PRE JUDGE OF JURORS CHARGED BY MANY

Henslee, Accused, Threatens Suit Against Maker of Affidavit. Denies He Was Biased.

With Low M. Frank's sentence resented indefinitely and the hearing on his lawyers' motion postponed for a week, new sensations were sprung in the fight for the convicted factory superintendent's life with the revelation Saturday of the contents of a mass of affidavits charging prejudice against A. H. Henslee and Henslee's attorney, members of the trial jury.

Most of the affidavits directed at Henslee, who is charged by many persons with having expressed violent feelings on the case before he was chosen as a juror. He is accused of having expressed his conviction of Frank's guilt and his eagerness to see him hanged, and to have referred in profane terms to the prisoner's race.

The hearing of the motion for a new trial was postponed by Judge Henslee at the request of Solicitor General Henslee, when the case was called shortly after 9 o'clock Saturday morning. The Solicitor said he needed time to look into the volume of questions made by the defense in the plea setting forth 15 reasons why Frank should get a new trial. Henslee put the hearing off until next Saturday, and announced that he would be ready to answer the Solicitor more time than necessary.

Delay Is Secured Quickly. The order for an indefinite stay was issued in less than ten minutes after the hearing of the motion for a new trial was taken up.

"I have not had time in which to prepare my reply to the motion, as it was only presented to me a day or two ago, and is quite lengthy," said Solicitor Dorsey. "Therefore, I am going to ask your honor to postpone this hearing until I have time to complete my work on it."

"It is my desire to complete the case as quickly as possible, and it is imperative that it should be. The work of the Court of Appeals in bringing on this case in a way, as you are being delayed in taking up your duties here until after you have heard this motion. I think that possibly I can complete my reply by next Saturday, but in the event I find this impossible I would like for your honor to grant a further delay."

Gets Copies of Charges. "I will see this hearing for a week or two next Saturday morning, then," said Judge Ross. "I trust, however, Mr. Dorsey, that you will be prepared by the time."

"The judge then instructed the clerk to issue an order directing Judge Mangum to immediately stay the execution of the sentence."

Mr. Duray was hotly engaged Friday in examining the affidavits of the jurors. This voluminous record, as pointed out by Mr. Duray, is about 11 inches in height and is contained in seven volumes. The entire record, including the amended motion, is something like 25 inches high and is also containing with the Sulzner in examining the affidavits of the jurors.

Brands Charges as Untrue.

F. E. Winburn, claim agent for the Atlanta and West Point railroad, testified that he had seen the trial of Frack, but that he did not believe there was a man on the jury that found Frack guilty who had voted for the verdict. While I did not know any of the other jurors prior to the trial, my statement to them for that 23-day period satisfied me that they are all men of honor and integrity.'

C. A. Wisley, cashier at the Huckle Eye Cotton Oil Company, would make no extended comment on the trial.

'I was influenced by no one,' he declared. 'I heard the evidence and I think the trial was as fair as I ever saw. Judge Ross was fair and I think each man on the jury voted Frack guilty because he could not do otherwise on the evidence submitted.'

It is understood, however, that the parties at Blakely declared that Henslee had not displayed any prejudice in conversation with them.

The depositions taken at Sparta were made by John M. Holmes, of the firm of Holmes & Walker, S. M. Johnson, cashier of the same firm, and Shi Gray, who is said to have been in the store at the time Hensley made the remarks charged to him.

Sparta Men Keep Silent.

When requested for a statement of the contents of their depositions the three men declared that they preferred to keep silent; that for certain reasons they had agreed to remain quiet. The depositions were sealed and filed with the Clerk of the Criminal Court.

It is understood that the remarks alleged to have been made by Henslee in Sparta proclaimed him as being convinced of the guilt of Frank Hensley travels for a buggy concern and was in the store of Holmes & Walker in the ordinary course of his business. It is claimed that he discussed the Frank case freely while in the store.

It was generally understood Saturday Solicitor Dorsey would ask that the sealed depositions of the three Sparta men, C. P. Stough and others, be opened.

SEWAGE PLANTS ARE PRAISED BY DR. IMHOFF

German Inventor Inspects Atlanta's Disposal Equipment. Pronounces It Satisfactory.

Dr. Karl Imhoff, the German engineer who invented the type of sewage disposal plant being built in Atlanta, expressed confidence Saturday that Atlanta's plants would prove satisfactory.

He made a tour of inspection of the three plants, accompanied by Chief of Construction R. M. Clayton. The object of Dr. Imhoff's visit to America is to study sewage disposal conditions. The Peachtree Creek plant is the largest of its kind ever built in the United States. Since it was begun many engineers and city officials have visited Atlanta to study the system.

"It is not an experiment," said Dr. Imhoff. "A similar plant has been in successful operation at Essen, Germany, for seven years. They have the stamp of approval of the German Government, and altogether 139 of them are in operation."

Dr. Imhoff is a Government engineer. He has charge of sewage disposal in a large area in western Germany, inhabited by about 2,000,000 persons. The difficulties he encountered there caused him to invent a system to economically destroy sewage.

19,200,000 Cents Are Coined in September

WASHINGTON, Oct. 4.—According to a statement by the Bureau of Mints of the Treasury Department, coinage executed at the mints of the United States during the month of September was as follows:

Gross Earnings During the Last Fiscal Year Set New High Record, However.

NEW YORK, October 4.—While the Louisville and Nashville established a new high record for gross earnings during the fiscal year ended June 30, earnings available for dividends on the stock were equal to 11 6-10 per cent compared with 15 9-10 per cent the previous twelve months.

Gross increased \$2,233,911, but the total income fell off \$1,180,474. After deducting fixed charges and dividends, there was a surplus of \$3,761,565, a decrease of \$1,599,297.

Henry Walters, chairman of the board, and M. H. Smith, president of the company, announce to shareholders that funds required for the expenditure of more than \$10,000,000 in additions and betterments, together with new equipment, during the fiscal year, have been provided.

The stockholders authorized the directors to make an offer for the physical property of the North and South Alabama Railroad. The amount was not made public.

For a long time the North and South Alabama line has been controlled, operated and partly financed by the Louisville and Nashville, which owns virtually all the preferred and common stock of the Alabama company.

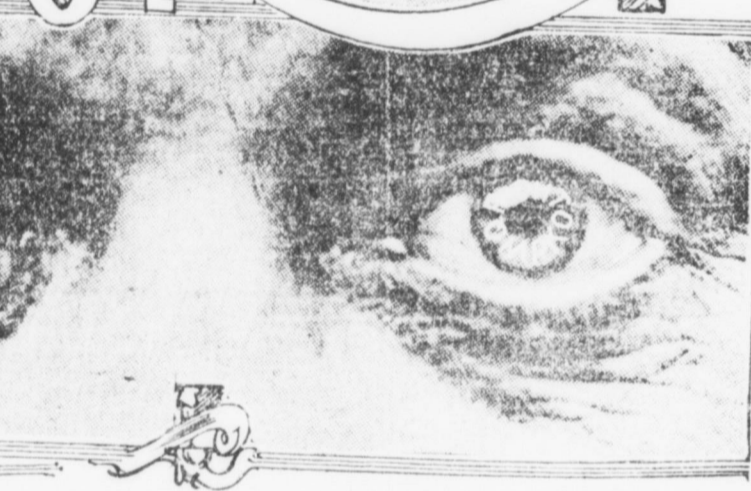

TRAFFIC ABUSES ON N. PRYOR ATTACKED

Property Owners, Some With Vacant Houses, Plan New Ordinance Against Congestion.

A movement to relieve the traffic congestion in the downtown section, especially on North Pryor street from Edgewood avenue to Peachtree street, has been launched by city officials and the Chamber of Commerce. A committee of three members of the City Council will be appointed by Mayor James G. Woodward in the next few days to confer with a committee to be appointed by Wilmer L. Moore, president of the Chamber of Commerce.

This joint committee will study the traffic laws of other cities and endeavor to select the best methods of handling the Atlanta situation. The Council committee then will confer with City Attorney James L. Mayson and draft an ordinance to be presented to Council.

The decision to appoint the committees and endeavor to relieve the situation followed a meeting of North Pryor street property owners at the Chamber of Commerce late Friday afternoon.

Among those who discussed the pressing need for relief were Mayor James G. Woodward, Wilmer L. Moore, president of the Chamber of Commerce, Police Chief James I. Beavers, Fire Chief W. B. Cummings, J. H. Porter, Oscar Davis, W. P. Waldhall, W. H. Kiser, Ronald Ransom, John E. Murray, Albert E. Thornton and Sam T. Weisman.

Mr. Moore created a stir when he said that seven stores on North Pryor street were vacant because of the congestion of traffic, and declared that if something were not done the street would soon be closed to through traffic. He cited figures prepared by Captain Robert M. Clayton, Chief of the City Construction Department, showing that in several places Pryor street is only 25 feet wide.

Whitehall Grading To Start on Oct. 15.

A delegation of merchants went before Council's Streets Committee Friday afternoon and urged that the re-grading of Whitehall street be postponed until next spring, on the ground that the beginning of the work would interfere with the holiday trade. The committee refused to reopen the matter.

It was explained that all arrangements had been made to begin the work October 15, and the estimate of Chief of Construction Clayton was that it would not require more than six weeks' time. The bump between Mitchell street and Trinity avenue is to be removed.

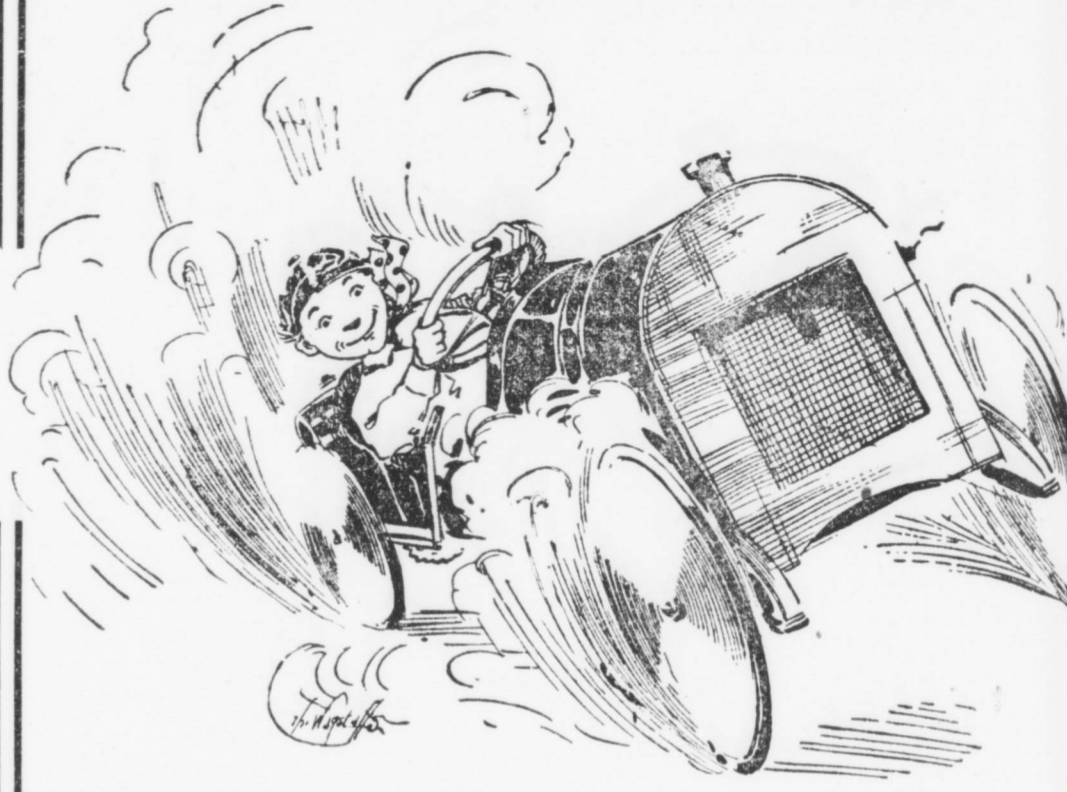

tion of Leo M. Frank, which had been set for October 19.

Following the hearing, Attorney Rosser furnished copies of most of the depositions which have been taken by the defense. The ones lacking are those made by C. P. Stough, of Atlanta, and John M. Holmes, Shil Gray and S. M. Johnson, of Sparta, Ga. Copies of which are expected to be given the Solicitor during the day.

Points Made in Depositions.
In the depositions given the Solicitor Saturday morning Juror A. H. Henslee is charged with having made remarks showing him to be biased, at the Sisk Club in Atlanta, on a train between Atlanta and Experiment, Ga., and in front of a livery stable at Albany, Ga. These expressions were to the effect that he believed there was no doubt of Frank's guilt; that he was glad Frank had been indicted; that his neck should be broken; that Frank should be lynched, and that if he were on the jury he would hang him sure.

Some of the depositions charged that Johnening had made the remark that Frank was undoubtedly guilty, and that he had spoken forcibly and positively.

Depositions furnished the Solicitor were made by H. C. Loewenhart, Mrs. J. G. Loewenhart, Miss Miriam Loewenhart, S. A. Mack Parkas, R. L. Gremer, J. J. Nunnally, W. L. Pickett, J. A. Lehman, Samuel Boorstin, Mrs. A. Shurman, Sampson Kay, B. M. Kay, Miss Martha Kay, Charles J. Moore, W. B. Gatz, J. H. G. Cochran and H. G. Williams.

Charge Jury Heard Cheers.
These depositions alleged that the cheering by the crowd outside of the courthouse was plainly audible to the jury and that it would have been plainly impossible for the members of the jury not to have heard it. One man charged that a man in the courtroom spoke to him, and was sharply reprimanded by Chief Deputy Sheriff Plennie Miner.

One deposition charges Juror Smith with having gazed out of a third floor window in the Kimball House at the cheering crowd on Pryor street.

The additional affidavits, besides those of Stough and the three Spartans charging Juror Henslee with having displayed prejudice, were made by R. L. Gremer and Mack Parkas of Albany; Julian A. Lehman, of Atlanta, and Sam Aaron, of Atlanta.

"There can be no doubt but that Frank is guilty," are the words credited to Henslee by Gremer and Parkas. They charge him with making this assertion in front of the Sam Parkas livery stable in Albany some time prior to the trial. They assert that they know Henslee well, and can identify him as the man making this remark by pictures of Juror Henslee which appeared in The Georgian.

Another Instance Cited.
On June 2 Juror Henslee is charged with remarking on a train that "Frank is as guilty as a dog and ought to have his neck broken." Julian A. Lehman makes this deposition, charging the remark was made on a train between Atlanta and Experiment, Ga. He charges him with having made practically the same remark on June 20.

In a deposition by Samuel A. Cron remarks made at the Elks Club in Atlanta two days after the Grand Jury indicted Frank are credited to Henslee. Cron asserts that at the time the remarks were made he did not know Henslee's name, but learned it later. The words he alleged were spoken by Henslee were: "I am glad they indicted the Jew. They ought to take him out and lynch him, and if I get on the jury I will hang that Jew sure."

The depositions charging Johnening with showing bias were made by Mrs. Jennie G. Loewenhart, her daughter, Miss Miriam Loewenhart, and H. C. Loewenhart.

Tell of Words to Juror.
Mrs. Loewenhart and Miss Loewenhart assert that they met Johnening on Forsyth street one day in May, and that he expressed belief in Frank's guilt and that his statements were made "forcibly and positively."

H. C. Loewenhart, who is connected with the Hodges Broom Works, asserted that Johnening had also expressed to him his belief in Frank's guilt.

W. P. Neill made an affidavit declaring he saw a man in the courtroom seize one of the jurors' hands and speak to him while the jury was passing out of the courtroom.

Neill asserts that Chief Deputy Sheriff Plennie Miner saw the act and threatened to put the man out of the courtroom, charging him with speaking to the juror.

"I could not understand what the man said," Neill states in the affidavit. Neill also asserted that he was in the courtroom when the jury was passing out of the courtroom and that the cheering was plainly audible to the jury.

"If I could hear cheering," Attorney Charles J. Moore asserts that he was in his office at No. 331 Nassau Building at 6 p. m. August 23, and heard the crowd cheer Solicitor Rosser as he left the courthouse.

INUNCTIONSUIT IS NOT AWFUL, SAYS JORDAN

Justice Says Deputy Only Did Duty in Attaching Millers' Property for Debt.

Declaring Constable D. S. Sutton only did his duty when he levied upon the property of Mr. and Mrs. W. K. Miller, Jr., 507 West Peachtree street, to satisfy a grocery bill of \$67, Justice of the Peace W. T. Jordan has issued a reply to statements made by the Millers in an injunction they have started against him.

The Millers characterize Jordan as a "man with no regard for the law, and with an armed band of pirates operating under him, who prey upon the defenseless by a show of firearms, slingshots and handcuffs, and terrorize the unfortunate into exorbitant settlements, and generally come under cover of darkness."

"The attachment under which Constable Sutton made the levy," Justice Jordan said, "showed that the Millers were absconding and concealing themselves, and resisting legal arrest, and were causing their property to be moved beyond the limits of the State."

The only charge they make against me is that Mr. S. Scott, to whom their bill is due and for whom the levy was made, is not solvent and did not make a legal bond. The suit the Millers have brought against me is unlawful, for section 452 of the Code says no suit shall be brought against a Justice of the Peace unless notice shall be served one month prior.

The Millers allege that Constable Sutton came to their home August 18, while they were visiting in Commerce and levied on \$3,500 worth of goods to satisfy a \$65 debt. One of the pieces of property seized by Sutton, a \$150 shotgun, they claim has disappeared, and they assert also that the original papers in the case cannot be found.

Judge Bell, before whom the suit was filed, has temporarily appointed the sale of the goods and appraised Sheriff C. W. Mangum receiver.

Rich Widow Pursues Sutor at Savannah
SAVANNAH, Oct. 4.—Francis S. Green, the dashing young Savannah boy whom Mrs. Hannah S. Whildin, elderly and wealthy Camden, N. J., widow, alleges installed himself in her affections with promises to marry and subsequently wheedled her out of several thousand dollars, has disappeared.

Mrs. Whildin arrived in Savannah today to look after her suit to recover what she claims as her property. She said that in addition to being defrauded out of property, she paid Green \$10,000 annually for three years to manage her Camden estate, yielding an annual income of \$45,000. Green's address is given by her as No. 617 Maison Blanche Building, New Orleans.

Griffin Fire Chief Commits Suicide
GRIFPIN, Oct. 4.—Fire Chief M. E. Morris, who committed suicide Friday evening by shooting himself in the temple with a revolver, dying within twenty minutes, was buried this afternoon following funeral services at the First Baptist Church.

For more than fifteen years Morris had been chief of the Griffin fire department and City Sexton. He served Spalding County as Sheriff for six years and had been a member of the City Council. He is survived by his wife and one daughter. He was 51 years of age.

'Wolf' Lamar Tries To Block Extradition
WASHINGTON, Oct. 4.—David Lamar, held on a charge of impersonating a Congressman, was suspended by his bondsmen to-day. Lamar had been held in \$3,000 bail for trial in New York October 7. His lawyers appealed to the District Supreme Court for a writ of habeas corpus.

The action of his bondsmen in surrendering him was taken to checkmate the contention of United States attorneys that by giving bond Lamar already had waived extradition proceedings.

Man Grabs Woman's Purse on Peachtree
Detectives are hunting a clew to the man who snatched a purse containing about \$20 from Miss Anne Belle Green, No. 46 Brotherton street, while she was passing the Douglas shoe store on Peachtree street, within 80 feet of Five Points, late Friday afternoon.

It is not known whether the thief was a white man or a negro.

General Kell was famous during the Civil War as commander of the private Alabama. The photograph is full length in Confederate uniform.

Before his departure he took a departing shot at William Barnes, Jr., Republican boss, declaring that a political statement credited to Barnes was one of his "usual lies."

The wind was blowing at the rate of 40 miles an hour as the Colonel mounted the bridge and bowed to his admirers on shore. At first he tried to hold his big felt hat on his head, but he had to give this up after several gusts had caught him full force.

His chief interest probably lies in the proposed penetration of the interior of Brazil with a party of fellow naturalists under auspices of the American Museum of Natural History, but the earlier part of the six months which he will spend in South America will be devoted to addresses upon American democracy, which he has been invited to deliver before universities and other bodies.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 4.—Though the Commerce Court is abolished, the Federal judges assigned thereto will continue in office under the terms of the deficiency appropriation bill, as passed by the Senate to-day.

The bill carries appropriations exceeding \$3,000,000, an increase of \$1,800,000 over the House measure.

The police have two white boys under suspicion, and an arrest is expected soon. The boys, it is claimed by detectives, were observed playing around the car, and one of them was seen to crank the engine and start the machine.

FIGHT OF SULZER AIDE, PLAN OF TAMMANY

Indictment of Cabinet Member, as Counter to Governor's Graft Charge, Likely To Be Asked.

ALBANY, N. Y., Oct. 4.—"Governor Sulzer will command nineteen votes on the final verdict, and thus will escape conviction of the impeachment charges."

"Governor Sulzer can command but six votes, and will be convicted." These conflicting claims were made to-day by the rival managers in the high court of impeachment where William Sulzer is on trial.

Both sides professed confidence as Sulzer's lawyers prepared his defense, but the partisans of the managers of impeachment ridiculed the claims of the defense. According to the anti-Sulzer faction, but four members of the Senate and two members of the Court of Appeals will vote in favor of Mr. Sulzer.

Representatives of Tammany were reported to be preparing for a counter fight against Governor Sulzer's charges of graft by asking for the indictment of one of the members of the Sulzer administration.

The name of the official in question and the nature of the charge were kept secret. This would have an important bearing upon the impeachment trial.

Officials of the administration claim to know nothing of Tammany activity against any member of the State cabinet, and declare that no grounds exist for indictment.

Counsel for the defense made their final plans to-day for the real opening of the fight in behalf of the impeached Governor before the court Monday. These plans include the calling of witnesses to refute each of the eight articles of impeachment.

The ruling of the court in favor of admitting all evidence made it necessary for the defense to call witnesses to meet each charge. Later the admissibility of such testimony will be decided.

It is probable the defense will not be based so strongly on testimony as on points of law.

ton Bag and Cotton Mills among the largest users of pulp in the United States, is not far off from the new tariff which puts pulp on the free list.

"We fought for years," says Mr. Ebasco, "for the reason that we believe removal of duty from pulp will cause that material to be substituted to a great extent for cotton in making certain sack-making works and other various products."

"It is our estimate that between 1926 and 1930 pulp of various kinds will be shipped to the United States in quantities of 2,000,000 tons, but it will affect the textile mills in the same manner as the sugar mills in the same manner as the Atlanta mills not to be affected except perhaps by greater competition from mills now making free goods which may turn to coarse, but mills in the Carolinas will be hurt, I believe."

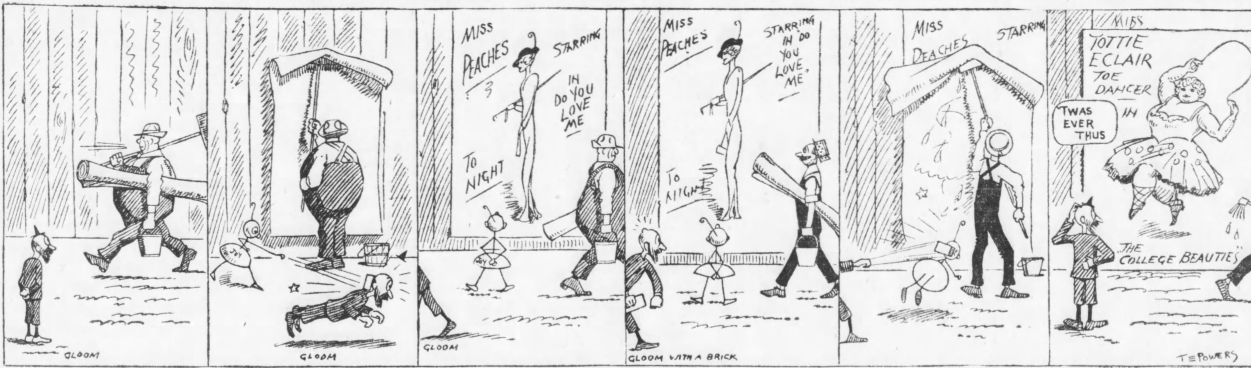

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COAL TRUSTS FIRST PAID TO SOCIALISM

Arrogance and Tax Dodging of Anthracite Operators Hastens Public Ownership.

By B. C. FORBES.

The surest way for capital to hasten the arrival of Socialism is for capital to abuse the powers. Among the most effective promoters of Socialism in this country are the coal barons. Their defiance of the public knows no bounds.

Recently, a small State tax was levied upon coal, the aim being to give for public purposes a negligible part of the enormous profits made by the Anthracite Trust.

The coal barons, instead of paying up, have boldly shifted the burden to consumers, who now pay the tax several times over.

What excuse can they offer for their ill-handled action? Poverty? Let's see.

George F. Baer, the "Divine Right" leader of the Coal Barons, is head of the Reading government. He is head of his coal properties leased his annual report last week showing PROFITS up 44 PER CENT.

Reading Company has just announced earnings of well over \$20,000,000 and at least 10 per cent earned on its stock—the bookkeeping is so successfully complicated that no two stations arrive at the same figure.

None of the other anthracite properties are starting.

Delaware, Lackawanna and Western earned July 33 per cent. It reported net low gain. Think of it—a respectable profit of 33 on every \$100 invested in the company?

Lehigh Central managed to roll up profits of 25 per cent, while Lehigh Valley and Delaware and Hudson each reported earnings of about 14 per cent.

How many of you upon whom the coal barons added the new tax are making money at any such rate? Would the anthracite companies add the average consumer of household coal before adding to the bill? Will he intend to do the same with the mine owners? The question answers itself.

The coal barons have overthrown the market, increasing unreasonably the price of coal. Their greed amounts to a public robbery. When capital concentrates that it can not control a public resource without flagrantly harming the public, then public ownership becomes a duty.

Do the coal barons realize that they are mortgaging democracy to bring in public ownership? Are they too blind to see the handwriting on the wall? Do they know that the coal barons are the number one among their best voters? Do the anthracite trusts regard the public as a mere means to an end? Do they know that their coal fields are as long as the ballista pour into their mouths the coal of the people?
