## ATTORNEY DEMANDS THAT "JIM" CONLEY BE PLACED ON TRIAL

When Judge Hill Refuses to  
Try Negro for Part in Phagan  
Murder, Lawyer Demands  
Early Hearing

Judge B. H. Hill Tuesday morning declined to allow Jim Conley, the negro sweeper at the National Pencil factory, where Mary Phagan met her death, to stand on the witness stand. Conley was brought to court and Solicitor Dorey invited the court's attention to the fact that the man had been brought up once before and postponed at the judge's direction. Judge Hill said:

"I shall not take up this case, nor permit it to be taken up."

At this point Attorney W. M. Smith, representing Conley, interrupted to make a formal demand on the minutes for a trial.

Judge Hill continued:

"Wait a minute, Mr. Smith. It is the court's opinion that this case should not be taken up until the final disposition of the case against the principal perpetrator of the crime."

Attorney Smith then asked permission of the court to file a formal demand on the minutes for a trial.

"You have that right, and if the demand is in proper form the court is powerless."

The demand was filed then. This means that the case against Jim Conley must be tried at the next term of court, as the judge declined to try it during the present term.

The next trial will be held during January and February, and the case probably will not be taken up by the court until the latter part of the term.

The demand filed by Attorney Smith was forecast in The Journal Monday afternoon. As predicted, then, Jim Conley's right of trial by jury, admitted all the facts urged by the state.

This will resolve the case to one of argument before the solicitor and Mr. Smith, with Judge Hill as the arbiter empowered to decide. The issue would be whether Conley should be punished for a misdemeanor, the maximum penalty of which is twelve months in the chain-gang, or for a felony, the maximum punishment of which is the charge against him being three years in the penitentiary. Attorney Smith contended also that neither of the two indictments against Conley covers the case against him.

Mrs. Wilson visited the executive offices with guests, showed them the president's office and the cabinet room and walked through the south grounds.

## RAILWAY PRESIDENT STRUCK BY PARALYSIS AT WASHINGTON, D. C.

Fatal Stroke Comes Without Warning as Official Leaves His Home for Offices—Was Apparently Well

OFFICES OF HIS SYSTEM  
GET NEWS FROM JOURNAL

Succeeded Samuel Spencer, Who Was Killed in Wreck on His Own Road in Virginia Seven Years Ago

WASHINGTON, Nov. 25.—W. W. Finley, president of the Southern railway, died at his home here this afternoon. He was struck by paralysis at breakfast time this morning and sank rapidly.

President Finley was stricken with apoplexy and hemorrhage of the brain while he was preparing to leave his home for his office. The attention called to his condition at breakfast time had summoned his doctor. Although he was stricken in the capital, word of his death did not reach the southern railway offices for several hours.

Mr. Finley had been apparently in good health and the fatal stroke came without warning. With his family he had recently returned from his country home at Warrenton, Va., and reported his town house in the capital is survived by a widow, a son and three daughters.

President Finley, who succeeded President Samuel Spencer several years ago, was extremely popular with Atlantians who had met on his frequent visits throughout the city. He had power to build up the south and southern industries and had favored Atlanta in many ways.

Officials of the railroad in Atlanta were ignorant of President Finley's death until the Associated Press dispatches brought the news to The Journal, and they received their first notification from this newspaper.

President Finley was a native of Michigan. He was born in Bay City, Mich., on May 1, 1871. He accepted a position with the Southern railway in 1895. 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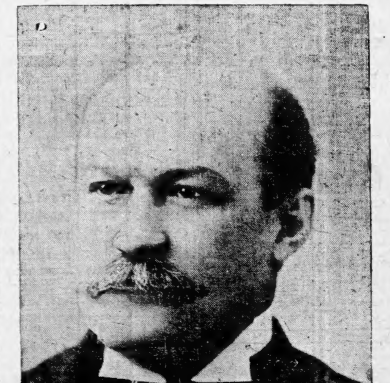
## Couple Has Marvelous Escape from Death as Train Wrecks Machine

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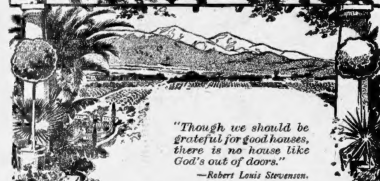

WOMAN NOT VAGRANT
IF SHE HAS HUSBAND

A charge of vagrancy cannot be sus-
tained against a married woman who
is not divorced from her husband, al-
though the husband and wife may be liv-
ing in a state of separation. This fact
is held by the court of appeals in the
Camilla case.
The decision of the court of appeals
is a ruling handed down Tuesday morn-
ing, and the court further rules that
the husband represents the wife in
means of support, the absence of which
only justifies a conviction for vagrancy.
The decision of the court of appeals
was in the case of Ethel Brown vs. the
State. Ethel had been convicted of va-
grancy in the city court of Camilla and
sentenced to twelve months in the
Mitchell county chain gang or a fine of
\$100, to be paid to the court of ap-
peals, but she had been living with her
husband and was not without visible
means of support.

Negroes Aid State
Against Black Held
For Slaying Newsum

The trial of Ed Fowler, a negro, on
the charge that he stabbed H. D. Newsum,
a white youth, to death on February
1, 1913, is remarkable for the fact
that all of the witnesses against the
negro are themselves negroes. Members
of the grand jury indicted him.
The murder of young Newsum was
sensational because it happened at the
Atlanta National bank corner, at White-
hall and Adams streets, at an early
hour of the evening when throngs were
passing that point. Newsum was at-
tacked and cut so badly that he died very
shortly after the affair. His assailant
fled and vanished without leaving a
clue.
The negroes testifying against Fowler
swear to certain admissions which they
declare he made shortly after the murder.
One of them was a woman to
whose home he is alleged to have fled
from the officers at the time of the
slaying.
Newsum's companions related that a
negro tried to wrap them from the
sidewalk on Peachtree street, and when
Newsum resisted this the negro follow-
ed them, attacking Newsum on White-
hall street.
The trial of Fowler started Tuesday
and was adjourned over to Wednesday,
when it probably will be finished.

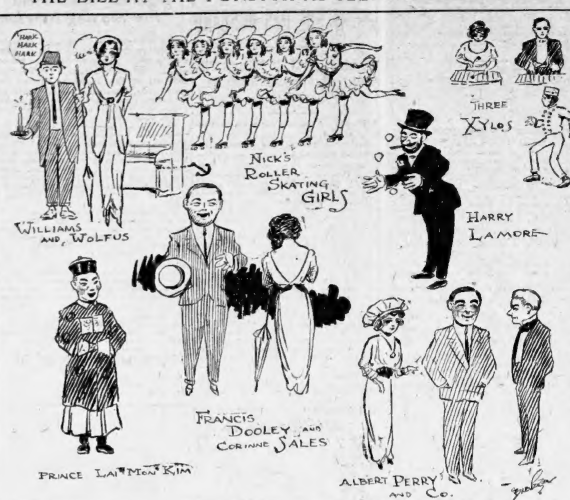

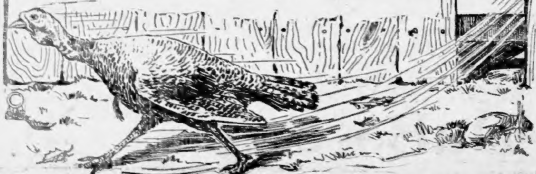

**MOTHER BEGS A LESSON ON CARE OF HER BABY**

**Child Welfare Exhibit Causes Unusual Interest—Opens on December 1**

An incident illustrating the value to the community of the Child Welfare exhibit even before the doors of the exhibition are open, was the appeal made by an Atlanta mother, who read in the Journal Sunday the story setting forth the practical knowledge which will be imparted to mothers through the various departments of the exhibit.

"I read where women would be taught to wash their babies the right way, feed them right, and generally care for them. I may not be able to attend the exhibit, but won't you just send some one to give me one lesson?" she wrote Mrs. J. G. Krieshaber, chairman of the baby department of the exhibit.

Mrs. Krieshaber not only secured the volunteer service of a registered nurse for the lesson but accompanied the nurse to the home of this anxious mother and gave the information desired.

It is the purpose of the Child Welfare exhibit to instruct thousands of mothers in these essential and practical care, upon which the life of the child depends.

Not only will charts show what is being done for children in the most progressive communities, but there will be active exhibits of how to do it in this community. A kitchen is being installed in one of the rooms of the old Levey house, where each day lessons will be given in the care and preparation of milk and other foods for babies. The age and size of the baby will be considered and even the amount of food the child should have will be indicated.

The baby may be brought and looked after by the medical inspector, if the mother so desires it, and subsequently be given before he leaves the building, the food which has been suggested for him. Or his mother, dropping in when she can at the exhibit, may see the valuable lesson each day, and taking it home, apply it.

The charts being installed at the welfare exhibit each day bear directly upon the alarming death rate of children before the first year of their lives has been past, and records show that much of this mortality is due to the ignorance of the mother in the little everyday cases which every woman should know and in being given an opportunity to know. The exhibition begins December 1.

Christian people, not understanding, tried to close this refuge for the hopeless. The Police Board classed it as a nuisance. A great paper termed it "a disorderly house."

Miss Appleyard never complained. Without rest, without ceasing, day in, day out, she served. She found only happiness in the work. She was saving the lost. She was bringing order out of chaos. The way was becoming clear. But self had been forgotten; sickness came. Years ago a man had sinned. A woman was infected. No one knows how many lives have suffered for their shame—innocent lives have been sacrificed for their sin. A girl came to Martha's Home. She brought their curse. A man had put it upon her. It found the lips of Miss Appleyard, who by love was trying to bring the girl back to life. Miss Appleyard is dead. Science fought for her life. Men and women prayed that she might stay. But God called. He had work elsewhere for her. With Paul she realized that it is better far to be away and with Jesus. For weeks—months, unable to use her tongue, she has written her thoughts. Each note has radiated joy and hope, although she knew that death was daily drawing nearer. Asked if she had a message to send the students of Agnes Scott, she wrote:—

"I do thank my Savior that He has permitted me just a glimpse of this his great work and I hope that it may be their work too."

To the girls of the Martha Berry School, she sent this word:—

"I have no message but this, that they may realize their wonderful opportunity before they are gone."

Their work—their wonderful opportunity. Our work—our wonderful opportunity. Your work—your wonderful opportunity—before you are gone. Her last conscience expression was a note to this Committee. She said:—

"All the Executive Committee—My love. Tell them how grateful I am to have been counted worthy to share in the great work. May God override all mistakes."

"His great work."

Jesus said:—

"Feed my lambs—tend my sheep—Follow Me."

"I am the good shepherd: the good shepherd layeth down his life for the sheep. He that is a hireling fleeth."

"If any man will come after Me, let him deny himself, and take up his cross daily, and follow Me."

"Whosoever doth not bear his own cross—cannot be my disciple."

Miss Appleyard has shown again the only way, "a new and living way," the cross of Christ.

God grant that you and we may take it up today and follow Him. No word of sorrow should be heard. This Thanksgiving Day, let us go up to God's place of prayer. **N**EW YORK, Nov. 25.—Bracing weather has succeeded the Indian summer conditions which prevailed here last week, holding out auspicious prospects for the Army-Navy football game next Saturday. The staging of the football classic within the arena of the new baseball stadium at the Polo Grounds will give it a more up-to-date setting than the game has had before and from all indications will attract official Washington and society generally to an even greater extent than has been the rule.

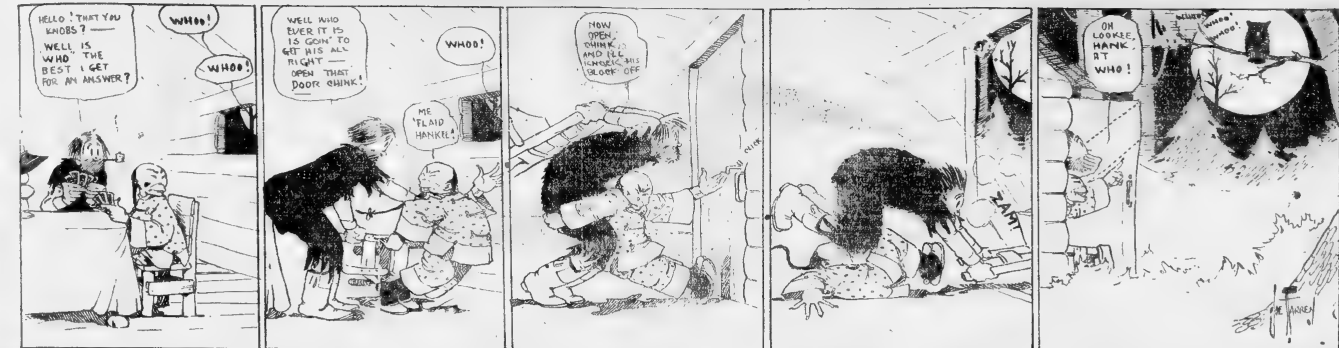

One of those ditzy-things today has suborned the Hon. Hurrle P. of Michigan, for the purpose of explaining the lack of an offense by his eastern eleven in their big games of the year, excluding, only Prof. Bickley's well known and just famous for.

We feel the situation needs explanation for this reason--Harvard Yale and Princeton fought three games together this fall without a touchdown being scored.

Harvard won the eastern championship without scoring a touchdown in her two big games, one man's snoring too rolling up over Princeton point.

#### THE SITUATION.

New, judging from this range of six years' test, one of two things only is possible--either the new game doesn't allow the probabilities of a touchdown by the offense, or the new game--Harvard and Princeton haven't made the most of the new game.

It is for this purpose that we have subpoenaed Coach Yost, who is the recognized expert of football that we have ever known and who in 19 years campaigning has won a greater variety of football than any other man from Letland Stanford, on through the middle west on to New Haven and Cantonville.

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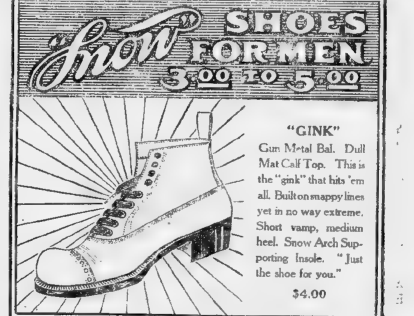

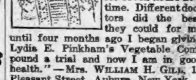
