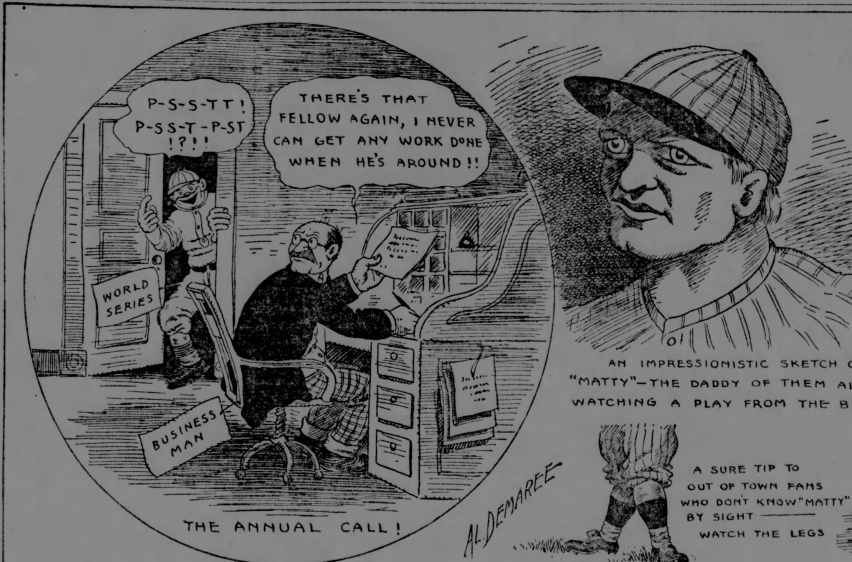

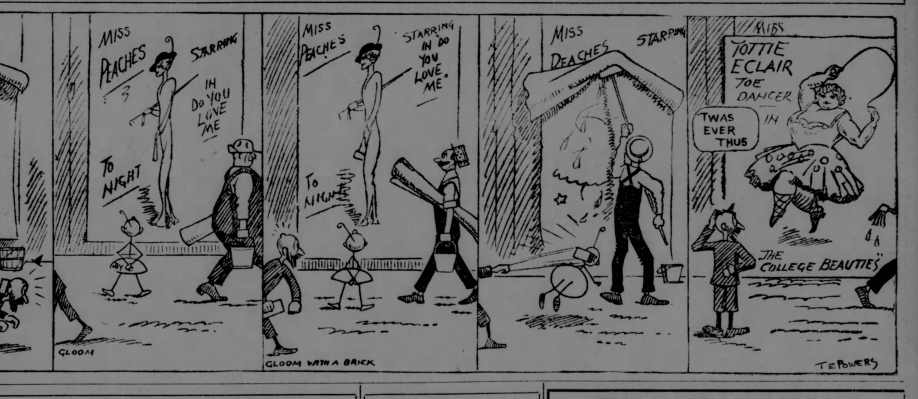

John J. McGraw—Born at Truxton, N. Y., April 7, 1873. Began playing baseball professionally in 1890, and in 1891 joined the Cedar Rapids team. Before the end of that season he was captured by the Baltimore tail-end club and played second base. When Orioles in 1911 he shifted McGraw to third, which position he played until he came to New York as manager of the New York Nationals. In 1920, McGraw, with Carter Robinson, was sold to the St. Louis National League club. In 1921, McGraw and Robinson organized a new Baltimore club and placed it in the American League. After many quarrels with Ban Johnson, president of the American League, McGraw sold out his club to the New York Nationals in the middle of the season of 1922. McGraw and several of his players were transferred to New York, of which team McGraw became manager in 1923. Under McGraw the Giants won the National League championship in 1904-5 and the world's title in 1905, led the National League in 1907, won the world's title in 1908, finished first in 1909, second in 1910 and first in 1911, 1912 and 1913. The Giants lost the National League title in 1914 and 1915 and were beaten by the Boston Red Sox.

COAL BARRONS TO SOCIALISM

Arrogance and Tax Dodging of Anthracite Operators Hastens Public Ownership.

By B. C. FORBES. The surest way for capital to hasten the arrival of Socialism is to abuse its power.

Recently a small State tax was levied upon coal, the aim being to law for public purposes a restrictive part of the enormous profits made by the anthracite Trust.

The Coal Barons instead of paying up, have coolly shifted the burden to consumers, who will not pay the tax several times over.

What excuse can they offer for their high-handed action? "None?" Let's see.

George F. Baker, "Prime Minister" leader of the Coal Barons, is head of the Reading companies. One of his coal properties is the Lehigh Valley report last week showing PROBITIVE OP AS PER CENT. The parent Reading Company has earned earnings of well over \$500,000,000, and at least 30 per cent earned on its stock.

It is so successfully complicated that no statesman arrives at the same figure. Yet the barons would not dream of allowing his company to pay any tax levied upon it. "Make the public pay!" is his dictum. And he has succeeded—thus far.

None of the other anthracite properties are starting.

Delaware, Lackawanna and Western earned July 25 per cent. It cleared, net divisible ago. Think of it—a clear, net divisible ago. Think of it—over \$100 invested in the company.

Jersey Central managed to roll 20 profits of 25 per cent, while Lehigh Valley and Delaware and Hudson each reported earnings of about 18 per cent.

How many of those upon whom the coal barons adduce the new tax are making money at any such rate? Could the anthracite companies at the average consume of household coal better afford to foot the bill—a bill intended to be presented solely to the mine owners? The question answers itself.

The coal barons have overreached the mark. Overreaching usually has disastrous results. They will learn some day. Their arrogant, arrogant action is akin to that of New York's old traction trolleys. Do the coal barons realize that they are working desperately to bring on public ownership? Are they too blind to see the handwriting on the wall? Do they know that the number of them among their best voters?

Min-hammering would seem to be part and parcel of the coal business. A coal journal of high standing will this morning offer the following advice to mine owners.

It will be just as well of course, not to have too good a showing made. The miners are in many cases assuming a very arbitrary position, and whether operating under the anthracite or the bituminous agreement are by no means in such tractable mood as one might expect as a result of an understanding mutually agreed upon.

Separation, real separation, of coal mining from railroading should be insisted upon unaccommodatingly by the Federal Government, such steps as have been taken already by the Federal Government.
