WASHINGTON, Oct. 2.—The cotton future tax is all but dead. Its only hope will be found when the senate finally agrees to the conference report on the tariff bill, as the senate is absolutely sure to do. The death knell of the cotton futures tax was sounded yesterday afternoon, when it failed to pass the senate by a vote of 46 to 41. The amendment was voted on after the senate had adjourned for the day, and the vote was taken on a motion to report the bill to the conference.

TEXAS SUFFERS DAMAGE FROM FLOOD RAVAGES

Loss Estimated at Nearly a Million as Result of Excessive Rainfall

DALLAS, Tex., Oct. 2.—While accurate figures could not be obtained today, reports from several cities in southeast Texas indicate that damage from floods incident to almost unprecedented rainfall in those sections will reach high figures, probably more than \$1,000,000. The loss has fallen heavily on railroads, many bridges having been washed away, while rice and other farm crops have suffered heavily. The lumbering industry in southern Texas and southwest Louisiana has been practically annihilated.

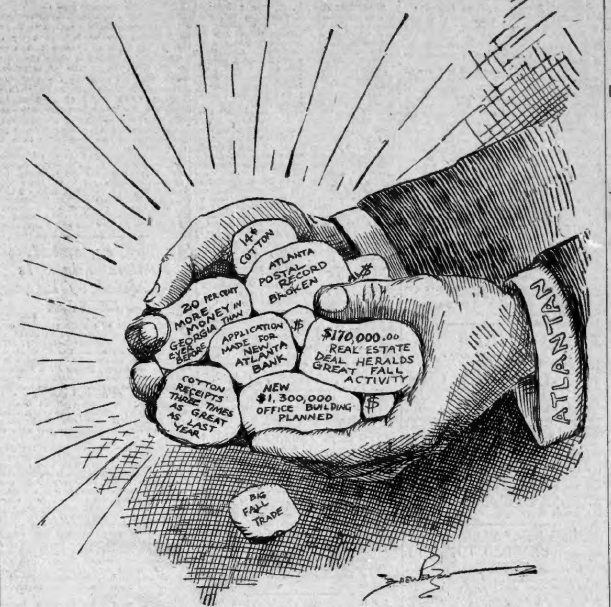

COLUMBUS FIRE LOSS ESTIMATED AT \$100,000

Over 100 Fine Horses and Mules Perish—Five Firemen in Hospital

(Special Dispatch to the Journal.) COLUMBUS, Ga., Oct. 2.—A region estimate of the losses from last night's fire which completely destroyed the Palace stage company, two-story building on First avenue, places the loss at \$100,000. Of the 150 fine horses and mules consigned in the stable, only about 50 have been accounted for up to noon, and it is believed that at least 100 were cremated in the flames, which at one time seriously threatened to sweep away the entire business section of the city. Of the more than 200 men who were killed while fighting and watching the flames, many are thought to be seriously injured. Only five are confined to the hospital and one is being treated in the city hospital ward.

Government Officials Cable to Panama in Order to Take All Precautions

WASHINGTON, D. C., Oct. 2.—Major Rogers, in charge of the Panama canal office in this city, today cabled to Colonel Goetzl in Panama for details of the earth quake on the isthmus last night with special reference to any possible effect upon the Panama canal. This action was taken as a measure of precaution, though the official report that Colonel Goetzl would have advised them very promptly had the canal sustained any substantial injury. It is recalled that the canal was not even slightly disturbed by the shocks that occurred from time to time since the American assumed charge of the canal construction, but in no case has there been any substantial damage. 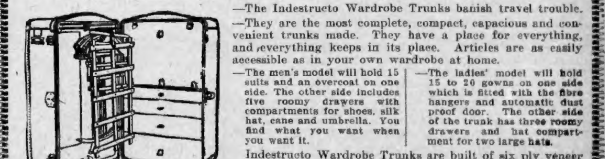

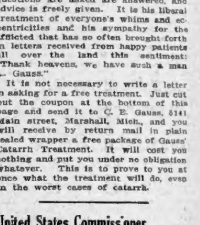

INVENTOR PRODUCES NEW WAR WEAPONS

New Rifle to Destroy Airships—Powerful Cannon Carried by Two Men

(By Associated Press.) PARIS, Oct. 2.—A famous inventor named Sava Rogosca, has demonstrated a new rifle which may revolutionize the rifle firing. His invention consists of a special cartridge and double flammable bullet primarily designed for the destruction of airships. In his experiments Rogosca used an old gun built in 1820. Although his cartridge was filled with powder spectators were astonished to see neither smoke, flash nor report as he fired. The strange, long bullet traveled first and straight to the butt instead of causing a series of irregular bounds as it should have done according to the laws of ballistics. The bullet carried 1,500 meters, but it is calculated that with a modern rifle it would have carried 5,000 meters.

LONDON, Oct. 2.—After a prolonged discussion the directors of the Bank of England today decided to raise the bank rate from 4 1/2 to 5 per cent as a precautionary measure to protect the bank's reserve, which has been depleted by over \$10,000,000 this week by exports to Egypt. The weekly consignment of gold from South Africa, which has been absorbed by the continent, has been the cause for gold depletion. The discount market scarcely expected the advance today in view of the former New York exchange, but it was recognized that some protective measure would be necessary in the near future in order to enable the Bank of England to get the gold arriving from South Africa and build up its reserve, which has fallen much below that of last year.

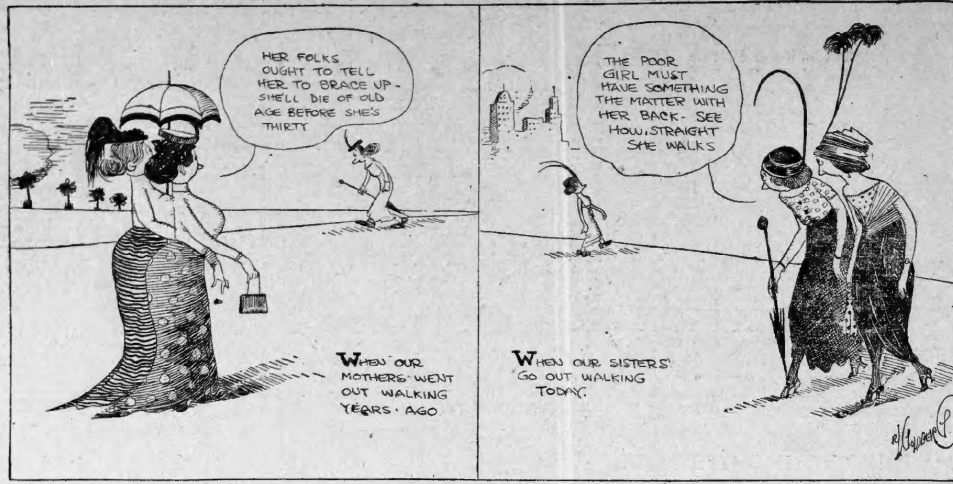
