Automobile Association Will Oppose Proposed Legislation in Legislature

Organized opposition to the bill which is expected to come before the legislature this summer, putting a graded tax on automobiles, was started Tuesday night at the annual meeting of the Atlanta Automobile Association...

### POWERS MAY BE STIRRED IF BENTON'S BODY IS HELD BY GEN. VILLA

(Continued from Page One.)

That he will take charge of an investigation of the Benton case upon his own account.

#### TO LOOK FOR WOUNDS

Upon the character of the wounds found near that of Villa's version of the killing, if the body is found riddled with rifle bullets, officials think the story of an execution after a court-martial will be confirmed and attention then will be further directed to a point now carefully being investigated as to whether Benton had committed crimes as Villa charges, and was of a disposition to fight with his arms.

Indications were today that the investigation would last for several days with no final judgment until all the facts had been gathered. Officials regard the delivery of the body as of first importance, however.

Secretary Bryan visited the White House before going to his office to read overnight dispatches. He made no comment on the situation.

White House officials after Secretary Bryan had left, made this explanation of the status of Benton's body: "Two dispatches were received yesterday, one from Consul Agent Canby at Vera Cruz, and one from a view of the body at this time," but he declined to say whether the body was during the afternoon. Late last night a message was received from Consul Letcher at Chihuahua, who had a personal conference with Villa. He reported that he was advised to have the widow and relatives of Benton see the body when it was examined, and that their visit would be permitted in the presence of representatives to be designated by the American government."

The change in General Villa's attitude as reflected in these two messages is what was said to be the result of representations by the United States that his attitude was not satisfactory. The United States will designate an army

surgeon as one of its representatives and an examination of the body will be made according to White House officials.

While apparently satisfied that an opportunity for a medical examination of the corpse has been made, the latest reported today to representatives sent to Carranza yesterday at Nogales. The court-martial had not reached Washington.

#### ASK CARRANZA'S AID

The state department is hopeful that through General Carranza, Villa's superior officer, success in getting Benton's body. No answer has been received today to communications sent to Carranza yesterday at Nogales. The court-martial had not reached Washington.

Secretary Daniels explained that the Prairie was being sent to Vera Cruz solely to provide accommodations for marines on already crowded battlements.

How Do You Pronounce It?

Go-od-ah is being made over the pronunciation of Go-oh-ah-l-ah. Everyone knows who the Colonel is and what he has done, but his name takes divers sounds on divers tongues. The Standard dictionary declares for "Ger-tul-uh" the diphthong being treated as "Goethe." Yet, if usage is the final authority in pronunciation as in language and the canal builder's personal friends are to be credited on this point, the name should be called "Go-thills" with stress on the "o."

Americans have an easy-go-lucky way of pronouncing as they please, particularly when they come upon words of foreign derivation so that it is not altogether unexpected to hear now and then "Go-the-shah" (with the accent on the "e") or even an outstoken "Go-at-ah." "Go-thills" certainly smacks of the United States and has a kind of native vigor to commend it, but until the Colonel himself sees fit to end all doubts most of us will continue to say "Ger-tul-uh."

Turkey Brought to Terms.

Turkey's blustering preparation to recover from Greece certain important Aegean islands, lost through the first Balkan war, have tamedly subsided. Months ago the Ottoman government, emboldened by its recapture of Adrianople in defiance of the Powers' command, purchased a dreadnought from Brazil, mustered a body of carefully selected troops and laid deep schemes to overawe Greece. It was rumored at the time that a Turkish-Bulgarian alliance had been perfected, and there was evidently an attempt to draw the southern Albanians into a far-reaching conspiracy against their neighbors. Neither of these plans, however, materialized, and so the ambitious militarist of Turkey were checked.

More important, however, was the refusal of the French government to sanction an Ottoman loan of a hundred and forty million dollars until there were definite assurances that it would not be used, even partly, for aggressions against Greece. "It would have been issued last November," we are told, "if Turkey had then promised to abide by the Aegian award, and live loyal to the treaty of peace with Greece. But the loan has been deliberately held back because of Turkey's defiant mood. The Powers failed most deplorably to make the Turks come out of Adrianople for fear of the threatened financial distress," but in the matter of the islands they have succeeded, for it is the action of France in pursuance of this policy that has brought Turkey to its senses."

Greece thus remains in possession of the prizes which she coveted from deeply patriotic as well as material motives and which she won through her high valor in the earlier Balkan war. That Turkey continues to hold Adrianople is due solely to the hesitancy of the larger Powers in enforcing the terms of the treaty of London. There is nevertheless cause for wide-spread satisfaction that the Balkan problem has been simplified, if not solved and that the peninsula is comparatively quiet again.

The threat of war in that corner of Europe had a most distressing effect upon business everywhere; even in the United States it was indirectly felt. It is reassuring to know that the controlling forces in Old World diplomacy are strongly arrayed for continued peace.

In the case of President Wilson, the opinion grows that the office will not only seek him again, but lay forceful hands on him and detain him.

Even at that, there are two classes of people—those who wish they could pay the income tax and those who wish they didn't have to.

And now they are talking of the legion of honor for Sarah Bernhardt, which amounts considering the late arrival of the honor, to Bernhardt being almost a prophet without honor.

Fire Losses Here and Abroad.

London's fire department numbers only thirteen hundred and seventy-four men, while nearly five thousand are enlisted in New York; the former's equipment is less costly and its general organization no more efficient. Yet the annual fire loss of London is scarcely a third that of New York. In the last year for which comparative figures are available London's loss amounted to three million, nine hundred and forty-five thousand dollars in four thousand, four hundred and three fires, while New York's loss was twelve million four hundred and seventy thousand dollars in thirteen thousand, eight hundred and sixty-eight fires.

This record is noteworthy because it is broadly typical of conditions throughout the United States as contrasted with those in Europe. The per capita fire loss of England is fifty-two cents, that of Germany only twenty cents, that of the United States is two dollars and sixty-eight cents. On a basis of population, London has eighty-one fires to every one hundred thousand people, New York has three hundred, and the same proportion holds generally between American and European cities. What is responsible for this remarkable difference? The London Times strikes very near the truth when it says:

"The enforcement of building laws in many American cities is almost entirely lax, and doubtless more important than anything else is that recklessness and indifference to waste of life and property which seems inherent in the American character and shows itself in innumerable ways. Chiefly, perhaps, it has been bred of the conditions of the country, in which the lawlessness of nature has tempted to waste and prodigality. The people as a whole have never known the daily need of thrift and care and orderliness which has been brought into the people of older countries; and in the breathless haste to build themselves into a great and prosperous nation, habits of recklessness have become ingrained."

Fortunately, public sentiment in the United States is at last awakening to the need of earnest, organized effort to reduce fire waste. An important step in this end is the movement to secure more adequate laws on the construction and inspection of buildings and to educate the rank and file of the people in simple rules for the prevention of fire. Care in little things will do more than anything else to reduce the country's appalling record in this regard.

Response of the National Banks.

United States treasury officials announce that seven thousand, four hundred and sixty-five national banks have applied for membership in the federal reserve system, and that the aggregate capital of these institutions is a billion, fifty-four million, five hundred and thirty-three thousand, five hundred and fifty-four dollars, or ninety-nine and seven-eighths per cent of the capital of all the national banks in the country. That is a virtually unanimous acceptance of the new banking and currency law as a sound and beneficial measure. The act was cordially praised throughout the Union immediately after the President signed it, but its most substantial and significant tribute is the readiness with which the nation's banking interests come within its requirements and avail themselves of the opportunities it offers.

The new system will be launched with an authorized capital of at least a hundred million dollars and all the banks entering, State institutions being included, will represent considerably more than a billion dollars. This means that the new banking and currency order will be inaugurated under the most favorable circumstances possible and that its benefits to the country will be realized in the very outset.

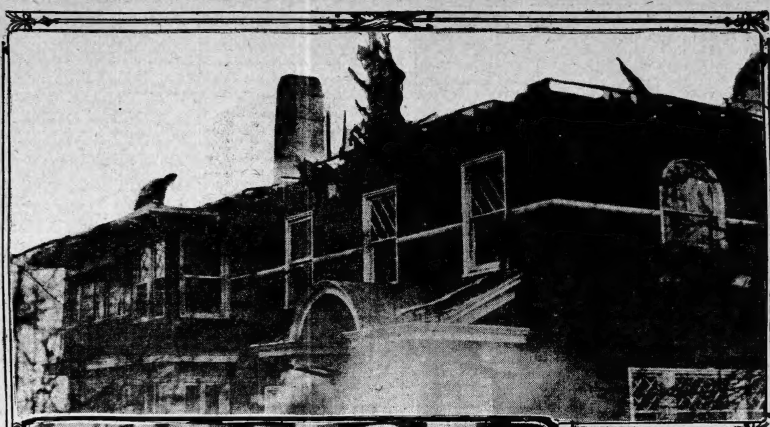
