MAIL SACK IS LOOTED OF CASH AND JEWELRY

Wife of Man Accused of \$10,000 Theft Says He Has Escaped "Across the Border"

(By Associated Press) CHICAGO, Nov. 11.—Thief of money and jewelry valued at \$10,000 from a mail sack was disclosed today by James Stuart, postoffice inspector here. The crime is alleged by Stuart to have been committed by Albert Tardy, a mail wagon driver.

The theft occurred yesterday. Tardy collected five sacks containing registered packages at the South Water street, Masonic temple and stock exchange substations. Suspicion was aroused when the wagon containing four of the sacks was found abandoned at the union station. These sacks contained \$4,000 in money and gems, which had not been distributed.

Mrs. Tardy said her husband visited her for a few moments last night, told her that he had stolen \$10,000 from a mail sack and would write to her as soon as he had escaped "across the border." He gave her a small sum of money, she said, and left, saying that he would catch a midnight train. Whether for the Chicago or the Mexican border he did not state.

Stuart said Tardy served a term in the Missouri penitentiary for highway robbery, and another at Joliet for attempting to steal a truckload of trucks. Tardy was employed by H. O. Steger, who has a contract with the postoffice department to provide all horses and wagons needed by the postoffice. Steger is under bond to make good any losses.

Several persons witnessed the robbery. Instead of driving to the postoffice where he was due at 1 p. m., Tardy went to the railroad station and packed his wagon to some place out of view. With only passing curiosity other drivers saw him unlock the door of the wagon and calmly tip open one of the sacks and stuff the contents into his pocket. They saw him walk away a short distance and then break into a run.

Mrs. Tardy said she hardly knew him when he came home last night, so reluctantly had he bedecked himself from the proceeds of the robbery. They had been married a month.

HEALTH EXPERT URGES BETTER SYSTEM IN CITY

Third of Deaths Could Be Prevented, Says Schneider, Who Tells How to Do It

Declaring that one-third of the deaths in Atlanta each year are due to preventable disease, Paul Schneider, Jr., the expert from the Bureau of Health, employed by the chamber of commerce to make a survey of the city, has issued his report on Atlanta's health and sanitary conditions. He suggests a number of changes and improvements which are approved by Dr. J. P. Kennedy, chief officer of the board of health.

Mr. Schneider recommends that the health department make a survey of the city which are proving most destructive and he backed after, mentioning especially divisions of infant hygiene and on tuberculosis. He suggests also that a general dispensary be established with general and special clinics, social service investigation and home nursing extensions.

He says that Atlanta's system of vital statistics is inadequate and confusing, and that the city is suffering from communicable diseases. He suggests that communicable diseases be added to the list of communicable diseases which must be reported.

He especially stresses the need of controlling disease and insisting on sanitary conditions among the people who are a menace to the health of a city.

He suggests also the enlargement of the Bath Hill sanitarium for tuberculosis patients and other minor improvements to the health department.

Dr. Kennedy, who assisted Mr. Schneider in preparing the report, said that he was as able, says the suggested improvements are excellent, but that it will take a great deal of money and will take an appointment to the health department to carry out the expert's recommendations.

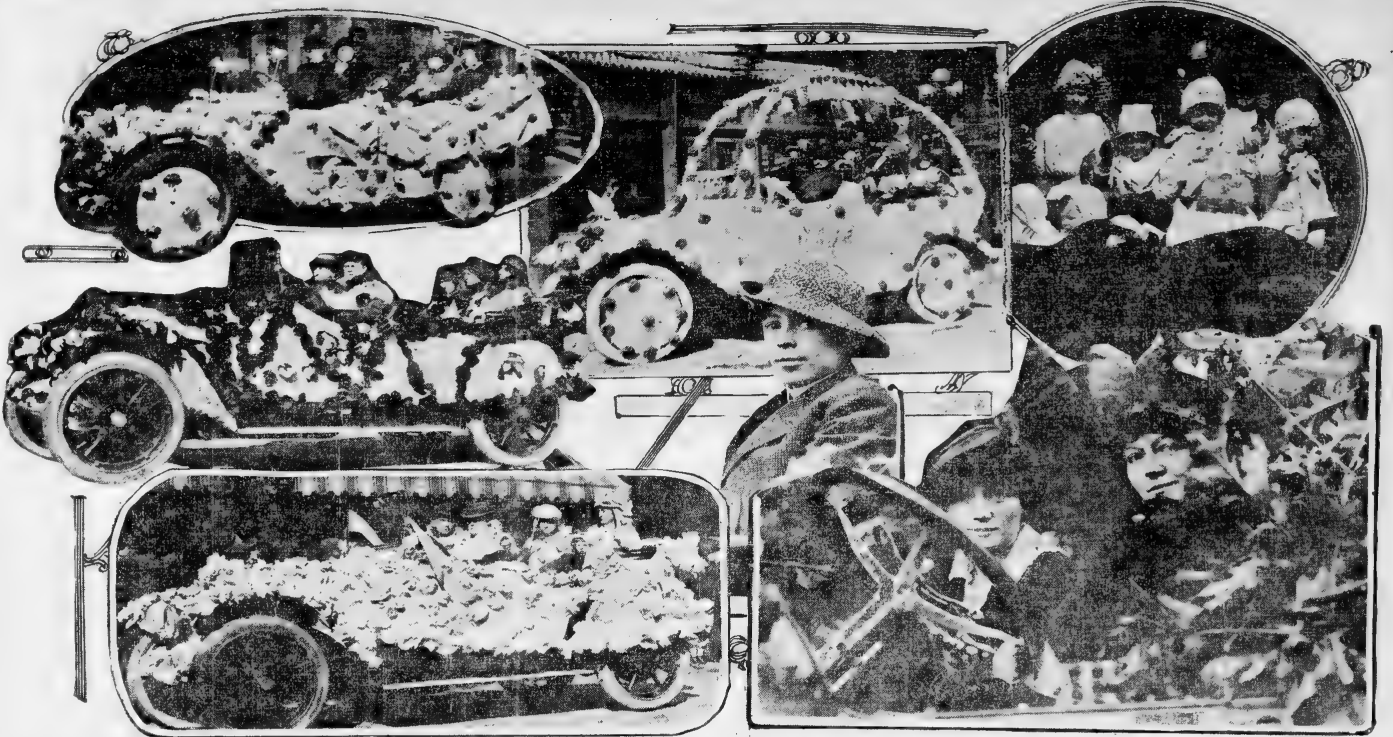

S. I. A. A. Disqualifies Preas From Playing Football At Tech

Preas Disqualified From Football Team; Hard Blow to Tech

News of Executive Committee's Ruling Came Like Bolt Out of Clear Sky Monday Afternoon, and Hope of Beating Georgia Has Turned to Gloom in Camp of the Yellow-jackets — Scholarship at Bingham School, Which Came Out Several Weeks Ago, Is Cause of Action Against Brilliant Athlete Who Was a Helmsman Mainstay

Like a bolt from a clear sky came the news Monday afternoon that Jim Preas, the big tackle of the Yellowjackets, had been declared ineligible to play amateur sports by the executive committee of the Southern Intercollegiate Athletic association, the body that rules out players in the south, when they have played professional ball or otherwise overstepped the bounds of the amateur.

It was thought that Preas would be allowed to play, but the committee has decided that he received his scholarship at Bingham for athletic reasons alone, and that under such conditions he is ineligible to play with Tech. This is one of the hardest blows that the Yellow-jackets have ever received, coming as it does right on the eve of the biggest game of the season with no chance whatever to train a man to play his place.

After the crushing defeat from Auburn it looked as if there was a slight chance of the team getting together and winning from the Georgians, but this hope has turned to gloom in the Tech camp. Tech is minus one extra possible all-star player—the man that kicks the ball behind the goal line from the kick-off—the man that does the placement kicking—the man that carries the ball for the necessary yards when the first down is made.

Preas is no longer a member of the jockey squad. He has joined that memorable caravan of ineligible athletes that marches down the lane of time carrying with them the scar of professionalism, because at the age of seventeen or under they receive no salary or what they could accept as reward for the athletic ability that they possessed.

Jim Preas played several baseball because he liked the sport and he had to bow before the inevitable and admit that he was not strictly speaking, an amateur.

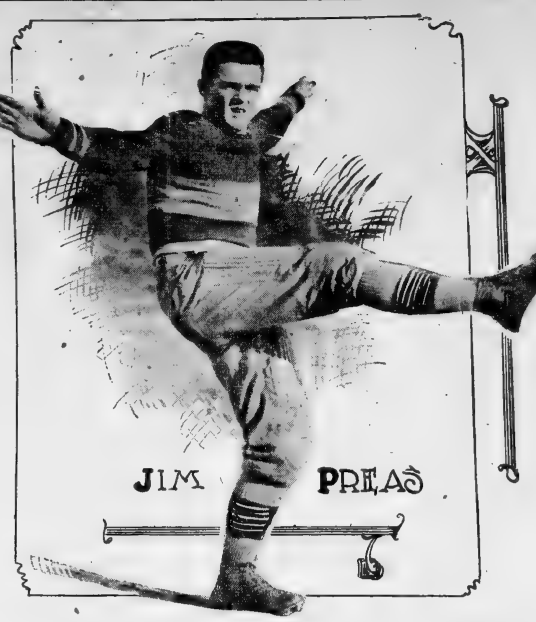
Jim Preas is one of the finest specimens of physical manhood in the south. He is now heard from college amateur athletics because, as a youth of seventeen, he accepted a scholarship thinking that he was being honored by the school which he attended.

The Tech varsity went to its work with a will and a determination Monday and though there was nothing done but slight work, the men went at it with their whole souls. There was a full attendance of both scrub and varsity men and both teams worked as if it was their last battle.

The loss of Preas will be a heavy one as he has been counted on up until this time and has never thought that he would be ruled out at this time of the year after he had been allowed to play so far.

All of the cripples are rounding into shape and there will not be any injured list next Saturday, provided there are no snafu-up during scrimmage. This week will be the last hard scrimmage of the season, for there will be very little doing after the Georgia game, but this week will be the hard one of the season. The men will be driven to the breaking point in order to perfect plays and set condition. Trust who will take the vacant tackle has not yet been decided upon.

DISQUALIFIED FROM TECH TEAM



Cunningham Drives The Georgia Team For Big Tech Game

Absolutely Secret Practice All the Week Is Now the Program on Sanford Field—Hospital List Improving Rapidly, Though Powell's Charley Horse, Henderson's Wrenched Back and Conklin's Shake-Up Still Need Careful Attention—Athletic Director Sanford Insists on Staging the Game at Ponce de Leon Instead of at Grant Field

ATHENS, Ga., Nov. 11.—Everything and everybody in the Classic City is looking forward to the great Georgia-Tech game next Saturday in Atlanta. No game in Dixie ever will, or ever has attracted such widespread attention.

The Red and Black squad are doing the hardest work of the season in preparing themselves for this game. Yesterday the squad practiced for at least three-quarters of an hour after dark, the moon being in full and Sanford field being as light as day. Absolutely secret practice is the big at Sanford field this week and the coaches have squads of students and baseball men doing guard and picket duty on the hillside and around the territory. The only possible way to get a glimpse at the team is to sail over the field in an aircraft and then it might be dangerous.

The hospital lists are practically clear now, although Powell has a severe "charley horse" that simply won't get well in time for Saturday. Henderson is back on the job at left tackle, although he feels quite shaken up from the Virginia game. Still, with a day or two hard practice he will come around all right. Henderson's return to the line is a great deal to Georgia, as he is a giant of strength, and has had a whole year's experience at his position. Henderson's return will cause Malone to be shifted to right guard and then either McKinnon or Conyers will hold the position of left guard.

Georgia has developed in McKinnon quite a punter and more than likely he will be depended on to boot the pig skin in Saturday's game. Hugh Conklin has rounded into shape and is no longer bothered with the "charley horse." He was running signals yesterday and Smith was put in at right end.

Faddock will run the team as usual, and he will work plays and formations next Saturday that the Tech boys have never seen or heard of. Cunningham is working on new plays until this week and hence the secret practice. These plays will spring quite a surprise, the boys here say, but they will go no further in their description.

Prof. S. Y. Sanford, the athletic director, gave out a statement today that the contract between Georgia and Tech did not call for the game to be played on Grant field, and that if Tech did not concede the game to Ponce de Leon park then a contract would have to be drawn up which would call for the game to be played one year in Atlanta and the next year in Athens. He contended it is nothing but fair that the game should be played on neutral grounds, not only in fairness to the players but also that the crowd, which usually is very large, ought to be afforded the best accommodation.

Although Georgia does not want to lose the chance of playing the Tech game, still they seem to have taken the stand that it must be played at Ponce de Leon or not at all.

A holiday has been declared in the University for that day and a special train of fifteen cars will leave Saturday morning with students and Athenians and will return Saturday night.

It is estimated that at least 2,000 Athens people will be in Atlanta on that day and will lend their support to the Red and Black.
