BRUNSWICK, Ga., June 21.—Of the Governor's act in commuting the sentence of Leo M. Frank, The Brunswick News will say tomorrow morning editorially:

"In commuting to life imprisonment the death penalty in the case of Leo M. Frank. Governor Slaton has risen to the highest interpretation of the Executive office. He has spared the life of a man where the evidence upon which he was convicted was clouded with doubt the atmosphere at which the trial occurred was charged with prejudice and with passion. The serious, sober-minded thought in Georgia will approve the act of clemency on the part of Gov-ernor Slaton, and he has demonstrated to the world that he is big enough, broad enough, and manly enough to do his duty in the face of the fact that all over Georgia passion has driven the people to cry for the blood of Frank. He has tempered justice with mercy, he has demonstrated to the world that a Georgia Governor knows how to construe the meaning of 'wisdom, justice, and moderation,' even if to so construe it means to act against the will of the people.

"Time will vindicate the Governor, and in the meantime we commend him for

his conduct."
