DECISION ON FRANK IS EXPECTED TODAY

Atlanta Hears Prison Commission Will Make a Report Favorable to the Prisoner.

ATLANTA, Ga., June 8.—The Prison Commission will make its report to Governor Slaton on the Leo Frank case some time tomorrow, according to an announcement made this afternoon. It was currently reported at the Capitol that the commission had decided to recommend commutation of the death sentence to life imprisonment.

Should the commission make its report in the morning, counsel for the convicted man will appear immediately before Governor Slaton and request him to give them a hearing at 9 o'clock Thursday morning. They will then present an appeal in Frank's behalf with possibly new petitions and new data.

Governor Slaton will inform Solicitor Dorsey of the commission's finding, and give him an opportunity to protest against the appeal for commutation. The Solicitor has asked the Governor to permit him to present "certain facts and matters." It is understood that these "certain facts and matters." will relate to the letter written by the late Judge Roan in Frank's behalf and also statements credited to two of the prison Commissioners.

Kills Himself in a Bronx Hotel.

Benvo Kultur, 40 years old, of 866 East 1636 Street, who was a member of the Bronx lodge of Elks, committed suicide by inhaling illuminating gas in Foody's Hotel, at 2274 Eighth Avenue, yesterday. Kultur registered at the hotel about 1 o'clock yesterday morning. During the afternoon his room was forced open and he was found dead in bed with a gas tube in his mouth. He had closed the cracks in the door and windows with adhesive plaster. He left letters for his wife and to A. Magrus of 850 Longwood Avenue, the Bronx.
