MUST SERVE SENTENCE FOR DEATH OF GIRL

Chatham Superior Court Upholds in Sentencing Isaac Silver to Prison

Isaac Silver, the Savannah young man convicted by the Chatham county superior court of involuntary manslaughter in connection with the death last spring of Miss Marion Leonard, a chaperon girl in the "Around the Clock" musical comedy company, who died as the result of a hypodermic injection of morphine administered by Silver, must serve the two-year sentence imposed upon him in the lower court.

The state court of appeals Thursday morning affirmed the verdict of the Chatham county superior court by rejecting Silver's petition for a new trial. After a performance of "Around the Clock" in Savannah on the evening of March 8, last, Silver invited Miss Leonard and another chaperon girl to a private lunch in his room, and, according to the evidence submitted at the trial, the partly conscious girl and her companion first took an injection of the drug which she administered it to the two girls.

Both of the girls became violently ill, and Miss Leonard died during the night. Silver was indicted and arrested. He was represented by attorney Shelby Bryson, one of Chatham county's reputation in the general practice of the law. His defense was that he had administered the drug for the purpose of relieving the pain and not with the intent to kill.

The court of appeals holds that Silver's plea was no defense, for the reason that the state law forbids the giving of any administration of medicine or drug to a person in a public place, except upon the order of a physician or dentist, and that Miss Leonard's death came about because of the giving of a morphine injection without an order of a physician.

It developed after Miss Leonard's death that her real name was Katherine O'Mara, and that her home was in New England.

LOCAL DISPOSAL PLANTS ARE PRAISED BY EXPERT

Government Sanitary Engineer Declares Sewage Facilities Most Modern He Has Seen

George H. Shaw, sanitary engineer for the United States department of agriculture, was in Atlanta Thursday morning to inspect the local disposal plant in connection with a tour he is making of the country to get a line on sanitary conditions in the large cities.

After a thorough examination of the new Protector creek, Peachtree creek and Entertainment creek plants, Mr. Shaw stated that in his opinion the local plants were superior to any in the United States and in all probability the equal of any in the world.

Mr. Shaw is not only inspecting new age disposal conditions, but sanitary work of other kinds. On his visit to this city he confined his investigations to sewage disposal, but later plans to consider other phases of sanitation here.

VIETS THESE PLANTS

Accompanied by Captain H. M. Clayton, chief of construction and Charles C. Houston, city engineer and bacteriologist, Mr. Shaw inspected the plants of the government expert visiting Protector creek and Peachtree creek, both of which plants are in operation, and also Entertainment creek, where a third plant is in process of construction.

Mr. Shaw took several pictures of the plants, and also took samples of sewage before and after being treated in the Inhoff tanks, and of the sludge which the sewage leaves. He was accompanied at the plants by Mr. Clayton and Mr. Houston.

Martial Law Fails to Halt Bomb Throwing and Arson in Colorado

Mining Camp Thrown into Panic When Bomb Explodes, but All Escape Injury, Treslles Are Burned and General Disorder Follows Arrival of Militia

(By Associated Press.) TRINIDAD, Oct. 29.—Coincident with the arrival of the state militia in the strike zone of southern Colorado, more disorders occurred yesterday and early today throughout the district than had been reported previously during any day.

The most serious outbreak on the part of the strikers was the firing and burning of the postoffice at Aguilar by strikers yesterday after they had defeated a small group of mine guards in a battle at the mine of the Southwestern Fuel company.

One hundred and twenty-five militiamen were hurried from Walsenburg to take charge of the situation at Aguilar and late last night after the troops had dispersed the strikers and three guards a demonstration was held by the strikers in the streets of Aguilar, where more than 200 persons, led by a brass band, paraded the streets until early this morning, stopping now and then to listen to a speech denouncing the troops.

At Sopris, the mine camp was thrown into panic by the explosion of a bomb at the St. Thomas mine, a mile to the east, last night. The mine was thrown from the top of a hill to a point well below a group of miners' frame houses. No damage was done by the explosion.

Strikers were held by burning long spans of frame tracks on the Colorado and Wyoming railroad between Segunda and Primrose. The tracks were set up on that road for several hours.

Adjutant General Chase today announced the policy in dealing with the disarming situation. He has issued positive orders that he does not intend to go into the miners' tents or homes to search for weapons and ammunition, but that every man known to have a gun in his possession would be disarmed.

Income of Busch Heirs More than \$1,000 Per Day by Brewer's Will

ST. LOUIS, Oct. 29.—Each of the heirs of the estate of Adolphus Busch, who according to the will filed here late yesterday, are to have shares of the trust into which the estate is to be formed, will have an annual income of \$75,000 a share, or more than \$1,000 a day.

August A. Busch, who withdrew his name in the management of the vast properties, is to have two shares of the trust and his income consequently will be \$150,000 a year, minus the provision he is required to make for his invalid mother, Carl.

According to a high officer of the Busch corporation, the income of the estate is estimated at \$3,000,000, which is 8 per cent return on a valuation of \$36,000,000. The heirs are the widow and the seven children.

The fact that a codicil was attached a little more than a year ago exempting Lieutenant Edward Schaefer, husband of Wilhelmine Busch, from a fourth interest in his wife's share of the estate caused the codicil to be established today by a member of the family.

Canada's Rural Problem.

It is surprising to learn that within the last ten years more than six hundred and forty thousand people have deserted the rural districts of Canada. The Dominion has conducted an aggressive campaign, both through the Government and through private enterprise, to secure settlers for its vast area of undeveloped lands.

The report that more than six hundred and forty thousand persons—some fifty-four thousand a year—have left Canadian farms within the decade opens an interesting field of speculation. Of this number, what part represented Americans who had crossed the border to try their fortunes and had found conditions less favorable than they had hoped?

The City, The State, and The W. & A. Railroad.

A joint committee from the City Council and the Chamber of Commerce has hopefully revived the admirable project of constructing a plaza above the railroad cut between the Washington and the Forsyth street viaducts. The success of this enterprise would bring immeasurable benefits to Atlanta and also to the State.

The Councilman-Chamber of Commerce committee must deal with the Legislative Commission recently appointed to devise plans for the future of the Western and Atlantic railroad. The present lease of this property will expire a little more than six years hence, wherefore it is imperative that the State lose no time in formulating definite policies to meet new needs and new opportunities.

In this connection the interests of the State and of Atlanta are interdependent. The city and the commonwealth must counsel together for mutual profit. It may be expected, therefore, that if the Atlanta committee approaches the Western and Atlantic commission with a well defined plan for the improvement of this terminal area, a plan that will conserve and increase the interests of the State as well as the city, it will be given a cordial hearing.

That such a plan can be devised, there is little reason to doubt. That part of the W. & A. tract east of the Forsyth street bridge is obviously too valuable to be used merely as a switching yard. Whether the Union station be moved to a point west of Forsyth street or rebuilt on its present site, this area lying in the city's heart should certainly be redeveloped from its unwholly and unprofitable condition.

Divers means of improvement and development have been suggested but each of them contemplates in one way or another the construction of a plaza or something akin to a plaza. The one important object is to displace this gorge of smoke with an avenue of civic progress and comeliness. If that can be done, the State's property will be worth incalculably more and Atlanta will be relieved of its greatest nuisance and defacement.

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RURAL CREDITS

By THE GERMAN SYSTEM. B. FREDERICK HASKIN.

It has been seen from the somewhat too brief nature of the rural program proposed by Senator Fletcher that it embraces both personal and money lending, the one based upon short-term credit and the other upon long-term loans. It is an interesting system of local banks tied together in a great central rural bank situated in Washington, and these state-wide banks in turn connected in a great central rural bank situated in Washington, a nation-wide financial system of rural credits.

The German Landbanker is able to secure mortgage loans through a variety of special institutions for the most part. These institutions are able to obtain 90,000,000. These institutions are able to take care of the rural districts in which they are situated in respect to their safety and to the result is that they stand high in the confidence of the farmer.

At the bottom of the German co-operative credit system are the town banks, known as the Schulze-Nachbarn banks. These banks are the basis of the dependent units, but they do band themselves together into a sort of provincial bank which makes for the discussion of provincial topics and the formation of provincial policies. These provincial unions, in turn, are members of a national union, which meets once a year and discusses national banking problems. But these unions are comparable only to our own national and state banking associations, and do not represent the business of actual banking; rather they are simply forums for discussing banking ideas and banking progress.

The country banks form of two general types, one which mixes other forms of co-operation with co-operative credit, doing the several kinds of business in one institution, and the other which keeps its business in banking entirely separate from co-operative buying, selling and producing. Each is thought to be a success.

The two forms of co-operation in the German co-operative banking system are the long-term secured by mortgage; and the short term, based upon personal credit. The long-term co-operation is the former class is the Landbanker, and the typical organization of the latter class is the Schulze-Nachbarn bank. In both cases there are many other organizations which play in part a collateral and in part an auxiliary role. Among the mortgage credit institutions other than the Landbanker are the state, provincial and local mortgage credit banks, whose main mission is to finance the breaking up of large land proprietorships into small holdings, and to provide the money with which the small holdings may be equipped with the necessary farm buildings. They thus play a sort of agent for the owner of the broken-up estate collecting principal and interest from the small but numerous tenants who have been made available for the use of the farmer who would improve his farm.

The savings banks of Germany are cast along lines somewhat similar to those in the United States, though they have to compete with the co-operative non-profit-making credit institutions, and therefore have to operate on a different basis. MERCER BACKS WARDENS WHO CONFISCATED DUCKS

Lays Little Stress on Reports of Prosecution on Burglary Charge

State Game Commissioner Jesse E. Mercer is standing squarely behind the two Chatham county game wardens who recently confiscated a number of migratory ducks which they said were found along the private tracts of several prominent Savannah citizens, and Mr. Mercer lays little stress on the reports from Savannah to the effect that these citizens contemplate bringing action in the courts by charging the game wardens with burglary.

Commenting upon the incident, Mr. Mercer says: "The game wardens in this case have so far as I can learn, acted entirely within their powers according to law. They are not only state wardens, but also possessors of the right to hunt on these lands in Savannah must be acting unlawfully because they will find that the warden here back of them is not the state law, but the power of the nation. "Of course, I have but two or three more days in office, but I can say that these men will receive the support of the department. My voice has already been given to the support of the law in the hotels and in the courts and I shall see that the national law is upheld."

"When I first entered the office of game commissioner, I was given to understand that there was a certain element in Savannah who were ready to defy the law. I took cognizance of this charge and I can say that there has been only one case in which I have given me serious trouble since I have been in office. It is a case in which any man or number of men in Savannah or any other city is sufficiently powerful to get at the master of the game law. I think that when they come to consider the matter they will hesitate to prosecute for burglary men who are carrying out the provisions of the game law."
