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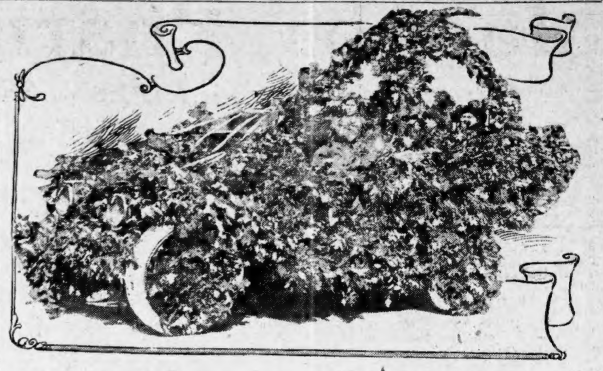

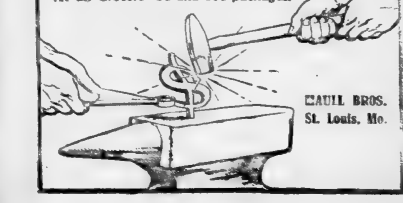

As to automobile parking facilities, they claim there is abundant space on three sides of the gridiron at Grant field, whereas cars can be parked on one side of the field only, at Ponce de Leon.

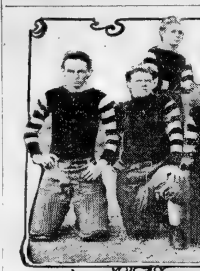

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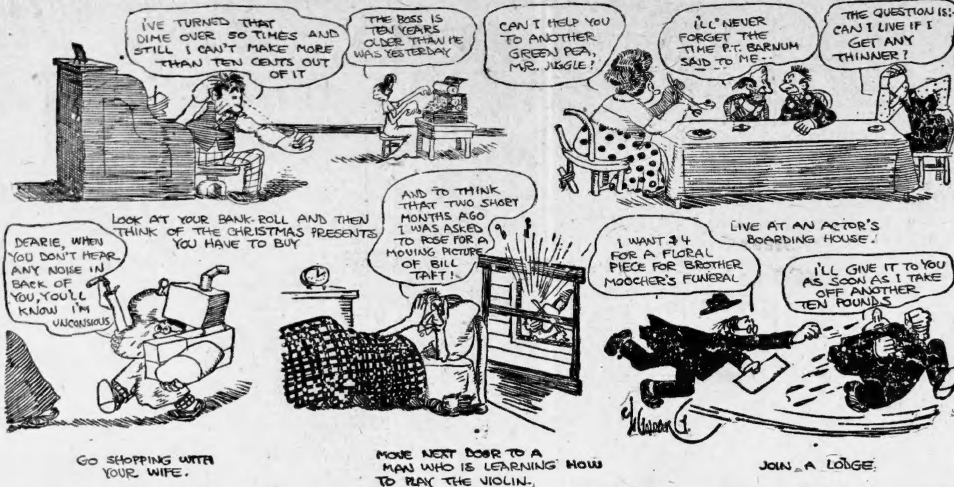
