NEW YORK, Sept. 17.—Two more crimes were placed today on the record of Rev. Hans Schmidt, the Catholic priest, who already has confessed he was a murderer and counterfeiter. In announcing Schmidt's record, detectives found evidence that Schmidt had been in the Episcopal rectory at St. Joseph's church and that he had been in the home of the victim, the night of the murder.

Schmidt still insisted that neither Ernest A. Muret, his doctor, or Mrs. Anna Amuller, the girl who was murdered, were guilty of the crime. 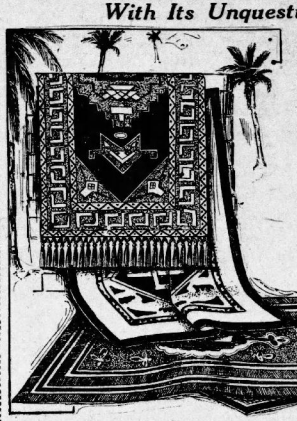

Boll Weevil's a Real Menace, He Says, Warning Farmers to Get Ready

"I'm a convert to the menace of the boll weevil," acknowledged J. H. Price, commissioner of agriculture, in his first Tuesday morning. He had returned Monday from a trip through Alabama, Mississippi and Louisiana, where the boll weevil has been having since his own way with the cotton crop for a while. He had visited the country, and had walked through devastated fields where the plants grow seven feet high with not enough cotton on them to pay for the plowing.

"I used to think the boll weevil was a sort of a booger—that he had been picked up and that he really is. Now I know he is a sure enough menace. He's coming, as certain as clockwork. He won't be much longer getting to Georgia. And Georgia must get ready for him."

"If the boll weevil should appear in the cotton fields of Georgia tomorrow, he would throw the cotton market into a panic. People wouldn't know what to do. We would be like they were out there. We go broke. We'd sell our rich farms for \$5 an acre, and pull out, plumb busted. That's what we've got to meet. I mean, if other folks, and not get caught unprepared like they were. If we are prepared, the boll weevil will think Georgia is a mighty unfriendly state."

"Let's begin right now to get ready." The commissioner talked earnestly. The things that he said to the farmers, retailers and land owners with business men, bankers and others.

"The weevil won't touch a thing but cotton squares," said he Tuesday. "You'll raise everything else all around him but he attacks to the cotton. Therefore the way to combat him is to plant other things, plant oranges, peaches, figs, raisins, hogs. Make your own living on your own farm. That's what you've already got your living out of the farm, raise cotton, raise less of it, and work harder on it, and keep the boll weevil picked off, and work it about twice as fast, and make it mature and get ready before the boll weevil comes. That's what will hit him."

"The commissioner reiterated what he had said several days ago—that Georgia looks mighty good to him. He said he will see his corn acreage, and with a 2,000,000-bale cotton crop, and with cotton certain to go to 25 cents in his opinion, and with plenty of small grain—Georgia, he looks good after what he's seen."

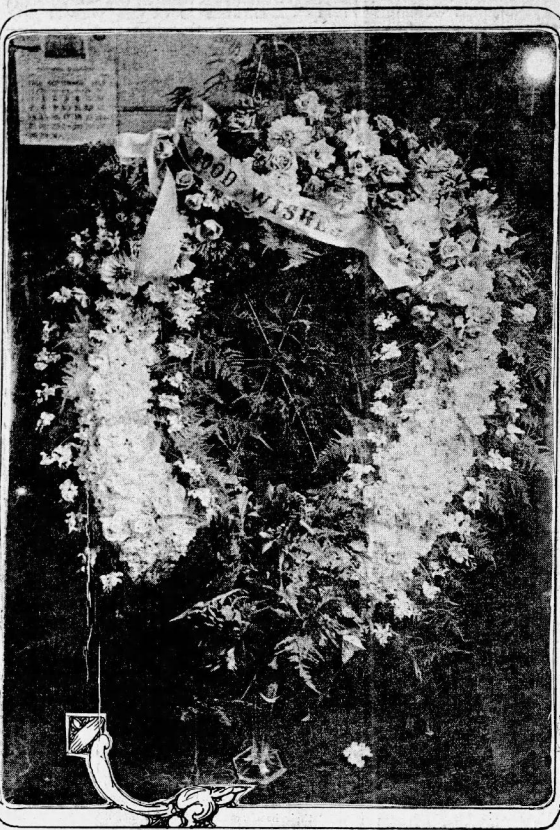
JUDGE'S QUESTION GETS "TIGER" NEW TRIAL

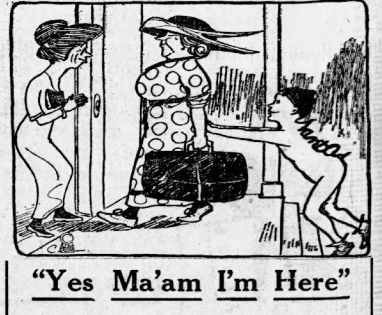

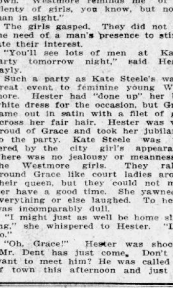

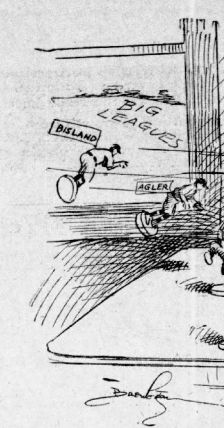
