JURY FRIGHTENED INTO ITS VERDICT, CHARGES MR. ARNOLD

"Did the Jury Hear Applause and Cheering?" Is Big Question for Judge Ross to Pass Upon

23 COUNTS CONSIDERED AT THE MORNING SESSION
Three New Affidavits Will Be Introduced by Defense to Show Henslee Was in Albany at Time It Was Claimed

The twelve jurors who declared Leo M. Frank guilty of the murder of Mary Phagan were completely unimpressed by the "scared rabbits huddled together" by R. R. Arnold, of counsel for the convicted one, Thursday, morning, during the hearing by Judge L. S. Ross of the defense's motion for a new trial. The attorney asserted stoutly that the grounds of the motion were not sufficient to warrant the jury being frightened into a verdict of guilty by the state of the public temper, are correct and can be borne out.

These contentions, however, were disputed on numerous occasions by Judge Ross and will be combated later by affidavits from the defense. The motion was said to depend upon Judge Ross's view of this dispute between the opposing lawyers.

Twenty-three more grounds for a new trial were proposed Thursday morning and the hearing was engaged with the state and defense attorneys taken for lunch. Judge Ross declared that he expects to complete the reading of the motion some time Thursday and to be ready Friday morning to proceed with the disposition and arguments. Among the grounds covered Thursday morning were those which allege that Henslee was introduced by applause and cheering on the part of the jury.

The Thursday session was held in the state court room and began with the forty-third count of the indictment. The state attorney urged all haste possible commensurate with the importance of the subject, and the defense attorneys urged that the hearing be held Thursday if necessary to complete the hearing Thursday morning.

During the hearing Thursday morning, the state attorney introduced three affidavits which will be taken for the record. The affidavits are signed by Mack Parkes, secretary of the defense, and are signed by a hotel clerk who looks over the register and found Henslee there on the night of the murder. The affidavits also introduce evidence of the state's case.

It would be sufficient in size for market stalls, and would be in the heart of the city, accessible in all directions.

Man Who Accused Atlanta Merchant of Phagan Murder Is Himself Charged With Death of Dug Steele

STEELE KILLED IN 1908; INDICTMENT JUST MADE

Murder Warrant Has Been Issued Against Fisher, and Sheriff Is on Way to Atlanta to Arrest Him

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) DALLTON, Ga., Oct. 23.—At 11 o'clock this morning, the grand jury returned a writ of indictment charging Ira Fisher, the sensational witness who accused a prominent Atlanta man of the murder of Mary Phagan, with the murder of Dug Steele, Steele having been killed here about five years ago.

The body of Steele, badly mangled, was found in the tracks of a street car in the northern part of the city. Although the body was decapitated, and the head was badly crushed, practically no blood was found in the vicinity leading to the belief that Steele was killed and later placed on the tracks in an effort to hide the crime. The coroner's inquest, started for several days, finally returning a verdict that the man who killed Steele had run over by a train, as no evidence in warrant and other finding was secured. The grand jury afterward investigated the matter but reached the same conclusion.

Revolutionists Massacre Entire Population of Village

MEXICO CITY, Oct. 22.—Revolutionists yesterday massacred the entire population of a village of about fifty, of the state of Michoacan, while they were defending the village against looters. The villagers fought until the ammunition was exhausted and which were shot down and killed and the village was burned to the ground. WASHINGTON, Oct. 22.—The war department has given its approval to the first draft of law, designed to uphold the dignity and honor of military uniform of the United States in all of the states and territories and in the insular possessions.

The measure forbids discrimination in any public against any officer or enlisted man wearing the uniform of the army, navy or marine corps and likewise prohibits any person not duly authorized from wearing the uniform of any part of it.

Alderman E. Such additions would make it possible, says the resolution, not only to apply the idea of open-air schools to the public school system of this city, but would also tend to relieve the congestion. The resolution asks that the board of education be requested to consider the plan and report to council on the matter. "The open-air schools have proven successful in New York and other cities," said Alderman Nutting, "and if they are feasible in those cities, they are certainly feasible in a climate like Atlanta's."
