CHARLES BECKER IS GRANTED NEW TRIAL BY APPEALS COURT

Case of New Police Lieutenant, Convicted for Murder of Gambler Rosenthal, Is Sent Back for Retrial

VOTE OF THE JUDGES STANDS SIX TO ONE

Conviction of Four Gunmen Who Appealed With Becker for New Trial, Were Unanimously Affirmed

(By Associated Press.) ALBANY, N. Y., Feb. 24.—A new trial today was granted Charles Becker, the former New York police lieutenant under death sentence for the murder of gambler Rosenthal, by the court of appeals. The court stood 6 to 1 in favor of the new trial. The conviction of the four gunmen who appealed with Becker, was unanimously affirmed.

The reversal was based entirely on errors held to have been committed by Becker's defense during the trial. The question of the weight of evidence against Becker entered in no way into the opinion, though it was discussed.

Judge Venable held the conviction should be affirmed because the main facts needed to prove Becker's guilt were not in dispute. He said that the fact that the main witnesses were gamblers, criminals, depositors and murderers, would have nothing to do with the decision. He said there was no evidence that Becker was in the room at the time of the shooting.

GRAND JURORS REFUSE TO INDICT LOCKER CLUBS

'Majority Thinks Investigation Now Not to Public's Best Interest,' Says State

After having called numerous prominent Atlanta men to testify as witnesses on bills of indictment against the Capital City Club, the Piedmont Driving Club, the University Club and the Atlanta Athletic Club Tuesday morning, the grand jury conferred for more than an hour and then dismissed all witnesses with the following public statement:

The grand jury decided by a majority vote that it was not to the best interest of the public to make an investigation of the club question at this time.

A number of prominent business men had been summoned to testify in the case, including J. H. Porter, president of the Atlanta Athletic club; J. H. Morgan, president of the Piedmont Driving Club; Thomas H. Connally, secretary and treasurer of the University Club; and Edward Austin, secretary of the Capital City Club.

All of these witnesses will have to be subpoenaed should the grand jury decide to take up the bills of indictment at a future session.

NEARLY ALL NATIONAL BANKS IN NEW SYSTEM

Officials Estimate Less Than 20 Have Failed to Apply for Membership

WASHINGTON, Feb. 24.—Although official tabulations were not completed today, treasury officials estimated that less than twenty national banks of 7,480 in the United States have not made application for membership in the Federal Reserve banking system.

According to estimates, however, the banks already in membership are 98 percent of the national banking capital in the country. Under the law, the Federal Reserve banks must subscribe 9 per cent of their capital and surplus to stock of a reserve bank in the new system, so that the capital of the entire reserve system is estimated to be more than \$100,000,000.

Rural Credits Committee Ask for National Aid in Establishing Banks

Two resolutions looking to the annual settlement of the Georgia farmers were adopted Monday by the rural credits committee of the state chamber of commerce at its meeting in the hotel Anshy.

One, offered by S. G. McLendon, called for national aid in the establishment of land banks. The other, offered by W. L. Foss, called for the issue of \$10,000,000 in thirty-year 3 per cent bonds by the state to furnish funds for long time farm loans at 4 1/2 per cent.

The McLendon resolution recommended to Congress "the setting apart of the proceeds arising in the future from the sale of our remaining 300,000,000 acres of public land in the States of America and our 287,000,000 acres of land in Alaska as a permanent source of capital supply for such land banks and that the states establish a simple and inexpensive system of land transfers, all of this to be done for the aid and protection of the American farmer."

The Foss resolution was introduced by W. H. Hunt, chairman of the committee, and was read by Charles J. Egan, president of the state chamber, Charles E. Carter, secretary, and W. L. Foss, chairman of the committee.

Chairman Egan was reported as saying that the rural credits committee has called a meeting of the national chamber of commerce in Washington, D. C., on February 26. This will be followed by others in various parts of the country.

The state chamber has aroused the farmer with regard to the proposed investment. Reports from various sources show that practical and intelligent farmers are being organized in Georgia to solve its problems.

COMMISSION RULE IS PROPOSED FOR FULTON

Legislature Will Be Asked to Create New System of Government for County

A bill will be introduced in the next legislature creating a commission form of government for Fulton county.

It will provide for the affairs of the county to be managed by three commissioners who shall give their entire time to the work and be paid adequate salaries therefor.

One will head the department of finance, one will head the department of public works and one will head the department of public health.

Although the members of the county board at present are called commissioners, the present form of government is the real meaning of the term.

The present county board consist of five members who are paid for their services and who are not required to give any more time to county affairs than the time necessary to attend the regular monthly meetings.

An obvious fault of this system is that the members of the board are not in sufficiently close touch with county affairs. They have to depend in too large a measure on their subordinates.

These limitations for subordinates tend to abuse their authority and privileges. They have no right of removal.

It is thought that the three commissioners should be given more time to county affairs which ought to secure the services of men of high standing.

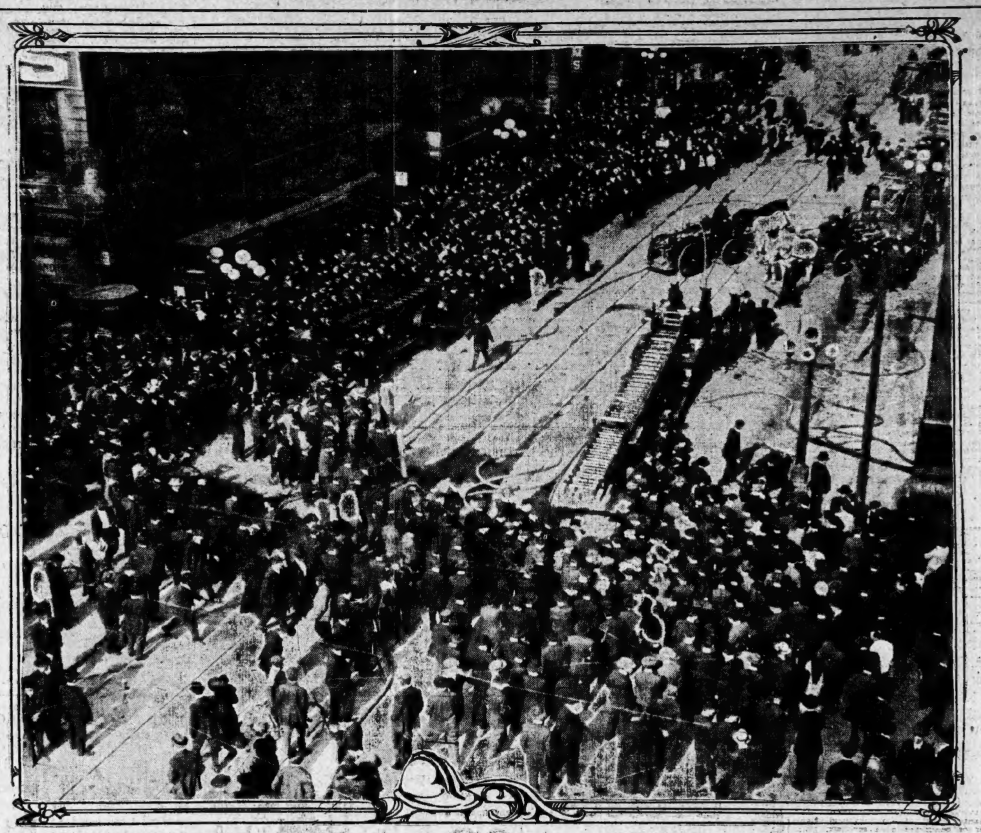

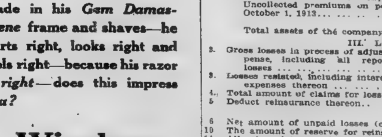

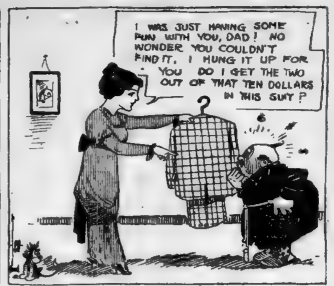
