WASHINGTON, Dec. 12.—A crop
of 6,542,850,000 pounds of cotton,
the largest since 1912, has been
announced today by the
United States department of
agriculture.

This is the third in size, that
of 1912, which amounted to 6,458,900,
and the second and that of
1911, when 6,811,710,000 pounds
were grown, being second.

This year's crop probably will be
the most valuable ever grown in the
United States.

At the average farm value of
cotton on November 1, which was
33 cents a pound, it is worth
\$215,000,000.

REPRIMAND IS WORST EXPECTED FOR TURNER

Some Believe He Will Be Exonerated, Few Expect Committee to Favor Removal

The committee that is investigating charges against City Electrician R. C. Turner met shortly after 12:30 o'clock Friday afternoon in city hall and went into executive session to make their decision. Whatever decision they make will go to the general council in the form of a recommendation.

There are three recommendations the committee can make. First, they can recommend that the electrician be exonerated.

Second, they can recommend that the electrician be reprimanded.

Third, they can recommend that the electrician be removed from office.

While members of the committee, of course, have not discussed the matter, they expressed their opinions as to what the recommendation should be. The general belief in city hall is that their recommendation, at the most, will go no further than advising council to reprimand the electrician. A good many believe they will exonerate him. Few expect the committee to recommend his removal.

The investigation was finished at 5:30 Thursday afternoon, after a session which lasted over an hour. Nearly half of which was used by Attorney Alden Chambers in cross-examination of Turner.

The attorney undertook to bring out that Turner did not use money given him last year by the electrical contractor to pay his advertising bills to the newspapers, as he had claimed at the previous session of the probe, but that he had used the money for personal bills and had paid the remainder later.

When the examination of Turner was finished, Attorney Carl Hutchison, representing Turner, but who did not stand. These consisted of four or five electrical contractors who testified they are not and never had been members of an association and that Turner always treated them "fair and square."

Attorney Hutchison declared the prosecution had fallen through completely. They charged Turner with discrimination and with fraud, he said. "We have proven neither. Every contractor out on the stand was sworn that Turner is always fair and square. As to the graft charge, graft cannot be shown unless it is proven that there was a bargain on the part of the official to whom the money was given."

Mr. Turner's friends among the electrical contractors advised that the money was simply made up a purse to help him pay his expenses. What was the harm in that?

Attorney Chambers declared that the main charge preferred by the client the Cotton States Electric company had been proven to be untrue.

First, as to alleged electrical installations to be made without permits, that the Cotton States Electric company had no right to sue for such work.

Second, as to metal mounting before other in other cases, but that the Cotton States Electric company had no right to sue for such work.

Third, as to Turner oversteering his car in other cases, but that the Cotton States Electric company had no right to sue for such work.

Fourth, as to Turner's alleged failure to pay his advertising bills, but that the law plainly says the electrician had no such authority.

Last, but not least, of all, said Attorney Chambers, was the charge of Turner's alleged failure to obtain the consent of the electrical contractors' association. He declared he was up to the electrician on this point, that the facts were understood, and it was for them to say whether Turner in accepting the money acted properly or improperly.

CONVICT WHO ESCAPED NOW SEEKS A PAROLE

Negro Serving Term for Murder Returned When He Got Religion

Dutton Kell, a negro life-terminator, who made his escape from a south Georgia convict camp more than ten years ago, remained at large in Florida for seven years and then returned to Georgia and gave himself up after "getting religion," has petitioned Governor Sherman for a parole and the state prison commission in Florida passed on the petition favorably in 1910, given a life sentence, and transferred to a reformatory camp in south Georgia.

It was before the convict lease system abolished. Kelly claims he was mistreated and for that reason escaped from the camp. After locating in Florida under another name, the negro married and by his sober and industrious conduct made many friends among the white people.

At a revival in 1910 both he and his wife were converted. He then became troubled in conscience because he had an unserved sentence hanging over him in Georgia. He said he and his wife prayed over the matter for a year, when they came to the conclusion that it was his Christian duty to return to this state and surrender. He did so in December, 1911, and gave himself up to Sheriff W. F. Persons, of Jasper county. Afterwards he was sent to the state farm at Milledgeville, where he now is. Although Kelly has served thirteen years.

"Fine Feathers" Is Not So Clever as the Company

All-Star Cast Shines in Walter Play, Which Starts in Dull Way and Leaves Mixed Morals

There are so many morals to be drawn from "Fine Feathers" besides that one about their making jail birds that it's hard to make a choice. But here is some of the sage counsel in the Eugene Hayes play at the Atlanta Thursday night.

Be good and you'll be happy, if you never do pay the butcher. If you need tainted money, let somebody else steal it for you. Then you'll still have your mocking laugh when the curtain drops.

And when all is over, when the stage is darkened and only Wilton Lackaye's square yard of glistening shirt front is visible through the gloom, you sniff the acrid smoke from Bob Edson's fatal revolver, reach for your hat and wonder if you'll make the train or have to wait. You have been interested of course, but hardly enthusiastic.

The chief fault of "Fine Feathers," if one may differ from the admirers who sent it across in New York, is that for as many nights as the press agent could so conveniently, is that it's too full of conversation. If the manager would hand out with every ticket a neatly printed synopsis of the first two acts, folk could take time for a nap after dinner, arrive at 10 o'clock and then go on with the story very pleasantly.

It's one of those plays where the young couple are struggling along in the suburbs, trying to keep the installment man from the door. Along comes John Brand, a magnate and monopolist, and offers Bob Reynolds (Bob's the amateur show owner) \$10,000 to help in an innocent little swindle. Bob, who usually refuses, scorns the paltry gold (as usual in plays, novels and dramas) and shows the villain the exit. But Jane (that's Mrs. Bob) has the conversation, insists that Bob do business with Brand, takes steps to force him into it, and they get rich over night.

The scene changes from humble happiness to marble mansioned misery. They are wealthy now, but Bob has taken to hitting the Hennessy, devoting most of this act to absorbing large numbers full, each carrying enough to throw a mule. He has blown his bill, covered all his creditors, and drawn a phony check for ten-thous which will come back tomorrow and a warrant with it. Bob decides to get \$50,000 more from Brand, who objects. There's talk of prison for all concerned, including friend wife, when Bob finds a happy solution of all his problems. That is the climax.

Bob: "I've found the way, dear, Good-by." Fringing and fervid kiss upon Jane's upturned lips. Goes to telephone, upstage.

Bob: "Hello! Give me 5284. Police station, please. A couple of cops wanted to 49 Washington Drive. Yes! It's a case of murder!" Jane, excitedly, "Oh!" Bob presses button, turns off the lights, pulls the trigger of a young cannon, and falls. From the doorway comes the hoarse, guttural question of John Brand: Brand: "Come! Then it's all right. Suicide is confession, and that lets me out."

And Dick Meade comforts the widow as she sobs. I forgot to say anything about Meade. That's Max Fleming. He usually is a reporter on The New York Post, which is inexcusable carelessness. The Post uses journalists, editors and contributors, but no reporters. He is the stage friend, the Watson, the letter on the screen, the chap they put in every play to tie the pieces of plot together, listen to the story of her past and give wise advice when called upon. He is in on everything, from confidential and criminal conversations to the scene where Jane tells Bob she can't pay her fee bill. If he has five in a play with one of those stage friends in it, there are moments when one wants to be alone.

His all-star company was three. Just the name, Robert Edson had most of the hard work to do and he did it well. From the happy chemist, of the first act to the troupe-raised speculator of the last, Wilton Lackaye, who fits his evening clothes better than any man I know, was just as instructive as a villain as ever. Max Fleming did the best he could with the friend's role, but it was a shame to unload it on him.

Loafing Dickson as Peter, the feeble servant, was delightful in her three or four "lute" appearances. Miss Chisholm made a fine old Irish suburbanite, and Florence Rockwell, who was substituted for Lolla Robinson as the wife, handled her role ably. There is no fault to be found with the cast. Not for that matter, with the play, for a show of this character is a matter of individual taste. The I think that a good connoisseur could extract an hour of talk from "Fine Feathers" without losing an ounce of its savor.

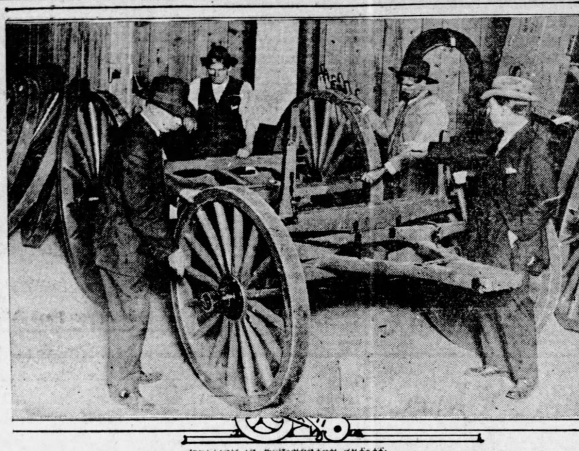

BOMB, EXPRESS PACKAGE, KILLS WOMAN IN PLANT

Parcel Addressed to Bottling Works Man Explodes as Girl Opens It

LINES TO PRES-GOV. TENNER.

You've rambled on in politics through Grand Old Pennsylvania; You've mingled where the criss-cross stuff you thought was fairly ripe; And so perhaps you think you know the inside art of mania or other hectic sketches of the hurly-burly type.

But ere you start in joyful mood To spin a ribald cheer, Just wait till you've been preyed of The N. L. for a year.

You've played the game of politics, which in its way is had enough, For slipping by with certain things quite rudely out of joint; You know in that game what they'll pull, and most of it is had enough, But breaking into baseball, sir, is quite another point.

I do not like to wake you, sir, From such a pleasant dream, But wait until next May you're ruled Against some N. L. team.

The main fault that we had to find with ex-President Lynch, of the N. L. was that he did not rise up upon certain occasions, and, deftly swinging an iron-studded mace, crack a few skulls within fairly close reach.

Along the same line of thought, we understand that the N. L. elected Gov. Tenner because he was in a position to add dignity to the league. Success for the National League doesn't depend upon any added "dignity" that Gov. Tenner might lend, but mainly upon the quality of his "right swing for the jaw," or the impetus he can impart to a healthy swing with the right or left hoof. The N. L. is in a fine position to talk of dignity so far as its inner councils are concerned.

"What ranking," queries E. J. V., "would you give to Harry Costello, of Georgetown, as a football player?" We have never seen Costello, but those who have and are in a position to know tell us he is one of the best there happens to be—East, West, North or South. The same is even more so of Wagner, of Pittsburg U., who upon one of the larger elevens would have been hailed as the greatest end in the land. Too frequently, in collecting the fame of this game, it isn't so much what you are, but where you play.

SURGING ON TO APRIL.

National league managers, assembled under one roof this week, agreed upon one proposition—that there are three or four clubs in the circuit where the addition of one or two first-class men would turn an average ball club into an almost sure winner. Outside of the Giants, who are still on top, the addition of two men in the right places would put Philadelphia, Pittsburg, Chicago and Boston beyond the reach of want.

This does about Boston may carry a queer ring, but it's true for all that part of it. If two recruits come through for Stallings and he draws his share of the brass, the once blighted Braves will be up around the crest mixing it to a finish. Which is something of a tribute to Mr. Stallings when one recalls the general aspect of the Braves at this date just one brief season ago, that date no one would have ever thought that the addition of eight men would be of any particular use.

INTERSECTIONAL FOOTBALL.

We may be entirely incorrect and out of gear about it, but we believe the time is on the way when intersectional football will be considered one of the big features of each year. There is a broadening influence which comes to the meeting of section vs. section, and a trifle higher tone to the play. For when the same old rivals meet year after year with nothing to break in upon it, there is always the tendency to consider this sort of game more of a contest. Defeats in such case carry a deeper sting and grudges are carried on into another year. But there is no great tradition—no past grudge to remember. And while the interest would be general, it would be far less frenzied.

We would like to answer Mr. Shakespeare's query, "What's in a name?" just once more. When a bell boy pagged the Hon. Charles Webb Murphy at the recent National league meeting, no one answered and a pleasant time was had by all.

The most cheerful bloke at the N. L. gathering by all odds was Mr. F. Clarke, of Pittsburg. He was fairly buoyant. Not an expert had picked his club to finish first.

Tiger Alumni Urge Change In Coaching

Local Sewanee Men Favor Plan to Give Cope More Assistance in Teaching Football to the Tigers

That a decided change will be made in the coaching system at Sewanee next fall was proven at an informal discussion of athletic affairs on the mountain by local Sewanee men gathered at a meeting of the Atlanta Alumni association Thursday night.

R. F. Fisher, president of the associated alumni, was present, and announced that both officials of the university and alumni all over the country would take steps before next fall to increase the efficiency of the present method of instilling football tactics into the Tiger recruits.

It was the unanimous opinion of all present that any success Sewanee might have had within the last few years was due almost solely to the efforts of Harris Cope. That he had been going it alone and that it was now high time he was given more help, was the expressed sentiment of the meeting.

It was stated on good authority that by next fall one and probably two men would be added to the Sewanee coaching staff. It was pointed out that Sewanee's biggest successes on the gridiron in recent years came when Cope was working together with Henry Phillips, former Tiger guard, now pastor of an Episcopal church at LaGrange, Ga.

As it probably would be impossible to get Phillips back on the mountain in the capacity of coach, another man of his type will be the aim of the university. Everybody present at the meeting had one big boost for the alumni coaching system, and it is believed that any man who is prepared to help Cope will be an ex-Tiger.

Cope is now at his home in Cartersville, Ga. The three-year contract which he signed in 1911 lasts through next fall, and every effort will be made to get him to renew it.

While no definite action was taken

as to the choice of any man to help Cope, it is not improbable that a coach from this neck of the woods will be picked. It was suggested that one of the two men who made the Sewanee Military academy prep champions of the south this year be nabbed for the job.

Free discussion of Sewanee's chances in football next year went on at the meeting and it was agreed that they were fairly bright. The possibility of the adoption of the new one-year rule at the coming meeting of the Southern Intercollegiate Athletic Association loomed up as the dark cloud on the horizon.

It was felt that while this rule might hit Sewanee harder than any other school in the association, barring as it would the recruits expected from the championship Sewanee Military academy eleven, yet the general opinion was that Sewanee would sacrifice its own position for the furtherance of southern athletics. At the same time, it was pointed out, if the rule is so qualified that it will not apply to colleges of less than 250 or 400 students, Sewanee would be helped rather than hindered by it.

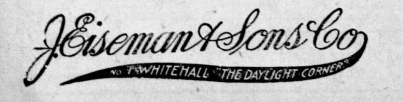
