The fact that a number of trade treaties probably will be abrogated by the clause do not worry Mr. Underwood.

He thinks that the United States is well able to care for itself, should European nations attempt commercial reprisals.

MYSTERY IN HAUG CASE DEEPENS

PRISONERS CHAINED IN DUNGEON, CHARGES HAWTHORNE, FREED

Julian Hawthorne, the novelist, a free man Wednesday, after serving a term in the Atlanta Federal Penitentiary, told a startling story of his life as a convict, in which he called the Atlanta prison a "living hell," and said Warden Moyer was "unfit."

With all the emphasis at his command, Hawthorne arraigned conditions in the penitentiary as repulsive, cruel, and the equal of the most lurid descriptions in fiction.

"They are starving men in the name of economy," he said. And Dr. W. J. Morton, of New York, his friend and fellow prisoner, nodded his head in corroboration.

"Prisoners are subjected to treatment that is nothing more than slow murder," said Dr. Morton, who is a practicing physician. "There is never enough to eat. The warden attempts to feed strong men on 9 cents a day, and when he succeeds he brags about it."

In the short time they remained in Atlanta after their release, Hawthorne and Dr. Morton talked much of conditions at the penitentiary, jumping from one detail to the other with a dramatic swiftness that made the story harrowing.

"Oh, yes, you hear of the clean cells in which the prisoners sleep," said Hawthorne. "But you never hear of the 'hole,' do you? For the slightest fault, sometimes for breaking a plate, sometimes for a little more or less, a prisoner is sent to the 'hole,' a place under the main building for solitary confinement.

"There the heat is terrific at times, and the stench is bad. There some prisoners are chained by their wrists, and held thus with arms outstretched for hours. And sometimes, confinement in the 'hole' is for days."

HAITIAN RIOTS STORY STARTS PROBE

GEN. HUERTA DESERTED BY AIDES

President Fears Assassination as Former Supporters Turn Against Him--Situation Critical.

Special Cable to The Atlanta Georgian. MEXICO CITY, Oct. 15.—The situation of Huerta here is becoming critical. A mob of students today started a riot by denouncing American and all other foreigners.

The mob was subdued in a brief encounter with the police, but further trouble is looked for to-night.

Huerta's supporters are deserting him and the cabinet are making preparations to guard against assassination.

Woman Held as Plottor. A Spanish woman has been arrested on a charge of attempting to poison Senator Aldrich, Minister of the Interior.

Because of the proclamation of Huerta that he has taken over the duties of Congress four judges of the Supreme Court have resigned. It is reported that Huerta has ordered their arrest on a charge of sedition.

The forces of Federal troops had been for the protection of the Mexican capital was weakened today.

President Huerta within twelve hours after representatives of six foreign nations had decided to report to their home governments that warships and a guard of 5,000 soldiers were necessary to assure the safety of foreigners.

Catholic Nun Arrested. Detaining the sister taken over by the Bishop of Great Britain, France, Spain, Cuba, Guatemala and Norway, General Huerta ordered 1,000 soldiers to proceed to the north and aid in the attempt to capture Huerta.

The forces refused to comment on Huerta's action, but immediately notified their home governments of the weakened condition of the defense.

The situation became more tense today as a result of the arrest of Donato Ferris, a Catholic Deputy, on a charge of plotting against the Government.

When Huerta raided the Chamber of Deputies, his agents searched the Catholics, who had supported him, but Ferris' arrest, said some of their leaders.

Mrs. Crabb's physician suspected poison was the direct cause of her death. An autopsy was performed and the stomach and other organs were sent to the State Chemist in Atlanta for analysis. The report of this analysis declared there was no trace of poison.

In his confession the prisoner, who was on parole at the time of the slaying, said he had been on the Atlantic coast in Dallas and was almost penniless. Seeing the young woman alone in the office, he entered for the purpose of robbery. When Miss Brown refused to unlock the safe, he killed her.

DETECTIVE STEEL HOLDS TO SLAYING THEORY IN DOROTHY HAIG MURDER

THOMASVILLE, Oct. 18.—Despite the finding of a bullet in the brain of Miss Dorothy Haig at the autopsy held yesterday afternoon, there are many people who still believe that the girl was slain, there being many peculiar features of the case still to be explained before the murder theory is abandoned. The coroner's jury met again this afternoon.

Among those who cling to the belief that Miss Haig was murdered is F. C. Peace, the Pinkerton detective who has been employed by the Commissioners of Thomas County, who has made a thorough investigation of the case.

Without allowing his intentions to become known, Peace quietly left the city this morning for Blairsville, for the purpose of learning more regarding the possible suitors of Miss Haig in that city.

Peace is not satisfied that the revolver from which the bullet found in the dead girl's brain was fired belonged to her. It is understood that he will investigate the report that she purchased a weapon while living in Blairsville.

It now appears that most of the statements made by the girl's mother concerning the condition of Miss Haig's body when found in her room at the Southern Home were either misunderstood or that the mother was too distracted by the tragedy to make her meaning plain.

Reports that the girl was found in bed with the covering pulled up around her face or head. In this case there is no doubt that the girl was lying on her right hand covered and left hand uncovered. According to this report, Miss Haig shot herself.

There are also conflicting statements regarding the location of the pistol when found, one being that it was on the floor and the other that it was on Miss Haig's bed. When the weapon was lifted and turned downward a small stream of blood flowed from it.

Dr. T. M. McIntosh, who examined the body after it was found and expressed the opinion that the blow that killed the girl was probably dealt by a man because the girl's skull was fractured, had his theory considerably shattered when the bullet was found after the skull was open yesterday.

He thinks it possible, however, that the pistol from which the shot was fired may have been pressed so close to the girl's left temple that all of the vibration caused by the discharge of the weapon expended itself within the dome cavity. This might account, he thinks, for the fact that the girl's skull was so severely fractured that when the pieces were separated the entire front portion of Miss Haig's brain was exposed.

No One Heard Shot. Another peculiar feature of the case arises from the fact that no one but the hand that heard a shot, but this might also be explained by the fact that the pistol was pressed close to the head to avoid such a muffled noise.

A number of powder marks on the head is also puzzling. Colonel T. N. Hopkins, who has charge of the investigation in the absence of County Attorney Wilkes, who is detained in Mobile for the absence of the County Court. This is also one of the main reasons why Detective Peace is unwilling to abandon the murder theory.

It is pointed out by some, however, that Miss Haig, if really a suicide, might have made a map of her hair and have placed the weapon against it when she fired. In this case there would probably be no powder marks on her face or head. If, as is reported in some quarters, Miss Haig was thought out the means of accomplishing her death months in advance and a detail of disfigurement her appearance to look even in death, might have led to precautions to prevent powder marks. It is also recalled as possible that she had been murdered to save the feelings of members of her family.

Baffling Features to Case. Whatever the present status of the strange case, which is the sole topic of conversation here today, our present nothing but conjectural conclusions, almost any theory of death plausible.

Mrs. Haig's story that she heard a shot one day as she approached the door of her room just before the death of her daughter, has not been satisfactory. The fact that the room was unlocked all the time she lived there, and that she continues to sleep in the case in her family.

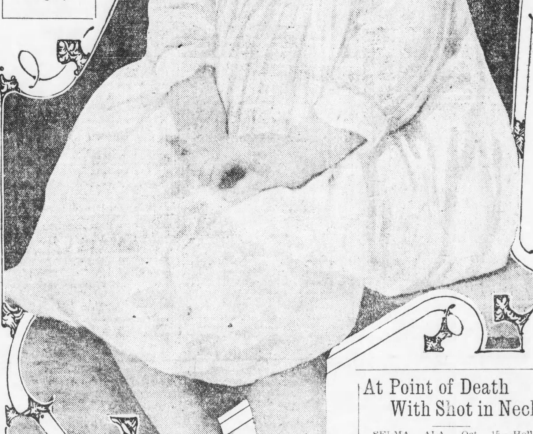

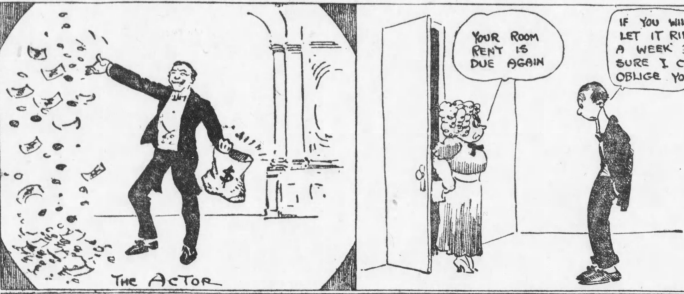
