WASHINGTON, Nov. 28.—Location of the regional reserve banks to be established by the new currency bill became a matter of pressing importance when the Democratic conference resumed work today. The instance of Senator Hoke Smith and Senator Bacon, of Georgia, that the territory tributary to Atlanta would do business with a regional bank in New Orleans may force the conference at least, informally, to outline definite locations for the banks. The administration bill proposes eight regional banks; the conference may increase them to ten. The bill that passed the house provided twelve. The defeat of the conference, when it does its final approval of the bill, probably will be taken up in the Senate Monday under circumstances expected to keep about its early passage.

ACCIDENTS

Report for First Quarter of
1913 Shows 140 More Persons
Killed Than in Same
Time Last Year

WASHINGTON, Nov. 28.—The inter-bureau commission's accident bulletin issued today, for the quarter ended June 30, 1913, shows that as compared with the corresponding quarter of 1912 there was a total increase of 140 in the number of persons killed and of 2,000 in the number of persons injured in railroad accidents of all kinds in the United States. There was an increase of 134 to the number of train accidents. Defective roadway and defective equipment together caused more than 93 per cent of all deaths reported, 15.1 per cent being caused by broken rails.

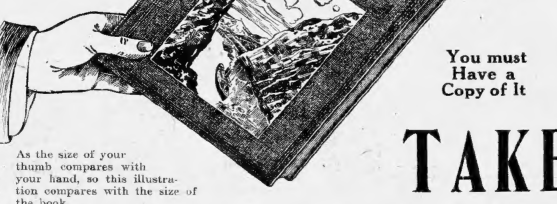

MARKET DAY AT PANAMA

Some New and Unusual Species of the Vegetable and Animal Kingdom Offered by Vendors.

gashed by the broad sails of innumerable caravans, heading down to Panama, with strange exotic products for the market. Every day is market day at Panama, but the crowded little open-air mart is seen at its best of a Saturday, or Sunday in early morning. All night long the native boats, mostly cayucos hewn out of a single log, sometimes of mahogany, and often as much as thirty-five feet long, and with a schooner rig, have been drifting in, propelled by the never failing trade wind. They come from the Baguato river country, from Chorrera, from Taboga and the Isthmus of Darien, from the Bay of San Miguel and from the land of the San Blas Indians. The market opens at dawn, and buyers are there almost as soon as the sellers, for currying is the rule in the tropics. Here is an Indian woman, the color of a coconut and crested as to hair. Like a piece of Chinese crepe. Before her is spread out her stock of wares, and in some items curious. Green peppers, tomatoes a little larger than a small plum, a cheese made of goat's milk and packed to about the consistency of Brie, a few yams, peas, limes and a papaya or two are the more familiar. Something shaded like a banana and wrapped in corn husks arouses my curiosity.

"What is it?" "Five cents." "No, no, no, mean this is it? What's it made of?" "I cantavo!"

In our opinion, my lack of Indo-Spanish patois, I buy it and find it little native sugar, very moist and very dark, made up like a sausage, or a ham in corn husks. 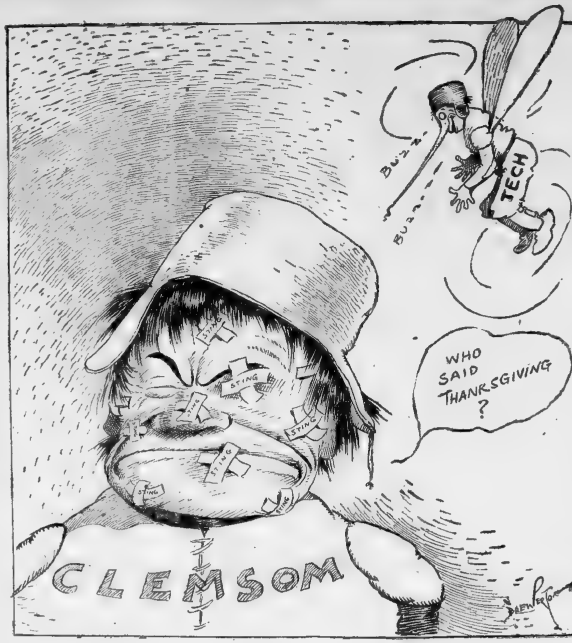
