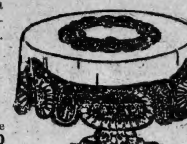

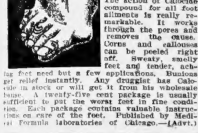

President Wilson continues to demonstrate that a president's message need not be a dull affair.

Business Peace and Industrial Freedom.

None of President Wilson's messages has been awaited so eagerly as that he delivered to Congress Tuesday, dealing with the trust problem; and none has been more cordially received. For nearly a year the country's economic life has been undergoing a quiet yet far-reaching revolution.

To all such questioning, the President's message brings timely assurance and good cheer. He makes it plain in the outset that Democracy's sole purpose is to uphold the nation's welfare and that such changes as are to be ordered will be prudent and constructive.

"We are now about to give expression to the best business judgment of America, to what we know to be the business conscience and honor of the land. The government and business men are ready to meet each other half way in a common effort to square business methods with both public opinion and the law."

There is to be, in the next place, law conferring upon the Interstate Commerce Commission the power to supervise and regulate the financial operations by which railroads hereafter are to be supplied with the money they require for their proper development and improvement of transportation facilities.

Spending Uncle Sam's Money

Uncle Sam, like every one else, has felt the pinch of a "cost of living." The federal government during the fiscal year ending June 30, 1914, consumed approximately \$1,918,874,564. This means that for every day of the year Uncle Sam has spent more than \$5,000,000 in the nature of receipts and disbursements, and the remainder represents funds in the treasury and the like.

How swiftly the expenditures have grown in 1914 to the treasury balance sheet of the United States, the amount that probably the least read American citizen could estimate at \$1,918,874,564, or more than \$5,000,000 per day.

Way back in the "lean" year of 1877, when depression came in the wake of Andrew Jackson's crash with the second Bank of the United States, the per capita cost of government was \$1.77. There were 39,000,000 people in the United States then and the total disbursements were about \$11,000,000, or about \$0.28 per capita.

Under modern conditions the increased cost of living has been more than compensated by comparison of the bill of the government. For 1914 the per capita cost of government was \$52.55, compared with \$1.77 in 1877.

Every department of the government is responsible for and shares in the benefits of these enlarged expenditures. For the maintenance of the navy in 1913 Congress appropriated \$149,000,000, which, according to a footnote in the official table, included \$4,000,000 for the purchase of new submarines for the naval service.

The postal service alone is paying its own way despite the fact that it is authorized to drain from the treasury \$1,000,000 per year. Its aggregate 1913 cost was \$118,500,000. The aggregate cost of the postal service for the benefit of the farmers. It was then \$23,337.

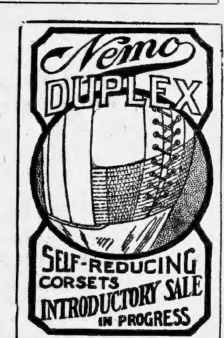

Review of 1913 Football Season Shows Great Records

Football Shows Great Record for Season of 1913

Four Hundred Colleges and Five Thousand Schools Represented in the Sport—More Than 150,000 Players Took Part in Games—Attendance Over Thirteen Million

NEW YORK, Jan. 21.—Pluribus showing the popularity of intercollegiate football during the season of 1913, have been compiled by Harry Davis, Princeton member of the rules committee, and a noted sports statistician. According to his data 400 colleges and 5,000 schools throughout the country were represented by eleven last autumn. Approximately 150,000 games were played and 1,500,000 players participated in the contests and practice. Placing the average attendance at these games just over 1,000,000 the total attendance would not be far from thirteen millions.

The statistics record some unusual features, including long runs, field goal kicks, high scores by individual players. The longest goal from the field was 100 yards by a section of the team of Yale University. The longest kick scored by Earl Woodward of Tulane university against St. Louis university. The honor for the longest drop kick scoring a goal goes to a schoolboy, James M. Porter, of McKean school, who in a game against Hickory school, sent the ball spinning over the bar for 75 yards distant. The longest goal from a drop kick was scored by H. A. Baker of Princeton, against Yale, separated from Baker by a single yard, a player in one name goes to "Yale's B. H. Baker, of Harvard, who scored five goals in a 10-0 victory over the school boy team of Princeton, who in the same contest kicked three goals from the field, all by drop kick, making four for the day.

The longest run of the year was accomplished by H. W. Nichols, of Hillsburg, who carrying Buckette's kick-off one yard behind the own goal line, ran 100 yards for a touchdown. One of the surprising features of 1913 was the frequency of these runs from the back of the line. There have been so rare that seldom more than one occurred throughout a season. In the autumn just past not less than nine occurred in the larger games. A analysis of longer runs showed that the majority of them began with an interrupted forward pass. The following track records were set during November, 1913: B. M. I. 8; Allegheny, 114; Woonter, 6; Gallaudet, 192; Stillmore, 9; Louisville, 100; Washington, 9; Washington and Jefferson, 190; Grove City, 6.

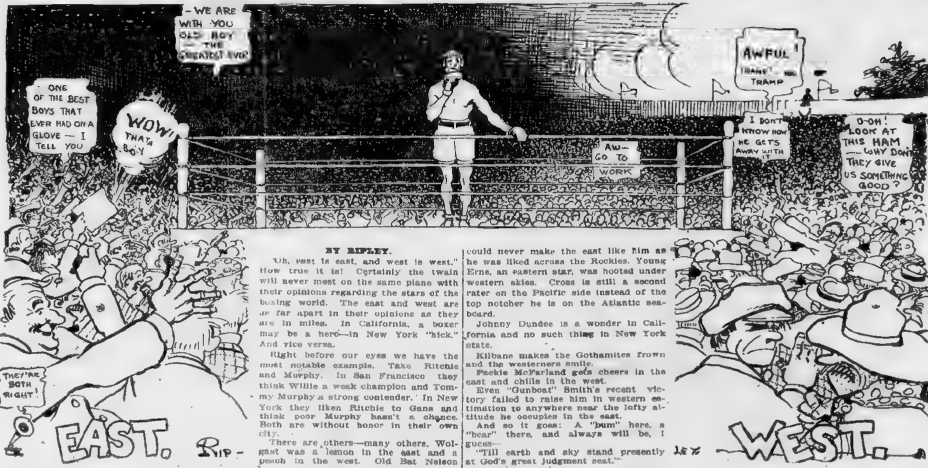

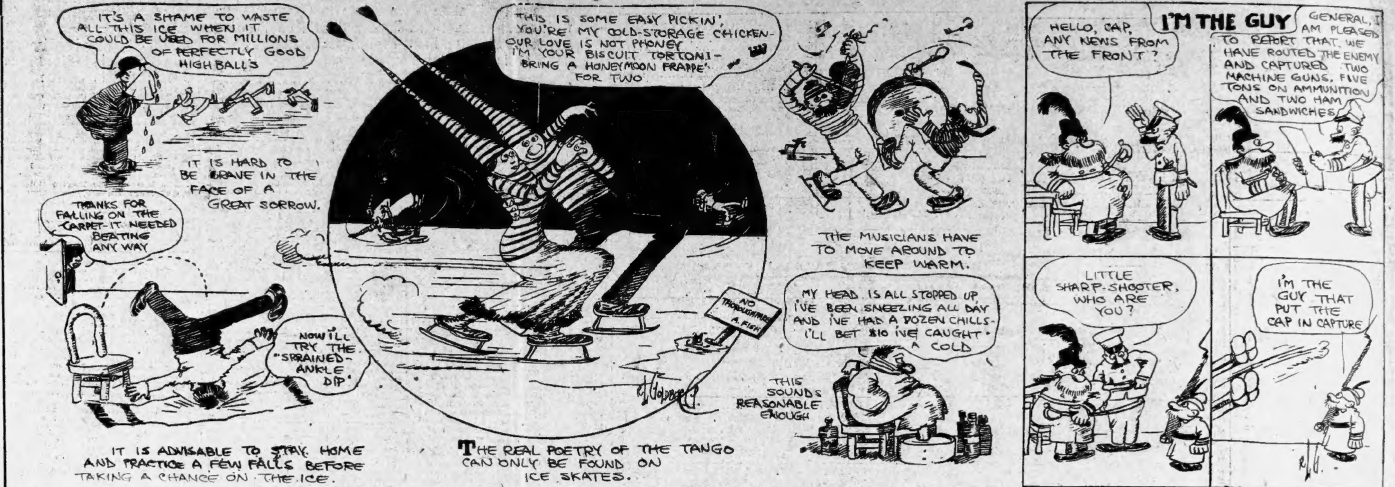
