Plan Campaign in Which All
Protestant Churches and All
Leading Women's Organiza-
tions of State Are to Join

RESOLUTIONS PRESENTED AT TWO BIG CONVENTIONS

New Styles, Dances and Plays
Rapped—Would Create Sen-
timent Against "General
Lack of Refinement"

Six weeks, says Shimer, "sinful and
immoral" dances are to be fought by the

HUERTA MAY RETIRE WHEN HIS CONGRESS RATIFIES HIS WORKS

Addresses Body in Person,
Reading Long Message
Which Makes No Reference
to United States

WANTS BOTH HOUSES TO
BACK UP ALL HIS ACTS

Reported President Was Ready to Have Aldape Succeed Him but Did Not Like Lind's Friendship to Minister

MEXICO CITY, Nov. 28.—It was
reported here today as not entirely
impossible that Provisional President Hu-
erta, after having, through the ratifica-
tion of the new congress, relieved him-
self from the danger of being asked to
account for his acts by some future ad-
ministration, might be brought to the
point of self-liquidation through the ef-
forts of the foreign powers supporting
the United States government.

It was not generally expected today
that President Huerta on the convening
of the new Mexican congress this even-
ing would encounter much of the ob-
structionist tactics which characterized
the last congress, as the new deputies
were known to be in sympathy with his
policy. In their meeting Huerta, it was
assumed, would automatically would fortify
the self-protection which he has
secured by the ratification of the new
constitution last month.

One of the first steps of the new con-
gress was expected to take was ratifica-
tion of the Huerta acts as dictator;
that the two houses would be asked to
do this, was plainly indicated in his
message.

To get ratification of his acts was
sincerely desired by Huerta, as he was
one of the reasons why Huerta so obstinate-
ly ordered pressure brought to bear on
him by the United States and other na-
tions.

The provisional president was said to
be ready to have Manuel Gonzalez
succeed him, but he was expected to
accept the man he had named to succeed
him, upon the abolition of the new con-

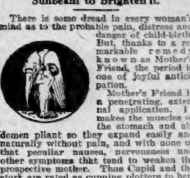

OLD MAN BEATEN NEARLY TO DEATH WITH A ROCK

J. M. Letwick in Hospital After Fight With C. E. Lawrence at Stockade

J. M. Letwick, sixty years old, 119 Georgia street, a driver in the city commission department, is at the Grady hospital in an unconscious and precarious condition.

Letwick may be fractured. A hospital ambulance was summoned to the unconscious driver, who is feared his skull is fractured. The surgeons fear that it will be necessary to repress his skull. Owing to the advanced age of the injured man his condition is considered critical.

After being brought to police station, Letwick gave out a statement in which he declared that the man who had beaten him had taken out of his hand and transferred to another.

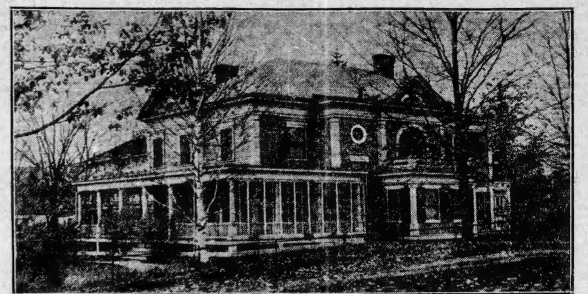

Sugar declined 7.9 per cent, wheat flour 5.9 per cent and corn meal 2.7 per cent.

Compared with average prices for the ten-year period, 1909 to 1909, every article for which prices were noted, with the exception of sugar, advanced. Bacon advanced 181.0 per cent, pork chops 124.5 per cent, round steak 104.4 per cent, smoked ham 92.2 per cent, sirloin steak 78.3 per cent, rib roast 74.8 per cent, potatoes 73.2 per cent, eggs 52.2 per cent, lard 58.8 per cent, beef 48.1 per cent, corn meal 99.0 per cent, butter 41.9 per cent and milk 35.3 per cent. Sugar declined 2.3 per cent.

When the price of each of the fifteen articles of food is weighed according to average consumption in the world-wide families, retail prices on August 15, 1913, were 6.1 per cent above the average price for the ten-year period, 1909 to 1909, 8 per cent above the price August 15, 1912, and 11.9 per cent above the price August 15, 1911.

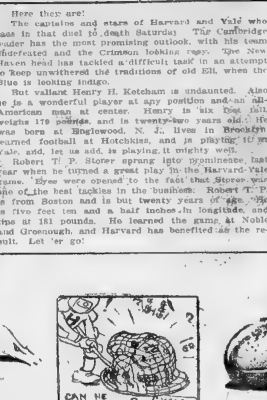
