Local thermometers marked 99.4 degrees. Prediction of thundershowers and cooler weather Sunday brings hope of relief to suffering city.

Atlanta had the hottest day since July 19, 1887, when the mercury reached 100 degrees at the weather bureau. That was recorded at just a few minutes after 4 o'clock.

It is the second highest on the records of 1887. By a curious coincidence, Saturday was the 26th anniversary of that occasion. On that historic day the thermometer registered exactly 100 degrees of temperature.
